A HEART-SHAPED HISTORY

ebruary 14 is traditionally the day that flowers and chocolates will be winging their way to loved ones across the Western world. But how did this annual expression of affection come to occupying a permanent spot on our calendars, and just who was this Valentine in whose name we send cards and presents?

It's a day on the calendar that elicits high emotion, whether that be a boyfriend's sudden panic that he's forgotten to get his partner a present and will subsequently be consigned to the doghouse, or the disinterest of a singleton facing the prospect of amorous couples engaged in very public displays of affection. Although not a global phenomenon, in America, Canada, Mexico, France, Australia and, of course, the UK, Valentine's Day is

an annual event celebrated via the exchanging of gifts and cards between loved ones.

But where did this tradition begin? Well, there are multiple stories about the origins of the mysterious saint to whom the February 14 owes its name. The Catholic Church currently recognises three different saints by the name of Valentine, or Valentinus – all of whom were martyred.

Could Valentine's Day be named after the man who defied the Roman Emperor Claudius' decree that marriage be outlawed for young men, as single men made better soldiers, and continued to perform marriages in secret? Or could it be the Valentine who allegedly helped captured Christians escape from the Romans, and may have sent handwritten notes signed 'From Your Valentine' to his love interest while he himself was imprisoned? Whatever the truth of the matter, all sources agree that Valentine was a sympathetic and romantic hero... and wouldn't we all love to be that.

It was in the Middle Ages, however, when the notion of courtly love meant that the figure of Valentine became one of the most popular patron saints. The oldest concrete appearance of the relationship between Valentine's Day and romantic love was in Geoffrey Chaucer's 1382 poem Parlement of Foules, which made a link between this holiday and the mating season of birds. The oldest known valentine letter is from the Duke of Orleans to his wife after his imprisonment in the Tower of London following the Battle of Agincourt. Written in 1415, the greeting is now housed in the British Library in London.


Modern Valentine's Day is less about Chaucer and more about cards, with the Greetings Card Association estimating that one billion cards are sent each year on February 14, making Valentine's Day the second-largest holiday of the year – with women purchasing around 85 per cent of all cards. The battle of the sexes evens out, however, when it comes to giving floral favours, with over 70 per cent of flower buyers being men.

One man who has also turned Valentine's Day into an annual cash bonanza is Richard Cadbury – he of the famous purple-wrapped chocolates. Cadbury was the first person to package chocolate up in heart-shaped boxed to be sold for Valentine's Day, and these days more than 35 million of these boxes will be sold each year around this time.

Despite such a patterned history of romantic reverence, just remember, the real question isn't whether you dare send something on Valentine's Day...

it's whether you dare not!

NEWMONEY SAFER THAN EVER



The slogan 'the pound won't be round for much longer' is being used to publicise the £1.5billion of coins being made by the Royal Mint.

The new coin is apparently one of the hardest to counterfeit in the world. Its security features include:

12 sided – its distinctive shape makes it instantly recognisable, even by touch.

Bimetallic – it is made of two metals. The outer ring is gold coloured (nickel-brass) and the inner ring is silver coloured (nickel-plated alloy).

► Latent image – it has an image like a hologram that changes from a '£' symbol to the number '1' when the coin is seen from different angles.

Micro-lettering – it has very small lettering on the lower inside rim on both sides of the coin. One pound on the obverse "heads" side and the year of production on the reverse "tails" side, for example 2016 or 2017.

Milled edges – it has grooves on alternate sides.

Top secret - Hidden high security feature – a high security feature is built into the coin to protect it from counterfeiting in the future.

> Securing the pound's future was the reason why the coin has been changed for the first time in 30 years.


According to the Royal Mint one $\pounds 1$ coin in thirty in circulation is a fake.

However many businesses are angry about the change as those who use machines to take payment will have to re-figure them to accept the new coins.

From October 16 onwards businesses can refuse the 'old' round pound.



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ALL SPACES GREAT & SMALL

N ot everyone has the luxury of living somewhere with rolling green spaces and expansive gardens in which to flaunt their green fingers, but these easy tips will make sure you make the most of your space no matter how limited the lawn or petite the plot.

GOING UP

If you want to create a garden that maximises all available space, the best thing to do is to start moving upwards instead of outwards. Why not form stacked herb gardens out of concentric pots, which diminish in size as they go upwards? Or expand this onto a bigger scale by purchasing a batch of wooden boxes that you can arrange one above another with slats in the middle to form a 3D shelving unit in which to plant all manner of flowers.

WALL TO WALL

Create the illusion of space by using your garden's walls to their maximum. Hang mirrors that reflect the greenery within to form a dense

jungle-like impression, or set up a trellis with hanging IKEA pots and hangars to fill with plants that tumble down your walls.

HANGING OUT

Tomatoes can take up a load of space, but are fantastic plants if you're looking to start living a life where you can eat things fresh from your garden. If you've got some plastic bottles, however, you can cut them in half, slide the tomato plant through the neck of the bottle and fill the rest with soil. Finally, attach some strong string to the bottle's cut edge and the string to a nail so that your tomato vines hang down in all their glory.

WHEELY GOOD

One great way to keep your green space as fresh and invigorating as the flowers within it is to attach wheels to the bottoms of your raised beds – that way, if you feel like a change in scenery, you can switch up the look of your garden without any effort at all.



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


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LATE BLOOMERS

s February finally rears its head from out of the wintery darkness, every humble horticulturalist should be brimming with excitement at the idea of a spring garden full of blooming plants and lush vegetation. Here's how to prepare your plot this month to get the very best out of your fruit, flowers and veg.

LOOKING ROSY



While you can leave pruning until next month, February is an ideal time to start planting roses, as the gradually warming soil will encourage growth. If you're planting on a patch where you have already been cultivating roses, however, make sure to avoid replant disease by adding a covering of mycorrhizal fungi, which coats the roses' roots and helps them absorb vital minerals from the soil.

POTATO PREP



Now is the time to start sprouting or 'chitting' your taters in order to give them a head start when it finally comes to planting. Place the seed potatoes in an egg cup or container, with the end with the most eyes facing up. The trick is to place the container somewhere with light and heat – a porch, conservatory or garage will suffice if you don't have a greenhouse. When your potatoes start chitting they should display greeny-purple knobbles. But be warned, if you end up with white sprouts, you haven't given your veg enough warmth!

SEED SORTING



Gearing up to get out in the garden can even be done from the comfort of your armchair, with February providing the perfect opportunity for organised gardeners to order your seeds. You can then grade your produce in order to create a sowing calendar through spring, meaning you'll be ready for any unexpected eventuality should it arise.

SLOW GROWERS



Although the idea of planting in February may seem odd, as the cold recedes it's a good time to start with any slow growing annuals and perennials, including pelargonium, begonia and osteospermum, which are all easy to seed on a warm windowsill or in a corner of your greenhouse. These seeds can take up to three weeks to germinate, meaning that by the time March arrives and the light improves, you'll already be seeing results!

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A RIDICULOUSLY RICH taste of apprentice success

lana Spencer was the latest lucky entrepreneur to scoop the £250,000 investment from Lord Alan Sugar on BBC's *The Apprentice*, but who is this Aberystwyth girl set to partner the indomitable Lord in a sweet-tasting bakery business?

The BBC may have lost the rights to *The Great British Bake Off*, but as interest in culinary technique continues to rise, they may well have just uncovered a new star in the bakery business – and now she has the financial clout of a certain Alan Sugar to back up her ambitions. Alana Spencer won the most recent series of *The Apprentice* to secure Sugar's large investment, and is hoping to turn over a profit of £465,000 in the first year of working with the mogul to grow her bakery business, Ridiculously Rich.

Spencer started off on the path to business success early on, with an idea in secondary school to make cards and sell them to classmates. She once sacked a school friend from her card venture for being too slow. This ruthless streak exhibited itself as Spencer sought to prove her suitability for the role of Sugar's business partner, with the 24-year-old saying that, if forced, she would indeed fire the only employee currently working for her - her boyfriend, Bart.

At 16, Spencer began making and selling chocolates for her family, before going on to make corporate gifts. This taste of professional treat-selling continued to snowball, with Spencer leaving school after her A Levels to set up a kitchen on the side of her parents' house, and later a business that would evolve into 'Ridiculously Rich': Narna's.

Narna's provided luxury homemade tray bakes to cafes and delis, and made regular appearances across the UK at fairs and festivals. Spencer was making rocky roads for just 16p before selling them on for £3 – and that's the kind of profit that even the largely sceptical Lord Sugar can get behind.

Spencer hopes to take her baking company into 2017 with the plan to get ridiculously rich, and she follows in the footsteps of 11 other lucky winners. The original winner of the show in its fledgling series, Tim Campbell, was even kept on by Lord Sugar beyond their contractual agreement before starting up a charity that helps budding entrepreneurs.

Lord Sugar doesn't get it right every time, but *The Apprentice* has been a reality show true to its word, and in its latest winner the sweet taste of success is surely not beyond Alana's appetite.


The Morning After

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


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BIG

Proving plus-sized models can come in all shapes, sizes and even ages, Barbie Ferreira started modelling when she was just 17. Now 20, Ferreira has joined fellow beauty Lawrence as one of the brand models for Aerie, and has recently signed to internationally acclaimed modelling agency Wilhelmina's, all the while refusing for any of her images to be retouched or edited in any way.

So 2016 brought us these amazing voluptuous women, cellulite and all. With models like Ashley, Iskra and Barbie carving the way, 2017 looks set to be the year that models of all sizes are setting the standard of beauty for fierce and fearless young girls everywhere.





Bros, founders of the original 'boy band' concept in the 1980s, are reuniting to mark their 30th anniversary. So what took them so long to join forces again after so long out of the spotlight? Twin brothers Luke and Matt Goss reveal all to **VISION** magazine.

'When will I, will I be famous?' they asked in their breakthrough hit single back in 1987. The answer came quickly – almost too quickly – and the boys from Peckham ascended to become one of the biggest bands of the time. Indeed, by the time 'Brosmania' began seeping away at the start of the 1990s, the band had shifted 17 million records.

But with the turning of that new decade came a change in the musical slant in the UK, and once it gathered pace, the brothers' decline was arguably as swift as their ascent, particularly after poor sales of their third album, *Changing Faces*.

As Matt and Luke went their separate

ways, what was left behind by the bottleblonde heroes was a sizeable impact on the industry. Indeed, to appreciate Bros is to understand that at a time of manufactured pop they were the most prefabricated of the lot, and this was something fresh and unique.

"I think we realised it was a bit of a shift in how the record industry was promoting talent," begins Matt. "Up until then music had generally come along and been taken up organically. There was a very casual approach to getting signed and getting music in the charts.

"I think, being the way we looked and how we carried ourselves, our label saw the Bros project as a way to fire this entire boyband image, from the music at the outset to a look and an image that fans loved. And for the first time, the promotion and marketing was driven to produce results – it was really quite unique back then, however normal that sounds now."

Over 50 people will be putting their best foot forward to help a young boy with cerebral palsy when they take part in the Brentwood Half Marathon and other races next month.

In 2014, Lennon and Layla Coady were born after just 28 weeks, weighing just 2.10lbs and 3lbs respectively. Layla was diagnosed with global developmental delay and mild cerebral palsy affecting the left hand side of her body. She is currently able to sit, crawl and pull to stand. She is also able to walk a few steps with support.

Meanwhile Lennon has cerebral palsy affecting his lower limbs and, although he can walk a few steps on his own, it's hoped he may be a candidate for an operation costing around $\pounds40,000$ which would enable him to walk independently. The operation is not funded by the NHS and the same amount of money would be needed for the aftercare and physiotherapy following the operation.

Nicola Dunn, who lives in Brentwood, is best friends with Zara and Joel, the twins' parents, and is leading the fundraising campaign which has already raised £28,500 since it started last year. The money has been raised from a variety of events.

Former pupils help gunshot victim



ormer pupils of Brentwood School have raised over £100,000 for one of their number who was shot in the head during a robbery at his parents' restaurant in Antigua on Christmas Day.

Chris Tester, who attended the school between 1990 and 1997, is now back in the UK receiving specialist medical care thanks to a crowd-funding campaign which has so far raised over £105,000.

It was launched to pay for Chris' return as he did not have travel insurance and initially aimed to raise £90,000. The fund-raising target has now been stretched to £120,000 to cover air ambulance costs and ongoing specialist treatment.

Thirty-seven-year-old Chris, who grew up in Brentwood but now lives in Torquay, was spending three weeks with his parents at their restaurant, the Boxer Shack, when the shooting took place.

He was immediately taken to hospital in Antigua but due to lack of facilities or expertise, Chris was taken to the neighbouring island of Guadeloupe.

Headmaster lan Davies said: "This is a heartwarming story of generosity and lasting friendship which shows a continuity of community spirit long after school days. Chris and his family will remain in the thoughts and prayers of the whole school community."





Spotlight on Asia – Vietnam

Asia in recent years has certainly become one of the most "must do" places to visit for both couples and families wishing to explore its hidden delights unspoilt beaches and wonderful cuisine. With many destinations in Asia able to offer the combination of culture and beach holidays a lot of our clients are moving away from the traditional short haul holiday to Europe and The Med or even hoping over the Water to The Americas and now diving into these pastures new.

Options to discover these new destinations are plentiful, this month I am going to give an insight into Vietnam which has all the things needed to make one fantastic destination to travel to. Turning its back on a turbulent past, it is a country very much on the up and attracts many travellers with a combination of unique heritage, enchanting natural scenery, stunning beaches and seriously delicious cuisine.

Vietnam's culture is a bit of a mishmash of influences, but all the more fascinating for it. Under the influence of China for a millennium and part of French Indochina for 70 years, this is a country where half of the population live from agriculture. As you can imagine the Vietnamese people's way of life, beliefs and values are very different from the world that we are in, ancestor veneration is part of everyday life and plenty of people still wear traditional dress. To get a taste of the country through the ages I suggest Hanoi, a compelling mix of traditional, crumbling grandeur and the contemporary, whilst Saigon is the powerhouse city driving the country forward.

The natural beauty of Vietnam is stunning with landscapes which are wonderfully diverse, stretching from the mountains and rice terraces of the northern highlands to the magnificence of Halong Bay's karst towers, to the rich lush greenery of the Mekong Delta. One of the most wonderful things about all this beauty is how easy it is to access and an overnight from Hanoi up to the spectacular views of Sapa a couple of hours by road from Saigon into the heart of the Mekong Delta. In Southern Vietnam, the River Mekong unravels into nine sprawling rivers, forming the fertile Mekong Delta. It's here the river rules. Daily life flows with the everchanging waters, fisheries thrive during the annual flood and rice fields are quickly dug as the waters recede.

The towns bustle with vendors trading their fresh produce, an endless flow of river traffic passing through daily. Veer off into a smaller stream and you'll find orchards, Buddhist temples and family homes clinging to the banks of the river. A perfect way to explore the Mekong Delta is by taking a one or two night cruise. The vessels are beautifully crafted and retain their charm, the cabins are well sized and beautifully furnished with local fabrics. The best time to be on the Mekong is between October and March when the waters are at their highest.

Vietnam's beaches are surprisingly overlooked but, because of it, quiet and relatively untouched. The coastline sweeps in a 3,000km S-shape from China in the north to Cambodia in the south. It passes through three different micro-climates along the way, which means dry, sunny weather is always to be had on either the central or south coast, whatever time of year you travel.

And, if I had to pick out just two of Vietnam's beach resorts? Would be Phu Quoc Island with its bright white sand and busy fishing community, which is situated close to the Cambodian border it offers an alternative beach option for those wishing to get a little off the beaten track, the island is now seeing more visitors, the





development is much slower which means that beautiful sandy beaches and clear pristine waters remain unspoilt. The island's remoteness and lack of infrastructure gives a feeling of seclusion and a great place to recharge your batteries.

The second would be Con Dao a collection of islands set in a protected marine park known for quiet sweeping beaches and enticing clear waters. The World Wildlife Foundation has been based here for more than ten years and have established a programme for protecting the country's sea turtle nesting grounds and the rare dugong. The largest island is Poulo Condore which dates back as early as the 16th century by Europeans and two centuries later the British East India Company. The island is culturally rich and has a politically intense history.

Under French rule Con Son was a penal colony for opponents of French colonialism and saw the imprisonment of many Vietnamese revolutionary heroes. Right up until the American War when US troops joined the South Vietnamese government who had captured the island from the French, Con Son had become infamous for its mistreatment and torture of its detainee's. The many prisons, now desolate shells, scatter the island along with manicured gardens and photogenic French villas.

Today Con Son has a sleepy and tranquil atmosphere with several lovely beaches and a beautiful untouched interior. The island can be reached by air just 45 minutes from Saigon.

The central beaches tend to be better from March to August when the wet weather disappears, and the southern beaches are drier from October to April.

Vietnam's cuisine is not only one of the worlds healthiest but also one of the most delicious! Full of distinctive flavours created by perfectly balancing salty, sweet, sour and hot, it is the use of plentiful fresh ingredients, herbs and spices that make it so good. Whether you are eating in a high end restaurant, or find something mouth-watering snack on one of the plentiful street stalls, your food is prepared and cooked to order,



whether it is summer rools, pho or a banh mi. The banh mi perfectly encapsulates Vietnam's colonial past in several tasty mouthfuls – a French style baguette filled with beautifully cooked pork belly, Vietnamese sausage, Pâté, egg or tofu with pickled carrots, coriander and cucumber.

With many tailor-made and pre-organised itineraries, available the options of what to include in your stay is almost endless however to begin – a 7-day Tour to Vietnam capturing the highlights and wonders of this country and its dramatic history combined with its wonderful beach locations can be arranged from £2329 per person. Whilst you can visit Vietnam all year round the best time is January to March, however with that will come the higher prices, if you are looking at something on a budget, looking at the end of September (end of monsoon season) could be a good option.

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RALPH'S

Ralph Lauren is a globally recognised name in fashion, but the billionaire designer has a secret source of inspiration: his expansive car collection, featuring some of the most exquisite and exotic automobiles from throughout history.

Ralph Lauren's famed catwalk creations may be flashed in front of the world's media on some of the world's most beautiful models, but his real pride and joy remains hidden inside an unassuming garage door in Westchester, New York. Concealed within this inconspicuous building is a car collection rumoured to be one of the most expensive ever assembled on Earth. containing some of the rarest examples of automotive engineering ever crafted by human hands, and with a collective price tag of at least \$300million.

The vehicles' ages range hugely - there's a 1929 Bentley 4.5-litre 'Blower' which participated in the 24 Hours of Le Mans in 1930, 1932 and 1933; and a 1955 Jaquar XKD Long-Nose, one of only 10 ever made and the fastest car of its generation. Then there are more modern automotive landmarks such as the Bugatti Vevron and the Ferrari LaFerrari - the brand's first-ever hybrid sports car.

The real gem of the collection, however, remains the Bugatti 57SC Atlantic. Built in 1938, with a 3.3-litre supercharged engine, this car is one of only two in existence today - and only four were ever built by the Italian auto-manufacturer. That car won Best in Show at the 1990 Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance and the 2012 Concorso d'Eleganza Villa d'Este - two of the world's most

the 77-year-old's motors have been tweaked and perfected in accordance with their owner's universally renowned style. A 1933 Type 59 Grand Prix Bugatti was changed from light blue to black. and his Mercedes Gullwing had cream added to the traditional Merc silver. Ralph even dared to put his own twist on the hallowed British Racing Green – a move only the most daringly confident of petrol-heads would dare to undertake.

The vintage mechanics of the older models from the Golden Age of the automobile industry also provide the muse for Lauren's accessory designs, most notably in the namesake Ralph from Amboyna burl, itself a popular choice for car makers of yore when it came to creating the instrument panels of luxury vehicles in the 1930s.

These cars are art – although they do perform a function in Lauren's day-to-day life, such as the 966 Porsche Turbo that he uses to visit the dentist. The Louvre even went so far as to exhibit 17 of his cars in a standalone exhibit in 2011, and some of his automobiles turn up at times during Ralph Lauren adverts. They are, after all, a key part of the 'Ralph Lauren' world - the perfect ideal, sewn together inextricably with his personal and professional brand.

attendances of only 24,000 per match.

It now seems bizarre that back in 2015 the then Chancellor George Osborne gave £3million of tax payers' money to help fund the growth and development of Chinese football.

That's roughly around seven weeks' wages for the likes of Oscar.

Some experts are concerned that the Chinese clubs pose a future threat to the Premier League. Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger said: "The money being ploughed into Chinese football is potentially a threat to the Premier League, which has been the most powerful financial force in the market for many years.

"Basically when you're a football player you want to combine the quality of the competition with the quantity of your wages. The quality of the game over there is a long way behind the Premier League and Spain but the lucrative deals will tempt more and more players."

Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp has little sympathy for English clubs worried about the Chinese effect. He said: "You know that the rest of Europe thinks the same thing about England. "I think in this moment it's not a league you want to play - the only way to get players to go there is the money. In all the big European leagues you can earn a lot of money, it should be enough.

"It's not an option for me. Maybe for a holiday but it's absolutely no option for me. I don't think we should say it's a danger, it's another opportunity."

Last month the Chinese Football Association introduced a rule restricting the number of non-Chinese players who can be fielded to three, in response to government concerns that the spending on foreign stars is getting out of hand.

Whether this will draw the curtain on the Chinese raids on European clubs and high profile international players remains to be seen.

It looks like being a very interesting time ahead and could potentially change the face of global football in the years to come.

Nove aside La Liga and the Premier League, there's a new absolutely minted kid on the global football block.

The Chinese Super League has made big headlines over the last year and especially the last couple of months.

By signing some high profile names the Chinese clubs have made a very clear statement of their intent to be taken seriously across the world.

Chelsea's Brazilian born players seem to be a particular favourite.

Last January Ramires signed for Jiangsu Suning for a reported fee of £25million.

Fast forward 12 months and fellow Brazilian Oscar made the move east for a reported £52million and weekly wages of £400,000.

At the time this magazine was going to print the Chinese club Tianjin Quanjian were reported to be circling armed with a bag of cash to turn star striker Diego Costa's head.

Talk of wages of £570,000 per week have been reported as the Brazilian born Spanish

international fell out with Chelsea boss Antonio Conte.

Conte apparently shouted at Costa to 'go to China' during a training ground row.

The 'go to China' message is increasingly being whispered in the ear of a host of top class players by their agents.

The Chinese Super League has already successfully targeted the following:

Axel Witsel - Belgian international.

Carlos Tevez – Argentinian international and former Manchester United and Manchester City star – reportedly now the world's best paid player on an eye watering £600,000 a week.

Gervinho – Ivory Coast striker and former Arsenal player.

Hulk – The burly Brazilian forward joined Shanghai SIPG and is earning around £320,000 a week.

Just like many of their European counterparts, the top Chinese clubs are backed by billionaires with very deep pockets, despite average



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
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
