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


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GoingSolo

he recent troubles experienced by Ant McPartlin have offered the world a scenario once thought impossible – the sight of Dec presenting alone. We look at some famous duos to see whether parting ways brought solo success or whether they should have stayed put.

LAUREL AND HARDY

The biggest comedy duo in the era of classic Hollywood, Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy made waves for two decades up to the Second World War with their iconic brand of slapstick humour. With decades of TV comedy under their belts, the pair couldn't garner any attention as solo artists, preferring instead to remain dual performers until Hardy's death in 1957.

VERDICT: Better Together

FRENCH AND SAUNDERS

These two much-loved comediennes paved the way for a generation of female entertainment when their show was given one of the biggest budgets in BBC history. Jennifer Saunders went on to win an Emmy Award, and star in *Absolutely Fabulous*. Dawn French, meanwhile, fronted *The Vicar of Dibley* series, and even became the voice of Terry's Chocolate Orange for a time.

VERDICT: Solo Success

THE TWO RONNIES

Ronnie Barker and Ronnie Corbett wrote themselves into the pantheon of British entertainment greats with their sketch show. Ronnie Barker embarked on successful solo projects in the form of *Open All Hours* and *Porridge*, to rich acclaim, but the consistency of The Two Ronnies remained until Barker's passing in 2005. Corbett followed him to the comedy convention in the sky two years ago.

VERDICT: Better Together

AMY POELHER AND TINA FEY

This pair of Transatlantic funny-women first found fame on *Saturday Night Live*, co-anchoring the now famous Weekly Update segment. Following that, they worked both separately and together, on films such as the Fey-penned 2004 cult hit *Mean Girls*, 2015's *Sisters*, and won a Golden Globe each for Fey's *30 Rock* and Poelher's *Parks and Recreation*.

VERDICT: Solo Success

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5 different ways to use... ...plastic bottles









e are constantly asked to recycle our plastic, especially plastic bottles. They are polluting our oceans and becoming an eyesore when littered. Here are five easy ways to reuse and recycle your plastic bottles, showing you just how adaptable and useful they can really be.

1. Planter

Make fun and creative planters from old plastic bottles. You can use them to plant flowers or grow your own cress or herbs. Simply cut the bottom third of a two-litre bottle, paint the bottle a colour of your choice, use the rest of the bottle to cut out ears and draw features on.

2. Bird feeder

Bird feeders are a great way to bring nature into your garden. Simply cut out a rectangle from each side of the bottom and fill the bottom of your bottle with seeds. It's best to use a five-litre bottle as most of the lids come with a handle for you to easily hang.

3. Sprinkler

Kids love running through the garden while the sprinkler is going, but these can be very expensive. Simply poke holes in a two-litre bottle and screw it on to your hose pipe.

4. Painting

Create a masterpiece with just a plastic bottle and some paint. Simply paint the plastic bottle to make it look like whatever animal you like – we love the owl.

5. Money pot

You will need two plastic bottles of the same size, a zip and a needle and thread for this activity. Simply cut around the bottles about a quarter of the way up from the bottom. Then, sew the zip around the edge of the cut bottles. You can then make a slit in the top bottle, or just use the zip to put your money in and out.

Head of drug smuggling crime group sought by national agency

National Crime Agency (NCA) investigators are appealing for information to trace the head of an organised crime group which disappeared before standing trial for drugs offences.

Richard Wakeling, 51, from Brentwood, was sentenced in his absence to 11 years in prison for orchestrating the attempted importation of liquid amphetamine with a street value of around £8million in April 2016.

Three other men also stood trial at Chelmsford Crown Court, including Lesley Muffett, 59, who drove the lorry carrying the drugs, and gang members Stuart Davidson, 65, and Darren Keane, 34.

All four men were found guilty of conspiring to import drugs on April 6 following a 12-week trial.

NCA officers began their investigation after plastic drums carrying the liquefied drugs were discovered by Border Force on Muffett's truck as he attempted to board a train through the Channel Tunnel on April 9, 2016.

On April 9, Wakeling was given an 11-year sentence, Keane nine years, Davidson eight years and Muffett six years in prison.

NCA senior investigating officer Paul Green said: "These men were involved in a serious conspiracy to import a large quantity of dangerous drugs. We know they had links to other organised crime gangs in Europe and it is almost certain that this wasn't the first time they had done it."

Of the search for Wakeling, Paul Green added: "We strongly suspect that Wakeling fled abroad, possibly to Thailand were he has strong family links.

"But it is likely there are people here in the UK who hold clues about his movements after he arrived in Belfast on January 6, and I'd appeal for anyone with information to come forward.

"He has a prosthetic leg and needs regular medical treatment.

"The NCA has an international reach and he should know distance isn't a barrier to us finding him. We are determined he will be returned to the UK to serve his sentence.

"Until we find him, he'll spend every day looking over his shoulder."

School travels to Ypres for Great War rededication

Brentwood School staff, governors and students past and present travelled to the famous Belgian town of Ypres on the last day of term to rededicate their plaque in St George's English Church to those who fell in the Great War 100 years ago.

The last time the school visited in such numbers was in 2009 to unveil the plaque originally.

In a moving service led by the school chaplain, Revd Dr Adrian McConnaughie, the names of 59 Old Brentwoods who gave their lives were read out by current pupils in the third year, who were visiting the region on an annual battlefields history trip.

Navy officer, Commodore Jonathan Fry, himself an Old Brentwood, gave an address during the service, paying tribute to the 59, and relating their experiences before call-up to those of current students present in the Combined Cadet Force (CCF) and choir. The headteacher lan Davies read the exhortation and a wreath was laid at the school's memorial plaque. Mr Peter West, aged 89, who fought in the Korean War, rededicated the plaque to victims of the Great War and subsequent conflicts.

Later that evening, the school laid three wreaths at the Menin Gate memorial, joined by members of the CCF, led by Contingent Commander Lt. Col. John Seaman. Commodore Fry read the exhortation as the most senior ranking forces officer that evening.

Reflecting on the weekend's events, Mr Davies tweeted: "A moving and memorable service to remember those who died; to celebrate the end of the First World War and to welcome the continuity of community that exists between Old Brentwoods and current students. We have all drunk from the fountain and swim in the same river."

Councils agree to share more services

Brentwood Council will soon be entering into Ba shared agreement with Basildon Council to manage the delivery of housing stock repairs and maintenance services.

The decision follows the successful shared revenues and benefits service agreement which has been in place since December 2014. The latest shared service agreement will provide an opportunity for both local authorities to exchange skills and expertise.

Councillor Gavin Callaghan, chairman of Basildon Council's policy and resources committee, said: "Brentwood Council shares our vision to collaboratively

deliver quality front and back office services, and as pressure on local government resources increases it is even more crucial that we develop efficient and innovative approaches.

"Brentwood Council has been looking for a managed housing service to offer support and meet its gaps in expertise, and working with us - instead of outsourcing the service - will reduce costs and drive continuous improvement.

"Any income generated, as a result of the shared service agreement, will be paid back into the wider public purse for the benefit of residents."







Man thanks people who saved his life

Aman thanked the men and women from the East of England Ambulance Service (EEAST), Essex and Herts Air Ambulance and the Essex County Fire and rescue service who saved his life after falling into cardiac arrest recently.

Brian Abbott was on his way to Thriftwood Scout Camp in Brentwood with his two friends Steve and Ray on the day of the incident.

Brian informed his friends that he felt sick and should no longer drive. A few moments later, Brian's condition began to deteriorate.

His friends made the life-saving decision to turn off and head to Orsett Fire Station. When they arrived Brian had no pulse, and he was not breathing.

With all fire crew out on risk visits, Ros Heapy, station cleaner for 20 years, answered the door and informed them that there was a team of paramedics out.

Martin Cross and his Hazardous Area Response Team (HART) colleagues had all been training at the station and were just about to leave. Brian was immediately given CPR via a machine called LUCAS. In an attempt to get Brian's heart to beat normally he was given the emergency resuscitation drugs carried by road crews and shocked using a defibrillator on several occasions without success.

As a last resort to save Brian's life, the team applied two shocks at the same time. This was successfully performed, and Brian's heart started to beat again on its own. Still critically ill, he was transferred to the Basildon Cardio-Thoracic Unit where they diagnosed him with blocked arteries which were unblocked using three stents.

On March 26, Adam Eckley, chief fire officer for Essex County Fire and Rescue Service, hosted an event to formally recognise the skill and professionalism of all those involved in Brian's care, at Orsett Fire Station.

Brian's friend Ray said: "From the moment we arrived I witnessed all that is good with the NHS in action. I was amazed by the teamwork and organisation of the emergency service."

Gender pay gap for council workers revealed

Brentwood Borough Council has announced that there is a 1.49 per cent gender pay gap in the top 25 per cent of salaries at the council.

Women employees at the council get on average 3.75 per cent higher hourly rate pay than men. This is due to the council having a high proportion of women in office and administration roles.

Brentwood Borough Council leader, cllr Louise McKinlay, said: "Brentwood is a shining light countrywide for establishing near parity of income for women and men and I am immensely proud of this achievement.

"We lead by example, yet there are places in Britain where women are still woefully underpaid compared to men. The Office of National Statistics says women earn on average 9.1 per cent less than men and in some places this is as high as 49 per cent less for women than men.

"Brentwood is clearly way ahead of the equality game here, so I would encourage companies struggling with large gender pay gaps to come and look at our example.

"Women working in Brentwood have assurance that their work is being rewarded within a hair's breadth of their male counterparts' rate. However, I look forward to the day when reward comes from goals achieved within the workplace regardless of gender, age, race or any other discrimination."

German attacks from the skies in the Great War led to aircraft bases being established in Essex, including at Rochford, Stow Maries and, in this constituency, North Weald. When Zeppelins or Gotha bombers were seen approaching the coast, calls were made to the Essex flight bases and various home defence biplanes were scrambled.

North Weald's airfield came back into service in the Second World War. Its Great War hangars and buildings were developed to house the 56 (R) Squadron and its aircraft - I have been delighted to hear that the squadron is going to be given the Freedom of Epping Forest District at a ceremony in June this year.

If we think, in 2018, that the prospect of driverless cars on our roads is almost unbelievable, it's hard to comprehend what North Weald's residents must have felt about spindly biplanes flying over their heads in 1918. It had taken just over a decade from Orville and Wilbur Wright's first hesitant flight in 1903 to single engine propeller planes rising to fight in the skies over Essex. The planes, made of wood, canvas cloth and wire, were fragile and difficult to fly and so the average life-expectancy rate for a Great War pilot was about two weeks.

If you want to see what life was like for those first pilots and crew, visit the Stow Maries Great War Aerodrome, just outside Maldon, which was returned to farmland after the Great War, leaving the various buildings built for the Royal Flying Corps intact. Essex County Council and Maldon District Council bought the land in 2009 and this wonderfully evocative piece of RAF history is now being sympathetically conserved and restored.

One of those who worked there in the First World War was William George Medley, who grew up in Shenfield. He worked at the Brentwood munitions factory before signing up with the Royal Flying Corps as a mechanic and driver in 1917. He survived the war and lived to a good age, dying in Brentwood in 1983 - but his memory, and that of his extraordinary generation, lives on among the buildings and biplanes of Stow Maries. "We trust that people will respect our privacy in this time of grief." Terrance is pictured with his sons and daughters.

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

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Street Pastors continue to patrol the town centres of Brentwood and Billericay every Friday and Saturday night.

At the moment we are heavily into our training cycle. We train all our volunteers in a number of subjects to stay relevant to the issues that are impacting our communities. We also stay up to date with current affairs that affect us locally like the planned increase in housing, changes in licensing hours, any crime issues and stories of public unrest or confusion.

We fully support the work of the local Samaritans as they help us train for patrol on the rail lines and also support people with longer-term issues around heath and wellbeing and will continue to listen and care after any suicidal thoughts have lessened.

We are very excited to be launching Schools Pastors later this year and hope to be able to use this mode into our secondary schools. Again, we will train and equip our volunteers to be appropriate and support the local school in its ambitions and also to offer pastoral support which sometimes get squeezed when finances are tight. We are also part of the National Curriculum in that we are part of Religious Education modules to show how the local church cares for the community. I had the opportunity of sharing with eight Year 9 classes at Mayflower School this term about us and our values and it seemed to go down well.

We have also started our Rail Pastor patrols on the GA route between Shenfield and Colchester. We are hoping to build up relationships with anyone who uses the rail network and hope that we can help in any intervention work that may be able to save a life.

eghan Markle's wedding bouquet is certain to contain a sprig of myrtle, a tradition for royal brides dating back to 1840 when Queen Victoria married Prince Albert. The myrtle for royal brides is almost always cut from a bush at Osborne House, Queen Victoria's residence on the Isle of Wight. Myrtle symbolises hope and love.

Meghan and Prince Harry have chosen to work with London-based florist Philippa Craddock. For arrangements in St George's Chapel and St George's Hall, she will be using branches of beech. birch and hornbeam, along with white garden roses, peonies and foxgloves.

There is speculation that Meghan will pay a tribute to her late mother-in-law Princess Diana with her bouquet as the Duchess of Cambridge did in 2011.

While Catherine's small, simple bouquet served as a stark contrast to Diana's enormous cascading collection of blooms, both featured lilv of the valley. Other British royal brides who have incorporated the local flower in their bouquets are Princess Margaret in 1960, Princess Anne in 1973, and Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall, when she wed Prince Charles in 2005.

Meghan is also expected to carry peonies down the aisle. They are said to be her favourite flower as are roses. But royal bouquets tend to be white.

For her marriage to Prince Philip, the then Princess Elizabeth had chosen an allwhite, free flowing wedding bouquet. It included three types of rather exotic looking orchids: cattleva, cyripedium and odontoglossum - all British-grown - and of course myrtle.

Following their weddings, it is also customary for royal brides to leave their bouquets on the grave of the unknown warrior in Westminster Abbey, a sombre tradition that was started by the Queen Mother in 1923, who left her flowers on the memorial in honour of her brother Fergus, who was killed in the First World War I in 1915.

While Meghan and Harry will be married at St George's Chapel, not Westminster Abbey, she will likely still send her bouquet to the church, following in the footsteps of Sophie Rhys-Jones, who wed Prince Edward at the chapel back in 1999.

How to make:


- [&] Lay down some newspaper or an old sheet to protect your floor.

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British icon Dame Helen Mirren reveals her thoughts on ageing, her inability to resist a juicy role and why you should never call her a movie star,

> here's no stopping Dame Helen Mirren. Smart, sexy, and outspoken, the actress is still revelling in the career renaissance that began at age 46 when she began playing *Prime Suspect's* DCI Jane Tennison. Born in London to an English mother and Russian father, Mirren has long been a feminist trailblazer who occupies iconic status today among Hollywood's hopeful young starlets.

Her performances have inspired generations of women - distinguished by a palpable intelligence and steely determination whether playing a military commander (*Eye in the Sky*), royalty (*The Queen*), or a Mossad agent (*The Debt*). If ever there was an archetype of an actress suited to playing strong women, it would be her.

Currently, the formidable and iconic actress is appearing in *The Leisure Seeker*, directed by acclaimed Italian filmmaker Paolo Virzi, and co-starring Donald Sutherland. A compelling romance that depicts the interactions between a woman with terminal cancer and her husband, who's suffering from Alzheimer's. And while the elegant star undoubtedly looks fantastic for her 72 years, she is characteristically candid about the inevitable pitfalls of ageing. "If I have to be honest, there is nothing that pleasant about growing old. You learn to accept your age and all the faults that come with it and you console yourself by believing you are wiser," Mirren says sagely.

"When you're a teenager it seems impossible to think of becoming old. But then you learn to accept it and renounce many things that seemed so important before, like plunging necklines and miniskirts," she adds with a laugh.

Over the years, her sharp wit, cutting humour and boundless talent have earned her 'national treasure' status. Mirren is also incredibly humble, and despite her extensive back catalogue and slew of awards, she refutes the suggestion of being a 'movie star'. "No, I've never thought of myself as that, never considered myself anything close. I'm a working actress, who's been fortunate and lucky, and sometimes the stars align in a certain way," she says, firmly.

Her life off-camera is also admirably straightforward. Mirren has never had children, stating in the past that she has "no maternal instinct whatsoever", and has spent the past 32 years together with Hollywood director Taylor Hackford (*Ray, An Officer and a Gentleman*). They were married in 1997 and currently divide their time between homes in Los Angeles and the village of Tiggiano in Puglia, Italy.

Even she admits it would be easy at this point to while away the days soaking up the wonders of Italy, but unfortunately for Mirren, she has one terrible weakness. "I can never find the willpower to say 'no' to a very good part when one comes along," she confesses.

"I often tell my husband, 'I've done enough, I'm not going to keep pushing myself.' But he's so used to hearing me say that he doesn't even pay attention to me anymore when I make that kind of a declaration. The terrible truth is that I simply cannot resist a good role."



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Prevent Meningitis and Chickenpox: Tips to protect your family May 2018

Following European Immunisation Week (23-29 April), Essex Private Doctors GP Dr Alice Scott has created this helpful guide to make sure you understand how you can tackle Chickenpox, Shingles and Meningitis B and take steps to protect your family.

Chickenpox

Chickenpox is a common childhood illness, caused by a virus called Varicella Zoster. It is very contagious and is spread by inhalation of the virus. It can also be caught from a person who has shingles.

The Chickenpox vaccination is available on the NHS to

people who regularly encounter those with a weakened immune system (such as health care workers). The vaccination is also available as a private vaccination to people who do not fall into the group of people eligible for it on the NHS.

Shingles

Once someone has had chickenpox, the virus hides in nerve cells and can then become reactivated later in life and cause shingles. It is estimated that one in five people who have had Chickenpox develop Shingles.

The Shingles vaccination is available on the NHS to people in their 70s but can be given as a private vaccination to people over the age of 50. If you are unlucky enough to have already had

Shingles, the vaccination can boost your immunity against further shingles attacks.

Meningitis B

Meningitis B most commonly affects young children below the age of five, especially babies under the age of one, with

a second peak in adolescents, but can affect people of any age.

The NHS childhood immunisation programme vaccinates children born after May 2015. Groups more vulnerable to infection are also eligible for vaccination on the NHS. The Meningitis vaccination is available as a private vaccination to people who do not fall into the group of people eligible for it on the NHS.

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ay fever sufferers rejoice. We have some great tips for helping you survive the season; and yes, you can even go outside.

Keep an eye on the pollen count

Warm and dry days generally have a higher pollen count, whereas thanks to the rain washing pollen out the air, wetter days have less. So, keep an eye on pollen forecasts and stay indoors as much as possible when it's really high. Certain times of day also bring about an increase in pollen, usually early morning (7am to 10am) and late afternoon (4pm to 7pm).

Protect yourself when outside

You can't live like a hermit just because the sun is out, so apply barrier balm around your nostrils (Vaseline works too), and buy a peaked hat and some wraparound shades.

Remove allergens daily

Hay fever sufferers know that feeling of being bombarded by pollen, and unfortunately there is no way of stopping it getting to you entirely. Saline spray is a really effective way to wash out all the allergens clinging to your nostrils, so carry one with you. Showering (including hair) and changing your clothes when you get home on high pollen day also helps.

PROOF

Protect your home

Keeping windows closed on high pollen days is an obvious place to start, but pollen can also sneak in on pets that have been outside, and line-dried clothes. So, avoid snuggling up to poochie, and buy an indoor drying rack.

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Zimit time in the city

Despite usually having a lower pollen count than the countryside, all the pollution in urban areas irritates your respiratory tract, making it harder to cope with other allergens.

If all else fails, head to the seaside

Not that you need another excuse for that weekend in Southend, but you'll be pleased to know that the sea breeze blows pollen inland, making seaside resorts a veritable paradise for hay fever sufferers.



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HOW TO CHOOSE THE RIGHT PET FOR YOUR HOME

A LOOK AT THE CAKES OF ROYAL WEDDINGS PAST

¹ rince Harry and his bride to be Meghan Markle have decided they don't want to get fruity on their wedding day and have bucked tradition of not having a traditional fruitcake.

Instead they have gone for a much more modern style - an organic lemon elderflower wedding cake.

The couple have turned to pastry chef and food writer Claire Ptak, below, owner of Violet Bakery in east London, to make the cake, which will be covered with buttercream and decorated with fresh flowers.

His brother Prince William and wife Catherine chose a multi-tiered fruit cake was made by baker Fiona Cairns, and while the decorations were pretty traditional - it featured edible flowers including an English rose, Scottish thistle, Welsh daffodil and Irish shamrock – they also had a chocolate biscuit cake by McVitie's.

Prince Charles has had two bites of the wedding cake. When he married Camilla in 2005, bakers Sophisticake from Lincolnshire had just four weeks' notice to bake one.

The finished cake weighed in at 17 stone, took around 130 hours to coat and decorate and was made with 20 bottles of brandy. The firm also had to make 2,500 additional slices to fill special commemorative tins.

For his wedding to Diana in 1981 the official wedding cake was a fruitcake with cream cheese frosting. It was five-foot high, weighed 18 stone and was made by David Avery, the head baker of the Naval Armed Forces.

McVitie and Price Ltd, using ingredients given as a wedding gift by the Australian Girl Guides Association, made the official wedding cake at the Queen's wedding.

It was an enormous, ornate affair and stood nine foot tall and was covered in intricately carved cathedral-like designs. It is said to have been cut using Prince Philip's sword. It even had its own nickname - the 10,000-mile wedding cake.

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Asparagusto

FIVE GREAT RECIPES FOR THE STAR OF THE SEASON, ASPARAGUS

Spring carbonara

While the traditional carbonara, with its rich, creamy sauce and fat cubes of pancetta, is delicious, you may want something a little lighter for spring. Made using the same classic cheese sauce (egg yolk, double cream, parmesan), you simply switch out the meat for lightly boiled peas and asparagus tips that have been fried with some crushed garlic. Magnifico.

Ribboned asparagus salad

Trim and wash your asparagus thoroughly before shaving with a potato peeler to create thin ribbons. Add cucumber, tomatoes, avocado and grated parmesan, before dressing with olive and lemon juice. Quite simply, spring in a bowl.

Asparagus and goat's cheese frittata

A hearty brunch or a light supper, a frittata is a great way to get a couple of your five-a-day while still feeling satisfied. Simply sauté 200g of sliced asparagus spears, before setting aside. Then, in a medium pan, fry three large eggs beaten with grated parmesan, and scatter your sliced spears and spoonfuls of soft goat's cheese on top. Cook through before serving with a green salad and an optional glass of white wine.

Asparagus and prosciutto parcels

These salty, creamy and flavoursome parcels make a great sidedish or starter for when you're feeling fancy. Start by blanching asparagus for two minutes before running under cold water. Layer four spears with slices of mozzarella and wrap with prosciutto before frying gently in a pan. Prosciutto should be crispy, mozzarella should be melty, and guests ought to be impressed.

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
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elations between Russia and the West are at such a low that we are now on the brink of a new cold war.

The poisoning of former Soviet spy Sergei Skripal, 66, and his 33-year-old daughter in Salisbury from the nerve agent Novichok has led to mass expulsions round the world of Russian diplomats.

Despite denials of the attack on March 4, Russia is firmly in the dock. Russia Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov has made the ludicrous suggestion that it was Britain itself that carried out the attack on the double agent because the UK Government has found itself in a difficult situation, unable to fulfil promises it made about Brexit.

There is a clear comparison of present-day tensions to the bitter ideological and military rivalry that existed between the Soviet Union and the West from the 1950s to the end of the 1980s.

One man who has vivid memories of those days

in the Sixties is Gary Powers Junior, 50, whose dad, also named Gary, was a pilot who worked for the CIA and who had been captured when his U2 spy plane had been shot down in 1960.

It was the catalyst for a nerve shredding two years when the world was brought to the brink of nuclear war.

The story was a central point in the film *Bridge* of *Spies* starring Tom Hanks as attorney James Donovan, the man who masterminded the spy swap which saw Gary return to the US.

The New York lawyer was the man who worked tirelessly behind the scenes as the fingers of US President John Kennedy and Russia's Nikita Khrushchev hovered over nuclear buttons during the Cuban crisis of 1962. It was the closet the two super-powers have ever come to war.

It was Donovan's negotiations which led to a dramatic peace deal.

He walked across a frost-covered bridge in Cold War Berlin. By his side was British-born KGB spy Rudolf Abel - a man ironically the lawyer had saved from the death penalty at his trial.

On the other side of the Glienicke Bridge in Berlin - the so-called Bridge of Spies, as other spy swaps would take place in later years, was Gary Powers.

Years after his father was shot down and captured there lingered the suspicion that he might have been a traitor who had deliberately crashed his plane. Gary Jnr was technical consultant on the film.

He says he was thrilled by the film.

"So much has been written and said about my father that has not been fair to him but this film does set the record straight," he said.

"The film shows that he was a hero to our country. Steven Spielberg has done a fantastic job and the family are thrilled with *Bridge of Spies*.

"Not only have they recaptured the Cold War

era perfectly, but he has been able to convey the tension and uncertainty that surrounded all those events."

Based on his father's diaries and talks they had before his death about the U2 incident, he was able to give the director and his team an accurate account of what took place.

On May 1, 1960 Powers took off from Peshawar in Pakistan for what he thought was a routine ninehour mission codenamed Grand Slam.

"Four hours into the flight a missile exploded near to the tail of the U2 as he flew over Sverdlovsk," said Gary.

In the spilt seconds Powers had to bail out he was unable to reach a self-destruct button that would have blown up the U2.

Almost two months after his capture he was convicted of spying and sentenced to 10 years in jail, including seven years' hard labour.

antas made history recently after they launched the first 17-hour non-stop flight from Perth to London Heathrow.

DIRE

The 14,498km service is now the fastest way to get to Australia – eliminating stops in the Middle East to re-fuel or change planes which can add hours to a journey.

The first flight, carrying more than 200 passengers and 16 members of crew, pushed back just before 7pm on Saturday, March 24 and landed in London at 5am the following day.

The flight reduces total travel time by removing stopovers and taking advantage of the winds when choosing a flight path.

Technology has come a long way, especially aviation. In 1947, it took four days and seven stops to travel from Australia to the UK with the original 'kangaroo route'. It also cost around \pounds 525 when the average wage was a mere \pounds 7.

Nowadays, the journey is both quicker and more



affordable with the average Australian weekly wage at \$1,600 and a return fare from Perth to London costing less than \$1,300.

Athletes competing at the Commonwealth Games would have had to set off days before they were due to compete just to complete the gruelling journey. But nowadays, they can hop on a plane and be at their destination within 24 hours.

In 1962, Prince Philip travelled to Perth to open the British Empire and Commonwealth Games. Travelling by boat, he set off several weeks before he was due to open the event.

The land down under is now easier to access than ever before. With the new development, tourist numbers are sure to increase with people from Britain taking advantage of the journey.



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

rolling in as thousands of visitors are expected to flock to the UK for the ceremony at St George's Chapel, Windsor, on May 19, while millions more around the world will watch on TV.
