11 You're better off dead" is a phrase never more appropriate than for a number of recording artists who have been richer since strolling through the Pearly Gates.

At the end of August, *NME* reported that Michael Jackson was earning more in death than he was when alive.

In the financial year ending 2017, the Michael Jackson estate took in over £60million through a variety of income streams, with merchandising and royalties making up the biggest proportion.

The fact an artist can prosper in death is, of course, not unusual. Firstly, when a notable name dies, in most cases so do a lot of the liabilities that have accompanied them – in Jackson's case it was debts of up to £400million and several lingering lawsuits regarding his music. The removal of these frees up more time for monetisation of the brand.

And of course, never is an artist more revered than in death, with waves of sympathy and sentimentality often translating into big bucks for those lucky enough to be a part of the deceased's estate. Take Jacko as an example - since the singer's death in June 2009, 27 albums and videos have been released in his name; add in singles and the total exceeds 60.

And in 2016, he accumulated revenues of almost \pounds 1 billion, much of which was from the sale of his half of the Sony/ATV catalogue. That total ranks as the most ever in a year for any entertainer, dead or alive.

The Jackson estate isn't alone in profiting from a singer's sad and untimely demise. Elvis Presley earned £30million in 2017 alone, Bob Marley over £20million – both comfortably more, in one year, than in a whole lifetime of performing; while Tom Petty brought in a similar amount.

In the coming years, we can expect Prince, David Bowie, George Michael, Whitney Houston and Aretha Franklin to begin to climb to similar levels, as those in charge of their estates monetise what, even in death, are iconic and much-loved artists.

Celebrities outside of the music industry are also raking it in. You would be forgiven for picturing Elizabeth Taylor bottling masses of her iconic White Diamonds fragrance – the range brings in over £8million a year, yet she passed away in 2011. And even Albert Einstein is earning years after his passing – his beneficiaries allowed his name to be used in 2017 by Israeli tech company Fourier Systems in exchange for a £9million bounty.

Yet in this cynical world, not all of those left behind are willing for their loved one's brand to be monetised. The estate of legendary country singer Johnny Cash were not willing to be 'bought' when haemorrhoid ointment producers Preparation H applied to use his *Ring of Fire* song in an advertising campaign. His family boomed back: "We would never allow the song to be demeaned like that. It is about the transformative power of love - that is what it will always mean to us."

Black History Month returns in October, and its value in modern Britain appears greater than ever in a period of real cultural conflict.

They say social conflict goes in waves, and whether the fallout from Grenfell, Brexit, Corbyn's anti-Semitism row or the MeToo furore that emanated across the other side of the Atlantic, we are enduring some of the tougher, more challenging times at present.

And yet, despite all of Britain's problems, our embracing of multiculturalism is worthy of true global acclaim. It is perhaps a very British thing to look in on ourselves and criticise, yet all around the UK in every single moment, we are forging new paths and embracing community initiatives.

That makes October's Black History Month all the more important, not just because it acts as a vibrant, colourful, artistic and, yes, at times, sombre reflection on the cultures who have enriched this nation, but also because in its very essence it invites people of every race and

skin colour to share in and celebrate the achievements of black culture – from the first footings on these shores with the Windrush generation, to everything since and so much more before.

The idea was first put forward in the UK by Ghanaian activist Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, who had served as a special projects coordinator for the GLC (Greater London Council) in 1987. His efforts to mark specifically the historical trials and achievements of black people was a new thing in this country, but its popularity quickly spread well beyond the capital.

Wind forward 31 years and while we, North America and, strangely, the Netherlands, celebrate Black History Month each year, globally, the take-up remains slow.

What better way then to let others sample a month of talks, initiatives, concerts, workshops and, of course, some quiet reflection, by showing them how the world's most diverse and multicultural society can express its gratitude and respect for our black herces of

days gone by.

Micro-homes, defined as properties 37 square metres, are becoming increasingly popular in the UK since the government introduced the new act in 2013 under the Permitted Development Rights.

So, are these homes the longawaited solution to the UK's housing crisis?

CHEAPER TO BUY

A smaller house means a smaller mortgage; so less debt, less tax to be paid and even a cheaper home insurance policy.

Alternatively, you could rent a micro-home at much less expense than a larger property.

SMALLER UTILITY BILLS

A smaller space means smaller rooms to heat, a smaller surface area to light and less space for electrical items to be plugged in. You could even consider having solar panels installed or collect rain water for garden use to save further.

LESS CONSUMERISM

If you have less square footage, you are more likely to think carefully about any

burchases you make that will need to be stored in your home. Instead, you can find ways to reuse and recycle existing possessions.

ENCOURAGES CREATIVITY

In order to prevent your microhome becoming cluttered, you will need to think creatively about how to utilise your space. Take some inspiration from George Clarke's Amazing Spaces.

LESS TIME SPENT RENOVATING

A smaller home takes less time to decorate, furnish and needs less upkeep. Also think of how many hours you will save cleaning. That's more time you can spend with your family doing things you enjoy.

REMEMBER YOU NEED A PLOT

If you are planning to build or purchase a micro-home, you will need a plot of land. You can register your interest with a land agent, look to an auction or search the web (Plotsearch and Rightmove are good places to start).

Alternatively, you could place your micro-home on a family or friend's land; but you will need planning permission.





If you're keen to enrich your home with some artistic excellence, start by following these simple rules:

1. ART IN FOCUS

Have a focal point in mind, so before you splash out on that Degas or Monet, know which wall it will hang on.

If you're using art to entertain, your statement pieces will usually be in high-traffic areas. Similarly, if you're looking for art as inspiration – perhaps for late night work or quiet Sunday contemplation, your chosen spot may be somewhere more private. Whatever the case, consider the area you have to play with – what size is it, how much sunlight does it have, what's already around it?

2. LESS IS USUALLY MORE

Just as the artist knows when to put the brush down, so too do you need to know when you have enough art in one space. Drown a small space with clutter and your cherished living quarters may well end up resembling something more akin to an art gallery, or worse, an antiques shop.

3. SIZE MATTERS

A statement piece of small art can have high impact on a big wall; whereas a large piece of pottery, for instance, can be allowed to dominate a limited space. There are no hard and fast rules, but consider the dimensions of whatever it is you're adding to a room before buying it.

4. MATCH, DON'T MIX

Be careful not to clash styles – contemporary with Art Nouveau, anyone? Post-minimalism with Baroque? Explore your creative fantasies, but letting different styles collide in the same space is a recipe for design disaster.

5. DON'T BUY WHAT YOU DON'T WANT

Only bring into your home art you are passionate about. If you have any lingering doubts, leave it behind, otherwise each time you look at it, you may encounter mixed emotions.

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ALL THAT GLITTERS ISN'T GOLD... ADD IN A BIT OF YELLOW TOO

or a long time, gold's reputation as an interior décor colour was anything but opulent - a generation of faux variants had left the world's most precious metal flagging rather. Yet its return, along with a resurgence of yellow, has opened up some fantastic new interior ideas.

But why are these particular colours making a comeback? Well, psychologists believe recent tough economic times meant we favour shades with positive psychological qualities. Yellow screams happiness, optimism and confidence for the future; gold is the colour of ambition, and more prosperous times ahead. What's not to like?

COMBINE WITH DARK TONES

Gold, in particular, radiates against very dark tones, and the contrast between the shimmer of gold and sheer darkness offers a classy touch. Yellow, similarly, can really fire against an offset colour – in this case, we'd recommend grey.

IT'S ALL IN THE ACCENT

Rather than layering colours over an existing space, a recent trend has been to offer various hints of colours that add warmth and light, with gold and yellow right at the front of the queue. So forget statement walls and instead replace pictures with gold frames; paint a desk chair, add a throw on a sofa, redo cushions and perhaps even replace a curtain pole with golden tones. Very quickly you'll be adding some class to a previously drab room.

MAKE A STATEMENT

Of course, nothing screams confidence like a statement wall or piece, and yellow is truly the colour of 2018 for this. A radiant wall, a sofa, even a contemporary picture that's big and bold on this summer shade, can draw the eye to a room and light it up instantly. Remember to offset with lampshades, seat covers or perhaps something as simple as a pot to reinforce your intentions.



HOW TO MAKE CANDLES

he arrival of autumn creates the need to feel warm, cosy and comforted in preparation for the harsh winter that lies ahead. What better way to achieve this than with an array of homemade, fall-scented candles?

WHAT YOU WILL NEED

- A selection of glass jars (mason jars work well)
 Wick
- 1 x cup of beeswax
- 1 x cup of coconut oil
- 1 tablespoon of your preferred spices

This amount makes roughly one pint of candle mixture.

HOW TO MAKE

- 1. Place an individual wick in each jar
- 2. Tape the wick to the bottom of the jar
- **3.** Take the top of the wick and wrap around a pencil and place back in the centre of the jar

4. Melt the beeswax, coconut oil and your chosen spices together in a separate jar above a pan of boiling water (the same process as when you melt chocolate)

5. Remember you want to melt the ingredients, not boil them together

6. Stir with a spoon as the mixture melts

7. Once melted, pour a small amount into each glass jar and wait to set (this will help the wick stick to the bottom)

8. Pour in more mixture until the jar is sufficiently full

9. Wait for the wax to harden

10. Light your scented candles and enjoy the aroma of autumn throughout your home

Spice combinations we love include pumpkin pie spice (cinnamon, ginger, allspice and cloves) and apple pie spice (cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice).

Alternatively, you could add vanilla, chocolate or coffee essence depending on the mood you want to create your personal preferences.

Dog warning after six foot boa constrictor spotted

Dog walkers have been advised to keep their pets on a lead after a boa constrictor was spotted in the Norsey Wood nature reserve near Billericay.

The animal, thought to be someone's pet, is not dangerous to humans but posters put up by Basildon Council warn owners of small dogs to keep them on a lead.

The poster features a picture of a boa constrictor – in the Norsev Wood nature reserve near Billericav after a woman reported seeing the snake.

Daniel Hepplewhite, a reptile expert from Snakes

Alive, said the reptile was unlikely to attack dogs. He said: "It will be more interested in squirrels. It's an arboreal species, so it's probably up a tree.

"A lady phoned up a few weeks ago saying she saw a snake heading into the woods and she sent a picture, which is the picture used by the council."

It is thought the boa constrictor would struggle to survive a British winter.

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Council announces WWI commemoration plans



The centenary of the end of the First World War will be commemorated by Billericay Town Council next month.

The town council will mark the centenary by purchasing two There But Not There lifesize Tommy silhouettes to place at the war memorial in the High Street.

The town council plans to place them at the memorial each November going forward

as a mark of respect and remembrance for all those men and women who have lost their lives whilst serving in the forces.

The illumination of the war memorial is being provided free of charge by a local company but they are unable to connect to an electricity supply from the nearest lamp column. This has to be undertaken by an ECC approved contractor and is costing in the region of £1,500. News from the policing team

The Basildon Community Policing team have responded to reports of antisocial behaviour across Billericay.

Inspector Steve Parry said: "Operation Quiet was set up over the summer to tackle youth-related antisocial behaviour and the team have focussed on areas raised by Billericay residents including Lake Meadows, South Green and Outward Common Road. Patrolling in both uniform and in plain clothes the team have seen some positive results and a reduction in antisocial behaviour."

Working alongside Basildon District Council a joint taxi licensing operation took place, ensuring that those operating within the district were doing

so lawfully. A number of vehicles were stopped by the police during the operation, with the council also using Test Purchase tactics to ensure compliance. As part of the operation practical crime prevention advice was provided to members of the public around the dangers of 'unlicensed' taxi operators.

Public engagement has continued to develop, with successful Coffee with Cops meetings and streetbased activities including a pedal cycle security marking event, providing fantastic opportunities to gain feedback around the issues faced by Billericay residents.

Pool left with sinking feeling following fire

Lessons at a Billericay swimming pool have been put on hold after a fire caused significant damage.

A fire took hold at First Strokes swimming pool in the early hours of September 5 with two fire engines attending after flames broke out in the changing rooms.

Investigations were complete within a week as a forensic report of the cause was sent to insurers.

A spokesperson at First Strokes said: "We are now assessing the damage and it looks like we may be closed for the foreseeable future.

"We have had forensics in the centre yesterday and all investigations are now over. The report from this investigation is now being sent to the insurance company of Basildon Council and also the loss adjuster, who will then advise us on what the next move is.

"We will need a specialist cleaning team to come in and clean the centre from top to bottom which we will try to arrange as soon as we can."

Essex County Fire and Rescue Service released the following statement: "Fire crews quickly extinguished the fire and had left the scene by 7am. "The cause of the fire has been recorded as accidental – due to a possible electrical fault."



Billericay appoint Dean Brennan as manager

Brennan had been in charge of Hemel Hempstead Town since 2012 and led them to the Southern League Premier Division title in 2014, winning by 10 clear points.

The following season he took The Tudors to the 1st Round of the FA Cup but lost 3-1 at Bury.

As a player, Brennan came through the youth system at Sheffield Wednesday but made his league debut for Luton Town. He moved to Hitchin Town and then Stevenage Borough. He first became involved with Hemel Hempstead Town as a player in 2007 and was appointed as caretaker manager three years later. He was given the job permanently in 2012.

News of Brennan's appointment came only days after former Billericay manager Harry Wheeler parted ways

with the club, who currently sit in second place in the Vanarama National League South, having won six games out of 10 so far this season.

Club owner Glenn Tamplin took to Twitter to express his delight in the appointment of Brennan, whose assistant from Hemel, Stuart Mavnard, has also ioined the staff.

Tamplin said: "Welcome aboard Dean. He and his team have some big plans for the club focusing on success with sustainability in mind, really happy to have him on board."

Hemel FC, who sit in 15th at the time of writing. said in a statement: "Dean and Stuart led Hemel Hempstead Town to the Southern League title and last season achieved the club's highest ever league position, qualifying for the National Conference South plavoffs.

"Dean and Stuart leave with the very best wishes and thanks of all the officials of Hemel Hempstead Town FC."

Elizabeth line opening delayed

The Elizabeth line, from Reading and Heathrow in the west to Shenfield and Abbey Wood in the east, will open through central London in autumn 2019, a delay of almost a year.

Crossrail, which is behind the project, says the delay will allow engineers to complete the final infrastructure and carry out extensive testing to ensure the Elizabeth line opens as a safe and reliable railway.

The focus remains on opening the full Elizabeth line, as soon after the central tunnels open as possible.

Simon Wright, Crossrail chief executive, said: "The Elizabeth line is one of the most complex and challenging infrastructure projects ever undertaken in the UK and is now in its final stages. We have made huge progress with the delivery of this incredible project but we need further time to complete the testing of the new railway. We are working around the clock with our supply chain and Transport for London to complete and commission the Elizabeth line."

The new Elizabeth line trains are already operating between Shenfield and Liverpool Street (mainline station) and between Paddington (mainline station) and Hayes & Harlington, in readiness for the full opening. The trains are also being tested in the Heathrow tunnels. Construction activity is drawing to a close including the completion of the remaining architectural fit-out in the new central section stations. When the central section of the Elizabeth line opens in autumn 2019, the railway will initially operate as three separate services as planned including Liverpool Street to Shenfield.

High speed chase ends in double arrest

wo men have been arrested in Shenfield following a 50-mile police chase.

A 31-year-old and a 34-year-old have been arrested after officers pursued the vehicle from Tendering, near Weeley.

The chase along the A12 to Shenfield ended in York Road where more than 10 police cars brought an end to the chase. Essex Police also utilised their helicopter for the high speed pursuit as officers swarmed York Road after being forced to close the A12 in a bid to halt the Volkswagen.

Once police had caught up with the two men they were arrested on suspicion of aggravated taking of a motor vehicle without consent, failing to stop for a police officer and dangerous driving.

September's Blood Cancer Awareness Month saw Several constituents get in touch about how their lives have been affected by blood cancer, and ask for me to encourage more people to register as stem cell donors. Although it does not get as much publicity as other cancers, blood cancer is the fifth most common type of cancer in the UK and the third biggest cancer killer. It accounts for nine per cent of all new cases of cancer diagnosed in the UK.

Brentwood and Ongar ranks 295th out of the 650 constituencies for the number of stem cell donors, compared with other constituencies, wither 1,012 local people on the register. Of these, 40 per cent of the potential donors are male, with an average age of 38.

However, there's always need for more donors for the register. Blood cancer charity Anthony Nolan is particularly keen to see men aged 16-30 and people from black, Asian and ethnic minority backgrounds to register as stem cell donors and make sure that a match is available for everyone in need of a transplant.

While anyone on the register could be a match for someone with blood cancer, men aged 16-30 are most likely to be asked to donate. They provide more than 50 per cent of donations yet make up just 16 per cent of the register. There is also a shortage of donors from non-white and mixed-race backgrounds.

In total, more than 700,000 people in the UK are on the Anthony Nolan register, any of whom could be a match for someone with blood cancer. If a patient has a condition that affects their bone marrow or blood, then a stem cell transplant may be their best chance of survival. Doctors will give new, healthy stem cells from donors to the patient via their bloodstream, where they begin to grow and create healthy red blood cells, white blood cells and platelets.

I am very proud of the number of people in Brentwood and Ongar who have selflessly volunteered to give someone a second chance at life. Donating stem cells is straightforward but it could make an enormous difference to someone with no other chance of a cure.

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


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Around 70% of homes in the UK incorporate a mineral felt flat roof.

Mineral felt generally has a slow breakdown often allowing water ingress to cause unnecessary damage before anything can be visibly detected within the home.

A failing roof & the warning signs – look for signs of cracking around the roof edge, pipes, upstands and roof lights etc. Beware of blisters on the roof surface, during colder months they can become brittle and crack. Felt will attract moss and algae further degrading the roof surface.

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ESSENTIAL PREPARATION FOR EXTERNOR WOOD

he British weather can be unpredictable; who'd have thought that we would have such a hot summer, so goodness knows what winter has in store for us.

Wood's worst enemy is water. With mould and mildew not far behind. Save yourself a lot of bother come next spring and give your exterior wood some much-needed TLC ahead of the long wintry months.

PREPARATION IS KEY

Ensure that you wash all exterior wood prior to treating. Soap and water is perfectly adequate for cleaning your wood, just be sure to rinse thoroughly and let all surfaces completely dry before applying any wood treatment. Do not use anything too abrasive for cleaning as this can damage the wood.

CHECK FOR MILDEW

Mildew can be identified by little black specks on the surface of wood. If you are unsure whether or not your wood has mildew, apply a dab of bleach to one of the black spots. If it lightens in colour, then it is definitely mildew.

CHOOSE A PRODUCT THAT IS WATERPROOF

It is essential that you choose a wood treatment that is waterproof as this helps prevent fungus and mould from developing. Good quality wood treatments will also allow your wood to breathe whilst providing strong protection against the elements.

CLEAR THE AREA OF DEBRIS

Although you may not want to carry out garden maintenance once the cold weather sets in, it is important to regularly clear any exterior wood areas of any build-up of leaves. If left, piles of leaves can result in mould and damp. Be sure to check in between gaps in wood such as on the decking.

NB: Wood treatments can break down in harsh weather, so check sporadically, sand down and reapply if needed.

THE PASO DOBLE

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t's known the world over as a symbol of Australia, but what is the history behind the incredible natural landmark also known as Avers Rock?

Jutting up 348m above the barren landscape of Australia's Northern Territory – with an even larger portion of its mighty sandstone hulk concealed beneath the rocky ground - the vastness of the natural structure known to the Aborigines as Uluru has become as synonymous in our impressions of life 'down under' as kangaroos, the Sydney Opera House and cricket.

Now classified as a World Heritage site, the rock is situated 335km south-west of Alice Springs - or 440km by road, about five hours – and is served by the small resort town of Yulara. This is where tourists stay, and most people spend the night either in hotel accommodation or camping: there are no actual camping or other facilities within the Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park.

Recent years have seen the Australian government give back control to the Aboriginal peoples for whom the rock represents a spiritual place. Though most Westerners know of Ayers Rock - so called in the 1970s after then South Australia chief secretary Henry Ayers - Aboriginal tribes were living in the area over 10,000 years ago, and now the Pitjantjatjara people own the land around the giant stone monolith.

Visitors can climb the terracotta face of the rock to reach the summit, although this practice was often criticised for both the disrespect it showed towards the Aborigines' reverence of the structure and the damage it was doing to the stone itself. The Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park board of management has announced that tourists will be banned from climbing Uluru from October 2019... so you have a year left. Tourists can still explore the 10km of roads and trails that surround Uluru's base, and are encouraged to visit during sunrise or sunset to really capture a glimpse of this unique stone at its breathtaking best.

PUMPKIN PIE

DRINK Right around this time of year the shops are brimming with pumpkin spiced delights, from lattes to biscuits and even candles. This 'spice' is what makes pumpkin pie such a delectable seasonal treat - a combination of cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, cloves and allspice, it is warming and comforting. And when mixed with puréed pumpkin flesh, sugar, eggs, butter and milk and baked in a pie crust (store bought if necessary) you basically end up with autumn on a plate.

ROASTED SEEDS

When carving your jack-o'-lantern this year, don't discard that mound of seeds that sits snugly inside, as they are packed with nutrients and can make a delicious snack. Simply scoop out your seeds and separate them from the stringy flesh before rinsing thoroughly in a sieve.

Now they still won't look quite like the seeds you buy in a supermarket, but that's because they need to be roasted, so preheat your oven and toss them into a bowl with either a sweet mix (cinnamon and sugar) or savoury (chilli powder, soy sauce and garlic powder) melted butter and a little salt, before roasting in the oven. Just be sure to check them regularly (so they don't burn) and toss regularly.

CURRY

Mallowe'en pumpkin leftovers

You don't have to be a vegetarian to enjoy a pumpkin and chickpea curry, the ideal dish to warm up 'trick or treaters' on a chilly Hallowe'en night. Start by frying yellow curry paste with onion and lemongrass, then add chunks of pumpkin flesh followed by vegetable stock and coconut milk. Simmer before adding a tin of drained chick peas, cook for 10 minutes more, then serve over rice. Spookily good grub.

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SOMETHING SMELLS

If you're a lover of seafood wrapped in rice Japanese-style, be warned: by 2050, there's a good chance that climate change will have ruined this delicate culinary delight for good.

Www.ith its seaweed covering, sticky rice interior and sliver of raw fish, sushi has exploded from out of Japan to become a worldwide food craze. But for all those people who love to dine on dragon rolls and uramaki during a work lunch, there's trouble ahead with climate change set to impact on the sea's fish population.

As the world's seas get warmer, and the water becomes more acidic, life in the ocean is going to get a lot tougher for the vast majority of creatures we like to wrap in rice and wolf down with wasabi. Add to that the perils of overfishing and habitat destruction, and the future of sushi looks bleak.

Take coral bleaching, for example. Although the majority of us have an inkling of the mass demolition of the world's reefs, it's a pretty abstract idea to anyone who doesn't spend their time diving in their bountiful fish havens. And while the sushi industry has little need for the brightlycoloured critters that cling to reefs in computer screensavers and travel agent ads, the fish sushi chefs are after – bluefin tuna or mackerel, for example – are at the top of the food chain and therefore rely on reefs as their food source.

CASED CARSON

Great Britain is currently battling the French to finalise a deal to stop the scallop wars in the English Channel. A ban was put on French fishermen from catching scallops between May 15 and October 1 to conserve stocks, but the British aren't subject to the ban. New tensions are also rising as Cornish fishermen have accused the French of deliberately sabotaging their crab pots. Both food wars will cost fishermen hundreds of thousands of pounds.

Already in Japan, fish that was readily available some years ago, such as the yellow croaker, is now a delicacy – and with one recent bluefin tuna being sold at market for around $\pounds 60,000$ it seems that what was once abundant is fast becoming a very expensive culinary choice.

The alternative? For chefs to start using surimi – a processed form of fish that you find in supermarkets labelled as artificial crab or similar. Some have even looked to incorporating more vegan options into their food, or experimenting with insect-based sushi. And that, compared to a nice piece of nigiri or a tasty morsel of traditional temaki, is for many people a disheartening prospect indeed.



ANNUITIES

When you retire, you can choose to take some or all of your pension pot as an annuity, an insurance product that provides a guaranteed income for life. Unlike other retirement income products, and with the exception of investment-linked annuities, you aren't exposed to stock market risk which could erode your income. On the downside, should you die early, the residual value of the annuity dies with you; there is usually no return of capital to your estate.

DRAWDOWN

With income drawdown, you take a retirement income direct from your pension pot while leaving the rest of the cash invested, providing an opportunity for future growth. There is no minimum amount for drawdown,



HISTORY OF THE BREATHALYSER

t's the gadget most of us have dreaded at some point, yet as we pass the half-century mark of the Road Traffic Act – which introduced the first legally enforceable maximum blood alcohol level for drivers in the UK – we must credit the simple breathalyser as being one of the road's greatest lifesavers.

When inventor Robert Frank Borkenstein finally gained a registered trademark for his breathalyser invention in 1954, little did he know the gadget would still be going strong all these years later.

Previous incarnations of a piece of kit that, simply, measures blood alcohol levels, had been about for a few decades, with Chicago chemist William

Duncan McNally discovering in 1927 that the breath moving through chemicals in water would cause it to change colour.

Slightly more rustic detection devices were still being used around the period, including here in the UK where we were asking motorists to blow into football bladders, while in the States the attractively named drunkometer was snaring drivers from the early 1930s.

There remains a slight margin of error where breathalysers are concerned – the only way to get a proper gauge whether someone is over limit is via a blood test – yet it's still not the kind of

technology you can fool. And with good reason - after all, over a quarter of all fatal road crashes in the UK have alcohol at their source.


The myths of sucking on a coin, chewing gum or drinking mouthwash to produce a decreased reading have all been debunked, and the only way you can guarantee not getting yourself a driving ban, or worse, is to keep off the booze...

or catch the bus.

And if you're in any way uncertain – for instance, on the morning after a couple of drinks the night before – there are an array of cheap, effective, homemade kits that will help ensure you keep on the right side of the law... and the road.

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ENGLAND LEGEND ALASTAIR COOK RETIRES FROM INTERNATIONAL CRICKET

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The polish may have worn thin after a string of under-par performances, but upon retirement from Test cricket, Alastair Cook's place as one of the modern batting greats in the world game is without question.

Having made his Test debut against India in March 2006, it was perhaps fitting that 33-year-old Cook should conclude matters against the same nation some 12 years later, in between scoring 12,472 runs, including 33 centuries and 57 half-centuries, as well as accumulating an incredible 158 consecutive Test appearances, and 161 in total.

"You know when the time is right to go," said Cook, after an emotional farewell at The Oval, during which his second innings of 147 runs saw him become the fifth highest Test run scorer of all time. "I will take away from cricket some incredible memories and this is a sport that has really defined me as a person, but it's now time to do something different."

Cook, who even has a much less discussed but equally impressive bowling average of seven – admittedly he's only ever bowled three overs and dismissed one batsman – will take time away from the sport this winter to be with wife Alice and daughters Elsie and Isabelle. Yet his decision to retire from England duty doesn't mean he'll never pick up a bat again – he's contracted to Essex Cricket Club and will be keen to spearhead his county's Division One title charge next season.

And on those quiet afternoons in the field, he can look back fondly on a raft of memories – from hitting 294 against India at Edgbaston in 2011 to captaining England to away Ashes success in Australia, to how he might plot a route out of retirement and back into the fold...

"No, that won't happen," he laughs. "My time is done and now I can watch others stand at a crease for seven hours with Exocet missiles being aimed at their heads."

an anyone pack a punch like Anthony Joshua? We're going to find out, with AJ, seemingly, six months from boxing folklore.

For just a second, we were worried about our newest boxing hero. Two rounds into Anthony Joshua's latest multiple world title defence, Russian veteran Alexander Povetkin caucht the Watford-born hardman with a succession of blows. Blood poured from

the nose of the 28-year-old as he staggered to regain both his feet and his composure.

And yet, true champions are often constructed not just on their achievements, but their setbacks too, and after losing the first two rounds of a packed 85,000-sell-out Wembley Stadium contest, AJ eased effortlessly into a mindset of power, precision and no small amount of patience. Povetkin tired, and in the seventh round Joshua delivered a devastating succession of punches that saw his opponent floored, and subsequently defeated for only the second time in his life.

"I'm still learning, I'm getting there," said AJ. "I'm not making claims but I deserve some credit." He's quite correct in that – to already hold the WBA, IBF, WBO and IBO proves a sumptuous array of victorious sporting provess. "I know I can go much further – just line up my opponents and I will prove it," he postured.

And yet, now the real posturing begins. It looks as though unbeaten American WBC champ Deontay Wilder will be next up, with April 13 the date on everyone's lips. Joshua wants to prove, beyond doubt, that he can take care of anyone, and the WBC belt remains the last to be won. What we're left to ponder is this: is strapping, humble, 6ft 6" Joshua the finished product? No. Is he unbeatable? No. But is he the best boxer in the world? All the evidence suggests so, and in April – whether he's fighting Wilder, Tyson Fury, Dillian Whyte or anyone else – the sensible money says he'll prove it.
