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BRAVERY OF THE MUM WHO SAVED ANOTHER MOTHER'S SON FROM THE NAZIS and paid with her life

to his double life.

ouisa Gould was one of those people who lived an ordinary life at an extraordinary time and became a heroine defying the Nazi regime through her humanity.

The middle-aged general storekeeper was a widow who lived on the Island of Jersey, which was occupied by the Germans in WWII.

Her story became known after Jersey was liberated on May 9, 1945.

In 1942 she was still mourning the death of her son Edward who had been killed while serving with the Royal Navy in the Mediterranean a year earlier.

Also on the island was a Russian pilot, now a prisoner of war, Feodor Burriy. He tried to escape on three occasions. He was recaptured twice and tortured by the Germans.

On his third attempt he ended up at Louisa's door, and still reeling from the loss of her son, took him in, in a barefaced act of defiance against the Nazi occupation.

She hid him in her house in Millais in the northwest of the Island for almost two years.

She gave Burriy a room, changed his name to Bill and altered her son's clothes to fit him. She also gave him a fake ID and taught him English, but with a French accent, so the occupying forces would not think he was Russian. They settled on a cover story that Bill was a nephew, or friend of the family. "I have to do something to help another mother's son," she reasoned.

Now her amazing story is getting a wider audience with the release of a new film, *Another Mother's Son*, starring Jenny Seagrove as Louisa and ex Boyzone lead singer Ronan

Keating as Louisa's brother, Harold Le Druillenec.

Amanda Abbington plays Louisa's sister lvy.

Months passed, and Bill became accustomed

But 20 months after his arrival, someone informed the Germans that Louisa was harbouring a Russian.

Louisa had just enough time to move Bill to a safe house. But during a search of her property a Russian-English dictionary, a Christmas gift tag bearing his Russian name and a wireless were found; she was sentenced to two years in prison, and taken by cattle truck to Germany's Ravensbrück concentration camp – a place from which she would not return. In February 1945, she was sent to a gas chamber, aged 53. The camp would be liberated eight weeks later.

Harold, was sent to Belsen, and was the only known British survivor of the notorious concentration camp.

lvy was also arrested, but survived after escaping deportation because a doctor at the Jersey General Hospital forged papers saying she was not well enough to leave the island.

Bill was never recaptured, and returned to Russia after the war. He married and kept in touch with some Jersey residents, publishing a letter of thanks for their kindness in the local paper 20 years after the war ended and later visiting in 1995 to unveil a plaque dedicated to Louisa. He described his heart as being "wrung with pain" at the prospect of never being able to shake hands with his "second mother" again. He has since died.

CUTTING EDGE GADGETS FOR SERIOUS HOME COOKS

o celebrity chef worth his or her salt would be seen in a kitchen which wasn't kitted out with the latest appliances and gadgets. And it would seem Brits, inspired by what they see on popular television shows such as the Great British Bake Off and Masterchef, are following suit.

Last year, sales of kitchen appliances boomed, with many retailers reporting particularly strong growth at the premium end of the market.



SLIDE AND HIDE

A prime example of this growth is the 'Slide and Hide' by Neff. The oven, with its distinctive door which slides away, is a regular feature on *Great British* Bake Off. And despite its price tag (ranging from £500 up to £1,000), home bakers have been snapping them up.



STEAM OVENS

Sales of other high tech gadgets - such as steam ovens and sous vide ovens - are also on the rise with keen cooks undeterred by some of the eyewatering price tags associated with the gadgets.

Steam ovens use a combination of steam and hot air to cook food. As well as boosting the taste and smell of food, steam ovens are considered a healthier way to cook. But they don't come cheap - a number of oven manufacturers now produce steam ovens, with prices starting at around £1.000.

The sous vide technique was once a secret of great chefs worldwide, but will be familiar to Masterchef fans. Sous vide is a method of cooking food in vacuum sealed bags in a water bath or temperature-controlled steam environment.

A number of sous vide products are now available, including built-in ovens which allow you to bake, roast, grill and sous vide, and water baths which sit on the counter top. Sous vide water baths start at around £300, while a top range sous vide oven starts at the £2,500 mark.





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

Tributes have been paid to a former student at Brentwood County High School who died in a car accident last month.

Megan Harding-Jones was pronounced dead on the A414 near the village of North Weald when the Volkswagen Polo she was driving came off the road and ended up in a field.

Megan's parents paid an emotional tribute to their late daughter through Essex Police.

A statement read: "It is with great sadness that Perry and Katharine Harding-Jones announce the tragic death of their beautiful and much loved daughter Megan in a road traffic accident on Saturday, April 15. No other people or vehicles were involved.

"Megan was a fun loving, vivacious teenager who was passionately devoted to equestrian life.

"An accomplished and talented rider; Megan loved her horses and competed in local and national equestrian events.

"Any words are inadequate to express the deep loss felt by Megan's family and friends at such a sad and difficult time."

Megan attended Brentwood County High School (BCHS) who released a statement paying tribute to their former student.

It read: "The BCHS community is deeply saddened to hear of the loss of one of our former students, Megan Harding-Jones, on Saturday. Our thoughts are with Megan, her family and her friends.

"Megan was a wonderful young person who brought light and joy to all who came into contact with her. She was dedicated to her studies and always willing to do whatever was needed in order to ensure success. Staff who taught Megan during her time at BCHS have all commented that she was a joy to teach and an unfailingly positive and polite young person.

"The loss of any young person at the prime of their life is a tragedy that touches us all. We are all always part of our school community; that never leaves us. Megan's peers are our current Year 13 students, and Megan, like all our former students, remains as much part of our school as we all are."

"The next MP for Brentwood and Ongar will have my enthusiastic support."

Confidential helpline celebrates first anniversary



A confidential helpline run by a hospice which serves Brentwood celebrated its first anniversary last month.

Saint Francis Hospice set up OrangeLine in April last year after successfully applying for three years' funding from the Big Lottery Fund.

Since then, its team of specially trained staff and volunteers has received hundreds of calls and provided face-to-face support to people who may be bereaved or in need of a friendly ear or chat.

Staff and volunteers have sent out 800 condolence cards to family members who have lost loved ones at the hospice, which were then followed up with a welfare phone call. OrangeLine, which is based at the charity in Havering-atte-Bower, has also been referring people to specialist advice centres and signposting people to local services.

OrangeLine project manager, Karen Freeman, said: "We are thrilled at what we have been able to achieve since OrangeLine was launched a year ago and are grateful to the Big Lottery Fund for making this possible.

"The service was set up because we identified a need to support people who felt lonely or isolated and this had led us to develop new social groups to bring people together to take part in activities and form friendships."



Borough Council tackling fly-tippers on April 6 as it posed a danger to approaching

Brentwood Borough Council cleared a fly-tip in Marsh Lane, Navestock near Brentwood after the road was blocked by a load of soil, tree roots. bricks and concrete.

The rubbish was piled across the lane making it impossible for cars to navigate or pass.

Council officers took immediate steps to close the road when they discovered the dumped waste

drivers, particularly overnight as the area has no street lights.

The day after, council officers cleared the rubbish in two loads that took 90 minutes to move, aided by its 7.5 tonne truck and the new JCB which has special features to help clear such waste.

Given the type of waste in this particular dump, it is thought to have come from a full garden clearance, and is similar in type and contents to previous fly tip deposits in nearby areas.

Elizabeth Line set to open this mon

MTR Crossrail and Transport for London (TfL) are set to roll out new trains on the Elizabeth Line which will serve Brentwood.

New passenger trains are being tested across the line from Liverpool Street Station which terminates at Shenfield, just one stop on from Brentwood.

The route is set to be opened late May, with ideas to expand the fleet in the autumn.

A TfL spokesperson said: "The first new passenger train arrived in London at the beginning of March and is currently being tested across the network between Liverpool Street and Shenfield and as far as Southend.



"The new trains will be gradually introduced into passenger service on the Liverpool Street to Shenfield route from late May. These trains will be seven-carriage trains, at just over 160 metres long to fit existing platforms at Liverpool Street.

"They will also serve the new platform 6 at Shenfield which is currently being constructed by Network Rail. By Autumn, there will be 11 new trains meaning half of the train fleet will be run using the new trains, and some of the older trains will remain in service through to 2019."



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Standing ovation for popular second master



Tributes were paid to the second master at Brentwood School recently after he stepped down from his teaching duties.

"There is no-one in this hall today who has had more of an impact on the life of this school in the last 20 years than David Taylor," Headmaster Ian Davies told staff and pupils at Mr Taylor's final assembly.

The thousand plus students and teachers present, greeted his words with a rapturous round of applause.

Mr Davies said Mr Taylor had always set sky high expectations, given unflinching support to students and been a great supporter of the school's numerous sporting teams.

"An excellent musician, having trained at the Royal College of Music, he has been instrumental in developing the highest standards of music throughout the school, and his profoundly impressive singing has been an example to all of us," he added.

"I have worked with Mr Taylor for the past 13 years and I am proud to call him not just a colleague but also a friend."

Mr Taylor's two daughters, Francesca and Jessica, both attended Brentwood and his wife Marisa is head of Italian and a teacher of French in the modern languages department.

Acknowledging the good wishes of pupils and colleagues alike, Mr Taylor said: "I would like to pay tribute to Brentwood School teachers, past and

present, as well as the support staff in the school for their dedication and great expertise."

After a well-earned break, he will be back on campus in a part-time position, working in the School's Alumni and Development Office as Director of the Brentwood School Foundation, helping to raise money for scholarships and bursaries to allow pupils who otherwise would not be able to afford the fees, the experience of a Brentwood School education.

Third arrest after Sugar Hut nightclub disturbance

Police have arrested a third person in connection with a disturbance outside the Sugar Hut nightclub in High Street, Brentwood, on Sunday, April 2.

A 21-year-old man, from Brent Park, Brent, was arrested on suspicion of attempted murder on Monday, April 10, and has been released on conditional bail until Wednesday, May 3, pending further enquiries.

The arrest is in relation to an incident in which three people were struck by blue Audi following a fight involving more than 20 people at around 3.10am. The incident happened as hundreds of people left night time establishment to go home.

One of the victims remains in a critical condition in hospital. The other victims – a man and woman – have since been discharged from hospital.

A 32-year-old man from West Drayton, Hillingdon, arrested on suspicion of attempted murder has been released on conditional bail until April 28, pending further enquiries.

A 26-year-old woman, from Hornchurch, arrested on suspicion of assisting an offender has been released on conditional bail until May 3, pending further enquiries.



Will all these positive possibilities, there's a lot to be said for getting in touch with your local council to see how you can get your hands on your own productive patch.





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


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lecoming Cheryl t may not have been the easiest journey for went straight to number

t may not have been the easiest journey for the ex-Girls Aloud star, but new mum Cheryl has finally found joy in both her career and her private life.

When 19-year-old wannabe Cheryl Tweedy first stepped into the audition room of *ITV*'s *Popstars: The Rivals*, it was evident the show had unearthed a true star in the making. Charming and sweet, with an endearing shyness, she was an instant triple threat with her impressive pop vocal skills, hip-hop dance moves and stunning looks.

For Cheryl, becoming a star was not just a fanciful dream, but a long-held ambition she had worked tirelessly towards having grown up on Newcastle council estates surrounded by drug and alcohol abuse, crime and poverty. "There were lots of users in my area. Heroin was there for the taking. I could have taken that route, but I always maintained my ambition and I'm proud of myself," reveals Cheryl.

One of five children, raised single-handedly by their mother Joan Callaghan, Cheryl has said in the past that her childhood, while happy, was often tough as her mother worked tirelessly to not only feed her brood, but also nurture them – always finding money for her daughter's dance and singing classes, no matter what.

In 2004, as the band started to take off, she met and began dating Chelsea and England footballer Ashley Cole. The couple were a formidable force in British media: good looking, successful, and rivalled only by the Beckhams. For their London wedding in July 2006, *OK!* magazine reportedly paid them £1million for exclusive rights.

Over the next few years, Cheryl's star only grew brighter. The first member of Girls Aloud to pursue a solo career, her debut effort 3 Words

one, and she also became a judge herself – replacing Sharon Osbourne for the fifth series of *The X Factor*. But sadly, as Cheryl blossomed from WAG into National Treasure, cracks began to show in her marriage, and

in 2010 she and Cole separated, citing his 'unreasonable behaviour' as the cause.

Through heartbreak, the 33-year-old beauty has always been defiant. During her divorce, she released her second album, *Messy Little Raindrops*, storming the charts as a way of countering the emotional angst. Christian Dior and Jil Sander, make the brand great again.



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
1. Change Your Breakfast – If you are one of those people who always has either toast or cereal. Then ditch them for nutritionally healthier foods.

10. Have goals not dreams. Dreams are things you wish for and hope they just happen. Goals you set, plan, and personally aim to accomplish!

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


BOOST YOUR MEMORY

MOLES - PART 3

In the previous two months we reviewed what are considered harmless blemishes as well as those moles and skin conditions that need more careful evaluation. This month we will focus on Malignant Melanoma. potentially the most serious of the skin cancers and one of the main reasons as to why we should vigilant to changes in mole appearances.

A malignant melanoma can be defined as cancerous growth of the pigment cells, the melanocytes, found in the surface laver of the skin. It is very much more common in light skinned people than dark skinned.



Acral Melanoma

There is a rise in cases of melanoma brought about with the greater exposure of unprotected lighter and more susceptible skin to the sun with.

for example, frequent foreign travel. It can occur at:

- ANY age, but is rare in children and most frequently found in the 45-64 years age group.
- ANY site on the body. Most commonly on the BACKS of men and the LEGS of women, but sites include nails, eye, sole of the foot, brain and vagina.

Melanomas can arise from normal

skin, or from preexisting moles or freckles on the body.

The first sign of a melanoma is usually an unusual Amelanotic looking freckle or Melanoma

mole. A melanoma may be detected at an early stage when it is only a few millimetres in diameter, but

it may grow to several centimetres in diameter before it is diagnosed.

A melanoma may have a variety of colours including tan, dark brown, black, blue, red and, occasionally, light grey.

Melanomas may even lack pigment altogether

There may be areas of regression that are the colour of normal skin, or white and scarred.

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Diagnosis: If you are concerned that ANY mole is changing then it is important that you show it to your doctor as soon as possible. Cuch NO PAIN NO GAIN

here's been a lifelong battle between the variety of hair removal options on the market and for us girls it's hard to pick sides. Here we look at one of the most popular, waxing.

Removing hair is never pain free and waxing is probably one of the most painful, but it is one of the most frequently used methods of hair removal due to the array of benefits.

What is it?

Hair is removed directly from the roots, leaving behind smooth skin. As hair is removed from the roots and not simply trimmed, it takes longer for the hairs to grow back. Some people can go for up to one month without having to wax again.

Waxing also doesn't have many negative side effects. If you have sensitive skin, you may be left with a temporary rash or some redness, but that's probably the most you'll get in return. Wax is also relatively safe when it comes to chemicals, so there's no lasting skin damage.

Hair growth is proven to be finer after waxing and after repeated use, hair growth is also said to be reduced massively. There is no harsh stubble when your hair does start to grow back and it also removes dead skin cells and ingrown hairs.

When hair is pulled directly from the root, it also ex-foliates.
This is good for the

skin and your pores, so get that wax on. On legs and arms this is particularly helpful is these parts of the body are often forgotten when it comes to ex-foliating.

How has it evolved?

Over the past few years waxing has evolved. There are now different types of wax that have been developed to be kinder to your skin, with added aloe vera, lavender and even softer wax that doesn't need time to set.

Remember

Waxing can be done at home and or in a salon, just make sure you get the right type for you and your skin. It's available in pre-wax strips that just need warming up between your palms before applying and the jars of wax that need to be warmed up in the microwave or on a stove.

Most salons also use an oil or aloe vera gel after waxing to cool down the area and protect the skin. They also use oils to remove any excess wax from your skin, so if you are doing it at home, make sure your kit comes with all the necessary bits.



Nestled between Nicaragua and Panama in the tropical heart of Central America is Costa Rica – statistically the world's happiest country! The Happy Planet Index (HPI), which aims to measure human wellbeing against environmental impact to find the most satisfying places to live around the globe, sees Costa Rica shrugging off all-comers with a score of 44.7. Britain, incidentally, scored a paltry 31.9 on the index and ended up in 34th place.

So what makes Costa Rica such an incredible place to live and – by extension – visit?

PEOPLE

The people in Costa Rica are some of the happiest in the world. They have one of the highest literacy rates and life expectancies in Latin America. Instead of the traditional Spanish greeting "hola", Costa Ricans say "Pura vida", which means pure life – and citizens refer to their partners as "media naranja", or the other half of their orange.


first American country to ban recreational hunting, the country boasts an incredible array of animal life: 5 per cent of the world's biodiversity despite the country accounting for just 0.03 per cent of the planet. As well as being the world's hummingbird capital with 52 separate species, visitors can be treated to one of the most spectacular sights in the natural world – the arrival of Olive Ridley sea turtles on the beaches of the Pacific coast.

LANDSCAPE

Around 25 per cent of the country is protected national parks and areas. Costa Rica houses 117 species of native tree and more than 1,400 types of orchid – a third of which can be found in the mythical-sounding Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve. There are also more than a dozen volcanoes in Costa Rica, including the impressive Arenal, which is 5,358ft high.







re you tired of technology? Perhaps sent to sleep by the latest smart phones, or just plain bamboozled by all the showy gadgets on offer in 2017? Fear not. Nokia is ## bringing back one of its most iconic and almost indestructible handsets - complete with one sssssupremely popular game.

It's hard to keep up with every new development in the smart phone market these days, and Finnish tech corporation Nokia has noticed that many people are rejecting the latest models to take a trip down memory lane and dig out their old handsets. With no social media access or glitzy gadget peripherals and integral apps, the newly re-released Nokia 3310 appears to be every modern technophile's worst nightmare - but for nostalgic phone fans ,this latest development is music to the ears.

First released at the turn of the century, the apparently invincible Nokia 3310 developed a reputation for durability that would put modern handsets to shame. But the modern update on this classic phone at least has some key differences from the original.

The handset is noticeably slimmer than the original Nokia 3310, which sold around 126 million units before it was discontinued in 2005. It's also almost half the weight - the original was 133g whereas the new model is 79g. It also houses a camera, something which was unheard of in the original phone's era, but fans of the traditional set-up

shouldn't get too pent up about this photographic addition - it's only a 2MP (megapixel) tiddler.

But the real positive comes with the return of one of the greatest games ever to grace the tiny screen of any mobile. You can forget your Clash of Clans and

Candy Crush, because the new-old Nokia once again exhibits Snake - albeit a slightly modernised version with better graphics.







FORZA FERRARI

eventy years ago, the very first Ferrari hit the streets – and seven decades on, the prancing horse is still an iconic sight on the road and the racetrack. To celebrate the company's milestone, we look back on the history of Italy's most prestigious automotive manufacturer.

The legendary Enzo Ferrari (1898-1988) began his motoring career as an Alfa Romeo driver in 1924, but within five years he found the Scuderia Ferrari – which assisted gentlemen drivers in racing cars – in his hometown of Modena. In 1938, Alfa Romeo brought the Scuderia under its control, but Ferrari disagreed with the move and left in 1939 to set up his own racing company. Under the terms of the split from Alfa, Enzo was unable to use his own name on his cars until years later.

HORSE POWER

The iconic Cavallino Rampante (prancing horse) was adopted from the emblem of Italian WW2 fighter ace Francesco Baracca, who painted the design on his plane. Enzo Ferrari was given permission to use the design from Baracca's mother, who believed it would bring the car manufacturer good luck. Ferrari placed the black horse on a canary yellow background (the colour of Modena) and topped it with the tricolour of Italy. The rest, as they say, is history (or is that 'horse'-tory'?).

THE FIRST FERRARI

The first racing car to bear the Ferrari moniker was the 12-cylinder 1.5-litre Tipo 125, which was released in 1947. Just two models of this original car were created, neither of which exist today. The legacy of the Tipo 125, however, continued in various forms, not only were parts from the two

models re-used in subsequent Ferrari productions, but in 1987, Michelotto produced a replica of the initial car which the company still owns.

A WINNING FORMULA

The first Ferrari driver to claim the Formula One World Championship was Alberto Ascari, taking spot in 1952. Scuderia Ferrari has produced the most championship-winning drivers – 15 – since Ascari's maiden victory. The most famous of these include Niki Lauda, Michael Schumacher – who won five consecutive titles – and Kimi Raikkonen. Ferrari also holds the top spot when it comes to the Constructor's Championships, with a whopping 16 victories from 1961-2008.

THE 200 CLUB

The Ferrari F40 was the last car approved for production by Enzo Ferrari himself – and in 1987 it made motoring history by being the first road car to break the 200mph barrier, hitting an eventual speed of 202.687mph. Only 1,311 models were produced.

THE FERRARI OF THE FUTURE

The latest supercar to roll off the company's production line is the Ferrari LaFerrari – the first of its kind to be equipped with an F1-derived hybrid solution that combines an electric motor capable of producing over 150 CV with the most powerful version of Ferrari's classic V12, which delivers a mighty 800 CV at 9,000rpm. The technical innovations in the LaFerrari are set to filter through the marque's entire range and will surely have a massive impact on future designs.



SPORTING SPRAINS and WORSE

f you thought boxing, horse riding and skiing were the toughest athletic pursuits, think again. Here are the UK's most dangerous top five sports by injury records.

Football 18.9%

Who would have thought that a casual kickabout down the park could land you in A&E? But football is statistically Britain's most dangerous sport, with one in five admitting to sustaining an injury whilst playing. Though footy injuries are rarely fatal, they be vicious, and regularly include sprained ankles (40 per cent of all injuries), knee injuries (32 per cent) and concussion (13 per cent).

Running 9.4%

Unless you accidentally career off into an unseen ravine it is unlikely your morning jog will land you into any real trouble. However, injuries from poor technique, ill-fitting shoes and overuse can still be pretty debilitating. Among the most common ailments are shin splints, blisters and pulled muscles.

Rugby 4.9%

They say rugby is a thug's game played by gentleman, but partakers of this brain-battering pursuit are actually four times less likely to suffer an injury than their footballing counterparts. Wounds range from superficial cuts and bruises to more serious concussion injuries and joint dislocations, not to mention those infamous cauliflower ears. Ouch.

Cycling (track, road) 4.5%

Sadly for cyclists, fatalities on bikes are still high with 125 deaths recorded last year on British roads. However non-fatal injuries put cycling fourth on our danger list with ailments mostly affecting shoulder blades, knees, groins and, yes, buttocks.

Swimming 3.2%

One might assume that if you follow the age-old advice of eating at least two hours before you take to the pool, you'll be fine and dandy, but surprisingly swimming is the fifth most dangerous British sport, with 90 per cent of complaints relating to shoulders. 'Swimmer's shoulder' is the most common injury caused by inflammation of the supraspinatus and biceps tendon, leading to joint pain and limited movement.

SINIER?

It's been over 20 years since unknown French manager Arsène Wenger sauntered to north London to take up the reins at Arsenal Football Club, but with the team slipping down the table, and fan patience quickly running out, will this season prove to be the end of an era?

When Arsène Wenger was unveiled as Bruce Rioch's replacement in the Arsenal manager's hot seat in 1996, the question on the lips of most fans and players was, "Arsène Who?" The Strasbourg-born gaffer had cut his teeth with Monaco and Japan's Nagoya Grampus Eight, but had no knowledge of footballing life in England. His insistence on replacing the traditional set-up at the club with a revolutionised nutritional diet, supplemented with hours of video analysis, did little to calm the upheaval caused by this enigmatic European's arrival, but his methods immediately bore fruit.

Nowadays, of course, Wenger is known around the world. As the longestreigning manager of any club in the Premier League, he has won six FA Cups and three league titles with the Gunners, including the famous championship win in 2003/04 which saw his side go 49 games unbeaten. This team of so-called 'Invincibles' included some of Wenger's most influential signings for the club, from Sol Campbell and Patrick Vieira to the mercurial forward pairing of Dennis Bergkamp and Thierry Henry. But these days, the mystique surrounding Wenger has all but evaporated amidst accusations of transfer market tight-fistedness and a lack of ambition. His current team - though still full of superstars such as Alexis Sanchez, Mesut Ozil and Laurent Koscielny has slipped out of the top four and been humiliated in the Champions League. A contract offer remains on the table, set to take the 67-year-old into 2019 as Arsenal boss. But with question marks over the futures of Sanchez and Ozil, and a series of recent defeats to supposedly 'lesser' sides like West Bromwich Albion and Crystal Palace (not to mention that 10-2 aggregate defeat to Bayern Munich), has time finally run out for the man who turned Arsenal into the club they are today? The only man with the power to answer that question is, bizarrely, Arsène himself.

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
