



More importantly I wish you all good health.



THE WORLD AROUND US Purt 2

In the second of our environmental series that looks at the key drivers in the health and well-being of the planet, we're looking at the legacy of our rainforests.

At the end of the 1980s, the realisation that the world's rainforests were being removed at an alarming rate truly propelled a green revolution – one that continues to thrive today.

Where eco awareness and the preservation of our planet are now a part of everyday life, the way we embraced the saving of the Amazon rainforests had never before been seen.

The realisation that deforestation was claiming an area the size of 20 football pitches every minute – for the acquiring of timber and repurposing of land for cattle ranching – was profound, but the deafening screams of those early environmentalists are now just faint murmurs. So what has happened to those green expanses?


Sadly, the problem still exists. A quarter of the Amazon has disappeared, probably never to return, while some speculation suggests the remainder may be felled within 50 years if tighter restrictions are not forthcoming.

Globally, one in four people depends directly on forests for their livelihood, and as many as 120 prescription drugs worldwide are derived directly from rainforests.

And yet, there are two sides to every story. Many South Americans will point to the economic necessity of monetising a natural resource, just as the UK has done with oil and gas. Even the Brazilian president Jair Bolsonaro has called the destruction of these plant- and animal-rich expanses "cultural"; and in a country that has more than 20 million people living in poverty, it's not difficult to see why resistance is strong.

To conclude, it seems that while the days are gone where almost every other charitable programme was driven towards preserving these incredible habitats, it's simply a case of having our attention diverted to other ills. Three decades after we first reached out to our rainforests, the battle to save them lives on.







To keep out the cold and to keep energy costs down, buildings have become increasingly airtight, with improved insulation and highefficiency windows and doors. Although this is good for your bank balance, it is not so beneficial to your health.

Fortunately, there are ways in which you can improve the air quality in your home this winter.

KEEP YOUR HOME CLEAN

During the winter, when you are unlikely to have your windows open, dust, animal dander and mould can become a problem. Therefore, you need to stay on top of your cleaning regime. Vacuum at least twice a week, regularly wash your bedding and clear away any clutter.

CHANGE YOUR AIR FILTERS

If you have a forced-air heating system in your home, you need to ensure you are changing the filters on a regular basis. This is because electrostatic filters work to trap dust and other airborne irritants rather than

allowing them to circulate around your home.

INVEST IN AN AIR PURIFIER

If you struggle with allergies but can't control the source of the problem, for example you do not want to give up a family pet, an air purifier can help to catch some of the irritants that trigger your symptoms. A dehumidifier can also be a great idea if your home is prone to damp as it can help prevent the growth of mould.

HAVE YOUR CHIMNEY SWEPT

Wood-burning fires are lovely in winter but they need to be used responsibly. Avoid burning wet logs or coal as these can produce hazardous particles. You should also ensure that your chimney is cleaned at least once a year so that smoke can escape.

INSTALL A CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR

Carbon monoxide is odourless and can be deadly. However, even at non-fatal levels it can be dangerous for people with weakened lungs.

stylish storage solutions




If you are lucky enough to have a wood-burning fire in your home, then you probably can't wait to start torching some timber and heating it up. However, where are you supposed to keep all your lovely logs?


- 1. Fill any gaps: If you have supporting pillars of wood, or you are using a partial dividing wall to separate two rooms, why not take advantage of any hollow spaces or gaps and fill them with logs? Not only does this look stylish, but it is also a great way of using up an otherwise wasted space.
- 2. Pile high: For those who want to make a statement with their logs, this big and bold solution is for you. Effectively building a feature wall of firewood, you can utilise any unused alcove in your home to create this eye-catching display. This is not advised if you have young children owing to the risk of injury.
- 3. Create a cubbyhole: If you have a wood-burning stove rather than an actual fireplace and you are looking to build a surface for it to sit on, you should remember to factor storage into your design. This multitasking brick stage includes both room for both logs and kindling.
- 4. Go rustic: One of the simplest ways to stylishly store your logs is to use a large, country-style basket. Make sure you pick one that is big enough to fit all your log-burning supplies and is both sturdy and strong. Alternatively, for a more contemporary look, opt for a metal design.
- 5. Be sneaky: If you have an outdoor storage area for your logs, you only need to display a handful in your home, so look for unused space in your property, such as under the stairs or eaves where you can create a bespoke storage space.

I obody likes to look at a big, bare wall, but there are only so many family pictures that one room can take, so why not have a go at this simple, yet stunning, DIY glass wall art? You only need a few basic craft materials and a little bit of creative flair and you are good to go.

YOU WILL NEED

- Multipurpose, water-based craft paints (small pots) in your preferred colours
- > Masking tape
- > Glue gun
- > 1 glass picture frame
- > Paint brush soft acrylic or watercolour brushes work well

HOW TO MAKE

- > Ensure the glass within the frame is secure; if not, use a glue gun to stick it in place
- > Allow the glue to fully dry before continuing
- > Mask the edges of the frame and use a clean, dry cloth to dust the glass
- Decide upon your design you could use your initial, a flower or a simple inspirational quote
- > If using a stencil, position your chosen design under the glass or go
- > Paint your design in layers, allowing the paint to dry between each coat
- > Once your design is fully dry, remove the masking tape and display proudly on your chosen wall

TOP TIPS FOR PAINTING ON GLASS

- > Always clean the surface before painting
- > Handle the glass carefully to avoid fingerprints
- > Choose the right brush synthetic brushes can create visible brushstrokes. whereas natural hair brushes allow for more paint to be applied in one stroke and provide a smoother coverage
 - > Do not apply too much pressure with your brush
 - > Avoid overworking the paint
 - > Always blot your brush after rinsing it to eliminate any excess water
 - > Clean away imperfections while the paint is still wet, using a wet brush, toothpick or paper towel
 - > When the paint has dried, use a razor blade to scrape or trim off any imperfections

OTHER IDEAS FOR DIY GLASS ART:

- > Use markers to write out your favourite quotes
- > Press flowers (two pieces of glass required)

THE RETURN OF SHABBY CHIC AND HOW TO PULL IT OFF

he revolving circle of décor and design has, over the years, gripped a nation of amateur interior designers. Shabby chic, a style that first came to prominence in the 1980s, is making a concerted return to prominence.

Its invention was as a rebellion to the hard, shiny, ultra-modern, clean-cut image of three decades ago, when yuppies and electronica ruled the roost. The term 'shabby chic' was thought up by fashion journalist Min Hogg.

And the concept hasn't strayed too far since – from distressed furniture to unmatching fabrics and colours, a rustic, rugged essence that's based on comfort and quantity, rather than image and minimalistic posturing.

To achieve the shabby chic look really is to open your imagination, either by pooling existing items or exploring flea markets, thrift stores and antique shops.

Many people think repainting and running a grooved spatula across an old set of drawers is the sum total of shabby chic, but it's about much more than that. Soft background colours flatter furniture and make items the focal point of a room, so think about using whites, beiges or even light greys.

Pastels – baby blues, pale pinks, grainy greys and warm yellows – work best, while that base of brightness means retro, darker shades of wood can match and contrast, be that on tables or chairs. Meanwhile, wicker and throws soften edges and enhance comfort, and wrought iron provides structure.

As far as the walls and surface tops go, flowers, mirrors and pictures using worn frames will assist you in topping off the perfect shabby chic room, with knick-knacks, signs and cushions adding to the mix.

Past that, the only limit is your imagination. And the best thing about shabby chic is that it needn't cost the earth – adding wear and tear to your own items is cheap, if not free.

Conman caught as victims warn the police

Afraudster has been jailed for his part in a scam targeting elderly victims, including several in Frinton-on-Sea.

Albino Chaves admitted nine counts of conspiracy to commit fraud by false representation and three of conspiracy to defraud.

He was jailed at Chelmsford Crown Court on October 27 for two years and four months.

Chaves, 24, was involved a series of frauds, in which conmen would contact elderly victims claiming to be from their bank. They told victims they would be receiving a new bank card and a courier would go to their home to exchange their old card for a new one.

Chaves was arrested after being identified as the courier. He was released on bail with conditions not to enter Essex.

On April 23, a woman in Frinton-on-Sea was called in the same way as the victims in the other frauds. However, after speaking with her daughter, she was worried it was a scam.

The fraudster rang a few hours later saying a courier would arrive within a few minutes. She explained it was not convenient, but he persisted. She hung up and called the police.

Officers attended and waited for the courier to arrive. During that time, another victim from Frinton-on-Sea called the police to report a courier had collected her bank card.

While officers were responding, they stopped a black Mercedes in Thorpe-le-Soken after they noticed it driving around the area, and became suspicious.

Chaves was one of the men inside. His mobile phone was seized, and they found messages about both fraud victims.

Detective Constable Hollie Hughes, of Clacton CID, said: "Chaves was part of a planned and targeted fraud, with victims losing between £300 and £4,000 each. He had no regard for the distress it would cause his victims and I hope that this sentence will give them some justice."



Volunteers come to rescue of damaged boat

NLI volunteers from Frinton-on-Sea were among those who came to the rescue of a damaged angling boat last month.

Walton and Frinton volunteers were paged by the Dover Coastguard just before noon on November 10 after reports were received that the vessel, which was four nautical miles east of the lifeboat station, was unable to make its own way.

Once the rescuers were on the scene, it was found that the angling boat had been on passage to Rye in East Sussex but had bounced on Gunfleet Sands and sustained damage. The boat lost steerage and was also taking on water, which the on-board pump was managing to keep at a safe level. Once the welfare of the two men on board had been established, the

lifeboat crew set up a tow and the *Irene Muriel Rees* towed the vessel into Walton Backwaters.

The lifeboat was met by the yard team at Titchmarsh Marina, who immediately lifted the vessel out of the water to prevent it sinking and to check the damage.

Speaking afterwards, station mechanic Karl Bigwood said: "Although the initial call seemed fairly routine, a broken-down boat which had anchored to await assistance, the situation became much more urgent once we found it was taking on substantial amounts of sea water.

"With the pump running only on battery, it could quickly have turned very serious had the batteries failed or been swamped. Things could have changed very quickly to an operation to save those on board."

Sale goes ahead despite pandemic



Although it was scaled down to comply with social distancing regulations, the Frinton and Walton Heritage Trust still held a successful sale at the Crossing Cottage Museum and Gardens recently. Although volunteers and the number of stalls were reduced to fewer than 20, visitors were still able to buy apples and plants, mainly from the cottage garden, homemade jams and marmalade.

Trust secretary Brian Jennings said: "This was the first Trust fundraising event of the year and raised a much-needed £550. Our funding events, one in May and the other in October, would normally raise £5,000 and this, with income from membership, helps fund our members' newsletters, allow members free access to our museums, pay overheads and increase our archive resources.

"This year we will have to rely on our reserves to get through the period of lockdown, as our museums at Frinton-on-Sea and Walton-on-the Naze have remained closed all season."

Air ambulance called to accident on beach



mergency services rushed to Frinton Beach last month after reports of a horse-riding accident.

The Essex and Herts Air Ambulance were among those to attend the scene on November 22. It's understood that the rider may have fractured her pelvis but that she was conscious and talking after the accident took place.

The horse was led away from the beach into a horse hox

A spokesman for the East of England Ambulance Trust said: "I can confirm that we responded to an emergency call on November 22 shortly after midday regarding an incident on the Frinton-on-Sea promenade. We sent three ambulances, a rapid response vehicle and an air ambulance to the scene. The patient was transferred to Colchester General Hospital for further care."

Firefighters called to unusual rescue



refighters in Frinton-on-Sea attended an unusual event last month when they came to the rescue of a seagull caught in a tree by a kite line.

The RSPCA was called to Connaught Avenue by a member of the public, who had spotted the bird

caught by some kind of line in a tree on November 14.

The bird was checked over by RSPCA inspector Jessica Dayes and taken to Wildlives Rescue and Rehabilitation Centre.

She said: "This poor gull had become caught in a tree, and we are grateful to the firefighters who rescued him and to the members of the public for reporting this.

"Fortunately, despite his ordeal, he wasn't severely injured, and after a few days rest and rehabilitation he will be released back to the wild."

Daughter outraged at care home inspection



The daughter of a man with dementia and Alzheimer's says she is furious after government inspectors ruled that the care home where he now lives must remain in special measures.

Inspectors from the Care Quality Commission did not change their rating of Blenheim House Care Home in nearby Walton after visiting the property in March this year.

Vanessa Streete, who lives in Frinton-on-Sea, said she cannot fault the care her dad has been receiving.

She said: "Our hats are off to the dedicated and caring staff who provide him with the attention needed 24 hours a day, seven days a week. If I thought even for a second that there were issues, I would be exceptionally wordy and very loud about it.

"The care my dad receives is incredible. Nobody can judge these people.

"They had their second assessment between two lockdowns and have been kicked around for not having done enough. Some staff have stayed for weeks so they didn't cross-contaminate.

"I've seen Dad once in between the two lockdowns and I was wearing a mask, given hand gel and had my temperature taken by the staff, who were all taking it very seriously. I'm outraged."

Blenheim House will be reinspected in six months to check if improvements have been made.

Police cordoned off a building site in Kirby-le-Soken last month after an unexploded hand grenade was discovered.


Local police officers liaised with a bomb expert, and the site manager and residents in nearby houses were made aware.

Diamuid Gavin

xpert gardener Diarmuid Gavin made his name as the host of BBC teatime hits Gardeners' World and Home Front in the Garden, but he's been busy tending to different fields of late.

The Chelsea gold-medal-winning designer has tried his hand at ballroom in *Strictly Come Dancing*, proved a degree of culinary expertise on *Come Dine With Me* and made ripples on ITV's celebrity diving bonanza *Splash*.

The 56-year-old's flirtation with mainstream TV perhaps, for a while, threatened to take him away from a professional passion for horticulture that stretches back to the late 1980s.

Indeed, the Irishman has reinforced his commitment to returning to the innocence of the humble garden by refusing to exhibit for the past few years at the Chelsea Flower Show.

"I think with all these things there has to be a practicality to it – there has to be a take-out.

"If I am exhibiting an idea that is preposterously unachievable to the average gardener, then what is the point?"

Diarmuid's reconnection with his horticultural roots has restated the charismatic gardener with what truly thrills him, and his Instagram feed provides an almost daily delve into the passions of our plots.

"People always ask me for advice, and in terms of our own gardens, I'd just advise that people are careful when they plant," he says.

"Plants that are too tender will die very quickly, so spend longer planning and plant later – that's the golden rule... never rush things. Better to be exuberant once rather than spend the same amount by buying lower-priced items twice, because the first lot have died."

At his extroverted peak, Diarmuid produced a Willy Wonka-inspired giant garden that was deemed too big to enter the historic Chelsea Flower Show.

"I have calmed down since," he laughs. "It was way too big... nearly the size of a football field. I knew after that it was time to rein it in."



- > Brut = Less than 12 grams
- > **Extra Dry** = 12–17 grams
- > Sec = 17-32 grams
- > **Demi-Sec** = 32-50 grams
- > Doux = 50 grams or more
- > Non-vintage/vintage = Non-vintage denotes grape juice from multiple vintages; vintage will only be produced in a good vintage year and matured for at least three years before being released.
- > Grand Cru/Premier Cru = These refer to the classification of the vineyard. Grand Cru is top, Premier Cru is second.

or all its speculation, criticism and conjecture, — the housing market represents one of the most stable industries in the UK. Only amid the perils of negative equity in the 1990s did the bricks and mortar of people's fortunes really begin to crumble; yet for large periods outside that time, investment in property has largely been deemed a safe one.

Of course, as a result of this, the market has become much more competitive, and the growing difficulty with which first-time buyers, in particular, are able to get on board means the government's introduction of Help to Buy schemes has gone a long way to guiding people along the footpath to realising those dreams.

The concept is simple - if you cannot afford the mortgage on what would be 100 per cent of a home, Help to Buy: Shared Ownership will allow you to buy a share of the property, which could be anywhere between 25 and 75 per cent of its value.

You would effectively pay rent on the remaining share. This means the initial deposit is smaller and mortgage finance more accessible. On the plus side, owners still enjoy a decent proportion of true investment and, along with that, benefit from rises in market price over time.

The criteria to get involved is sensible. Those applying need to earn less than £80,000/year (£90,000/year in London). Furthermore, you would need to be a first-time buyer, or have owned before while being unable to buy now; or perhaps are in an existing shared ownership arrangement and are looking to move.

Variations to the rules exist for the over-55s and disabled applicants, but for the most part the success of the scheme, which is being repackaged and relaunched for 2021, is evident in the millions of people who have stepped onto the property ladder since its launch four decades ago.

PENSION PARALYSIS

WHY INVESTING NOW MEANS BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

n these uncertain times, our ability to plan for the future has been tested to extremes. Record numbers of homeowners embarked on payment holidays this year as COVID-19 struck, and forward financial plans and projects have been put on hold across the board - much of it on the advice of government... except where pensions are concerned.

n the first instance, an obsession for hobbyists, nerds and those looking to reap havoc around airports for the lucky few jetting off on holidays. Yet how we perceive drones in 2020 is beginning to change, not least in their ability to save lives.

More and more now, search-and-rescue teams are using drones to survey huge areas guickly and efficiently. Predominantly this is because missions - at sea, on mountain ranges or even in remote wildernesses - are dangerous, time-consuming and particularly expensive. They can demand huge quantities of manpower and can be exhausting.

Drones provide an efficient, versatile, unmanned resource that can take on the workload of what could be hundreds of volunteers, and in a way that is much quicker too. Whether across trees, water or rocks, a drone has the range and the ability to get close to the ground in a way that a rescue helicopter would never be able to.

From specific events, such as the recent wildfires across Australia, to flood and avalanche disasters in China, to missing person searches in any location. it's estimated that it takes 25 people 35 hours to search one square mile for missing persons, compared to the 30 minutes it takes a drone to cover the same area.

It's little wonder the producers of this tech are seeing the value of their companies rocket, with emergency services, the police included, ordering drones in huge quantities in order to make their work easier.

Some drones even have built-in delivery capabilities, enabling urgent blood supplies to be transported to hard-to-reach areas. This was particularly effective with the delivery of 7,000 units of blood - that's 25 per cent of the national blood supply - outside Rwanda's capital city Kigali in 2018, which saved more than a thousand lives.

From geek toys to go-to devices for emergency services, the popularity of drones will continue to
