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hey may have had their ups and downs over a long and impressive tenure in the spotlight, but devilish duo Ant and Dec are still going strong, with their sights set firmly on the future.

It's easy to forget that Ant McPartlin and Declan Donnelly started out on the children's television show *Byker Grove* in the early 1990s playing PJ (Ant) and Duncan (Dec) – the names they would adopt for their short-lived pop career. But more impressive than the fact that those two young upstarts have slowly and steadily become television royalty - building an impressive fortune along the way - is how they have maintained their friendship, which shows no sign of waning, even in the face of events that have threatened their superstar careers.

The most recent dramatic turn is the coming to light of Ant's very public struggle with alcohol and prescription drug addiction, along with news that he is to divorce his wife of 11 years, Lisa Armstrong. Naturally, such

finewining

Never choose the second bottle on the list

It's a well-known fact that the second wine on any list usually has the highest price margin. So, either go for the cheapest bottle which may be slightly less quality but better value, or splash out on something a bit pricier.

Familiarise yourself with regions

Fancy something bold and fruity? Go for an Australian wine. Or if you're feeling a little more restrained and subtle, select a sophisticated French Merlot or a dry Italian Gavi. South African Sauvignon Blancs are known to be gorgeously zesty and bright, while you can't beat a robust Chilean red.

Consider buying by the glass

In general, it is better value to buy by the bottle over the glass. However, if you're in the kind of establishment that has more expensive wine available by the glass, it's more pleasurable to have one glass of dazzling wine over an entire bottle of mediocre plonk.

oaked Chardonnay or Cabernet

cappuccinos, vou're more likely a Merlot or Sauvignon Blanc quaffer. And if you love a latte, you'll love a Pinot Grigio.

Don't be afraid to try something new

Wine lists are in general fairly predictable, so if you're in a French restaurant and nestled among the usual suspects is an unusual non-appellation Chenin Blanc from the Loire, chances are that someone simply loves it enough to stick it on the list.

Consult your waiter

Don't be afraid to ask. It doesn't make you look like you don't know what you're talking about; in fact, it shows you care enough to find the perfect wine for your other half's double cheeseburger with extra fries. How impossibly romantic.

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t once an acting legend on-screen and a figure of notoriety off it, Gerard Depardieu may have committed over 180 appearances to film, but his true vocation lies in his beloved vineyards of his native France.

Gerard Depardieu has always lived excessively. His love of wine is such that he has admitted to drinking as many as 15 bottles a day when he is "bored" and mired in one of his infamous benders. Depardieu has since poured an estimated €5million of his private earnings into the modernisation and expansion of his winery, which today boasts an annual production of 350,000 bottles.

His flagship Tigné vintage has consistently earned high ratings from the leading wine magazines. Depardieu regards his fascination with wine as an expression of his "lust for life" and his abiding "pursuit of pleasure" in all forms.

"It's not the actual wine-making process that I feel passionate about," he says. "I love the countryside, the hills, the valleys, the place where the vines grow and the soil and the wind that blows across the vineyards. I take great pleasure in knowing the people who grow my grapes and who invest their lives in the land, and the process of making good wine. That's where the real passion comes."

Depardieu defines his world by a different metric from most people. He lives for each sip of a wine whose character is every bit as distinct and colourful as his own. Wine is a metaphor for the ability to appreciate the best things in life.

He added: "People often talk about the things you can do with money. I've had money, of course, but I also spend it all. I've never made profits with my vineyards - what's important is to be able to throw yourself into the world and experience it all. "Nobody can teach the taste of life. It's not money that gives you taste – it's in your head. When you have money, you can buy anything you want. But it's not what you buy that's important,

it's your palate."

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THE BEST WORKOUTS FOR EVERY AGE



Twenties: You have time and energy, so this is when you need to get out there and explore different sports and workouts – it's time to figure out what you really love. Think team games,

rock-climbing, surfing and anything that is challenging whilst also perhaps providing a social aspect. Consider yoga and meditation for relaxation, as are twenties are thought to be one of life's most stressful periods.

weather? Well look to within for the answer, as here are the dos and don'ts of balancing your internal bacteria. Do fill up on fruit and veg, particularly those

that are prebiotic and contain ingredients that bacteria feed on. These include asparagus, bananas, garlic, Jerusalem artichoke, kiwi, mushroom and onions.

DON'T overdo the antibiotics. Not only does taking too many antibiotics make you more susceptible to certain bacterial infections, they also disrupt the integrity of the intestinal microbiome which can leave your immune system even more vulnerable.

DO consider a probiotic supplement.

But **DON'T** be fooled by marketing. Some brands would have you believe the best supplement is the one with the most bacteria, but actually the strains of bacteria are more vital. So choose ones that contain L. acidophilus, B. longum and B. bifidum, and offer an effective delivery system.

Do load up on probiotic foods. Probiotic-rich foods, unlike prebiotic, actually contain new bacteria to boost your gut microbes. These include cultured dairy products like buttermilk, yogurt, kefir and cheese, along with fermented vegetables such as kimchi, sauerkraut and lacto-fermented pickles.

DON'T overdo the junk food. Unsurprisingly, highlyprocessed foods don't encourage a healthy gut, and often contain ingredients which suppress 'good' bacteria, or increase 'bad'.

DO stay hydrated. When it comes to keeping everything healthy in your tummy, water is your friend, helping food move effectively through your intestines and maintaining an optimum environment for bacteria.

DON'T fear the four Ks. Like the Kardashians of the fermented food world. Kefir, Kombucha, 'Kraut and Kimchi are a formidable probiotic force. Having said that, some may find the idea of fermented spicy cabbage (Kimchi), fizzy fermented tea (Kombucha) and slightly sour-tasting yogurt drink (Kefir) a little overwhelming. However, once over the initial shock, these all taste delicious and will do wonders for the digestive system, leaving you with a glow and sparkle to rival the real Kardashian ladies... like, literally,

HOW TO DESIGN YOUR VERY OWN AROMATHERAPY GARDEN

he word aromatherapy may evoke luxurious but pricey massages, decadent bath oils, and tiny bottles of precious elixir, but in reality it's very easy to plant and grow your own aromatic herbs and plants, creating a space that is fresh, fragrant and inexpensive.

To decide what vegetation suits your needs, think about the space you have and what kind of fragrances will bring you the most pleasure. If you have an abundance of land you can create a colourful carpet of plants and flowers, offering a wealth of therapeutic properties. Basil, mint, rosemary, chamomile, lemon balm and thyme are all herbs that will thrive given enough room. You can also include fragrant shrubs like lilac, rose and mock orange, along with vines such as honeysuckle, jasmine and wisteria, which are great for generating different layers of scent and colour.

For those who have less space, it is still easy

to grow a wealth of perfumed plants in a window box. Just choose a spot which receives at least six hours of sunlight a day, keep them well watered and regularly pruned, and select plants which have similar needs in terms of water and sunlight. Great options for your window box include basil, lavender, rosemary, mint, jasmine, oregano and rose.

Once your plants are flourishing all you need to decide is what to do with them. The easy answer is 'nothing', for even a stroll through a garden fragrant with honeysuckle and rose, or a gentle waft of jasmine through the window, can be soothing in itself. Herbs like rosemary and basil of course are great to use when cooking; chamomile and mint can be steeped in hot water as tea, while lavender is ideal for a relaxing bath.

By the end of summer it is possible to have a veritable apothecary on your doorstep, which can be harvested and dried to enjoy when the cold sets in.



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THE WORDS BEING DITCHED FROM THE DICTIONARY

t's no secret that children have become technology wizards, with many choosing to play on an iPad or their laptop rather than reading a book or going outside.

The Oxford Junior Dictionary has recognised this change and a panel of experts have decided to remove some words in order to make way for modern technology terms. Several of the words that have been removed are nature related, including otter, acorn and buttercup.

A petition was started by Terry Jackson to get these words reinstated and at the time of going to print had more than 190,000 signatures. He argued that by removing words to do with nature, children will, rather than care for the earth, be more insular and lead to less healthy lives.

The debate made national TV with teacher Samantha James and broadcaster Yasmeen Khan appearing on *Good Morning Britain* to debate the subject. Samantha supported the removal of the words and said we need to move with the times. Whereas Yasmeen argued that children need to know these words in order to connect with the outside world rather than technology and social media.

The words we use are changing, with several slang and technology-focused ones becoming widely used.

t can feel like an uphill struggle getting your children to consume their 'five a day', let alone actually enjoy the experience. But give these handy tips and tricks below a try, and see if they don't help your little one stave off hunger and keep healthy at the same time.

1. HEALTHY JUNK FOOD

Try making your own healthy junk food using good quality lean meat for burgers; and swap desserts that are high in refined sugars with easy-to-make fresh fruit ice lollies made from fruit juice and pureed fruits.

2. PROPER PROVENANCE

Some kids can spot a hidden mushroom a mile off, so sometimes it's best to be upfront about fruit and vegetables. Explain to them where their food has come from, explaining why each thing is so good for them, and you may well get them more interested in what they are eating.

3. APPERANCE

Try to make sure your child's food not only tastes good but looks good too. Mini portions, chicken skewers or bite-sized pieces of fruit will look enticing, whilst keep your kids healthy at the same time.

4. THE FRIDGE SHELF

Avoid empty calorie snacks like crisps or soft drinks and keep a supply of healthy snacks on hand. A low shelf in the fridge with cut-up fresh fruit and other healthy foods means that hungry children have somewhere to go that's easy to get to and packed with nutritious nibbles.

5. GET INVOLVED

Children love the thrill of assembling their own food, so why not lay ingredients out in bowls and let your youngsters fill and fold their own wraps, or choose their favourite toppings for tasty homemade pizzas.

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THE REPORT FINE HAUSS

Get radical with your home interiors by indulging in Germany's pre-World War II design revolution.

f an understanding of the term 'Bauhaus' doesn't spring immediately to mind, being told that it was a radical German art and design school founded in 1919 probably isn't going to help much either.

But in reality, you are already well-versed in Bauhaus design, for it is in the very bricks and mortar around you, and much more besides.

Helmed by Walter Gropius, who had a vision of bridging the gap between art and industry by combining crafts and fine arts, what began as a small private school turned into a movement which laid the foundations of modern design as we know it today. Gropius wanted designers and architects to embrace the age of the machine, rejecting fussy ornamentation for mass-produced simplicity with an appreciation for raw materials. This led to the use of steel frames in chairs and tables, exposed marble and brickwork, the popularity of sans-serif typefaces, and the trend for geometry (curves are a waste of space apparently).

But despite the popularity of the movement, not everyone was a fan, and as the school thrived it caught the attention of the Nazis who forced it to close in the 1930s. Little did they know though, that the fleeing of all those innovators and teachers only spread the word of Bauhaus across Europe, ensuring its enduring legacy today.

How to be more Bauhaus:

- > Go monochrome
- > Reveal your home's raw materials (floor boards, brick, cement)
- > Keep decoration simple with splashes of colour
- > Buy a geometric shelving unit





>Add whimsical embellishments like a chess set or spinning top – for as Bauhaus teacher Johannes Itten once said: "Play becomes celebration; celebration becomes work; work becomes play."

viven his lengthy stint in music, it's easy to forget that former One Direction member Harry Styles is still just 24 years old. But ever since X Factor judge Nicole Scherzinger suggested that the floppy-haired teen get together aspiring leading man had won the role by with a quartet of fellow singing scamps for the reality show's seventh series. Despite leaving his solo resurgence a little later than the others, Styles' self-titled debut album came hot on the heels of the chorus-heavy ballad Sign of the Times – his first individual music offering since 1D's split. With his glossy shoulder-length hair and perfect pout emulative of rock legend Mick Jagger, Styles established himself as the fashion-conscious soft rock balladeer, compared to the acoustic or star's upcoming plans. Not content with his established place in the global music industry, however, in 2017 Styles began to look further afar in his search for entertainment domination. That chance came as part of Christopher Nolan's epic World War Two drama Dunkirk. Starring opposite Hollywood heavyweights such as Mark Rylance, Cillian Murphy and Tom Hardy, Styles proved a natural fit on the silver screen.

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SN **Council starts legal action** over police station closure

lavering Council has filed a judicial review following the decision to close police buildings in the borough, including Hornchurch.

Councillor Roger Ramsey, leader of the council, called for a judicial review when the council wrote a letter to the Mavor's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC) on the grounds that the consultation was unlawful and that they failed to comply with the public sector equality duty.

The mayor's office responded to the council standing by his original decision.

Cllr Ramsey said: "After writing to both MOPAC and the commissioner and receiving a disappointing

response, it was essential we started court action. This will demonstrate that we will not tolerate the closure of our public access police stations as the safety of our residents is paramount.

"The MOPAC consultation process was not undertaken properly. The decision will have a negative impact on residents in the south of the borough who will have to travel over an hour to their nearest police station, which is not acceptable. Also, older residents may feel more comfortable having face-to-face contact with police and it will be unjust to take this away from them."

The vaccines are used to help prevent the neuroblastoma returning.

Nicola said: "We will have to use the vaccine money to pay for her treatment now and then start a fresh.

"We just need to get her cancer free. That's our main concern."

Nicola is positive that the additional funding can be raised.

She continued: "We've been guided by the Bradley Lowery Foundation.

"We feel that we have so many people backing Isla that we truly do think we will be able to get it.

"We've raised over £200,000 so far. The money is a huge amount and we are so grateful."

Even though raising the funds is a huge part of the challenge, the support the family have received has been overwhelming.

Nicola said: "I just want to thank everyone so much for the support. Without them we wouldn't have got this far.

"The money has been amazing but the love and support has also been amazing."

MP helps to secure additional funding

For too long, Havering has been getting a raw deal when it comes to the cash our borough receives from central government because of outdated assumptions that inner London's boroughs have higher funding needs.

Havering now has both the oldest population and fastest growing number of children of any London borough, placing twin pressures on our social care system and housing supply, and a huge strain on our council's coffers.

The disparity of treatment between inner and outer London is one of the things I pledged to raise with government when I first got elected in June. As such, I recently went to see Local Government Minister, Rishi Sunak, with Romford's MP, Andrew Rosindell, and Havering leader, cllr Roger Ramsey, to make our case for additional grants.

A couple of weeks later, the new funding settlement for councils was announced, and we were delighted to see Havering get an extra £2.1million in resource as well as access to a £150million pot to provide adult social care and a share of a £16million Rural Services Grant. Havering will also benefit from London being confirmed as a business rates retention pilot area. This will see London keeping 100 per cent of growth in business rates, which will stay in communities and be spent on local priorities.

The government's settlement is designed to give councils more financial freedom to deliver services for their most vulnerable residents while protecting council tax payers from excessive increases in their bills. I am glad that central government listened to us but we now need the inner-outer London issue to be addressed long-term by changing how grant is calculated. I shall therefore be contributing to the government's new funding consultation to ensure that our borough always has what it needs to deliver the best services to local people.

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Driving on the motorway during rush hour Congestion and accidents can all equate to miles of standstill traffic and long delays, but smart motorways could be the answer. Reducing speed limits to ease congestion and closing or opening lanes to allow for the traffic to flow freely are some of the many ways smart motorways use

technology to avoid congestion. A smart motorway is a section of a motorway that has traffic management methods to make your journey a little more bearable when it's busy. These include using the hard shoulder as a lane and setting variable speed limits to control the flow of traffic and reduce the risk of standstill traffic.

Drivers face stricter fines, however, as

permanently switched on speed cameras were recently launched on the new M1 smart motorway. The cameras have been installed in a bid to crack down on speeding, after one driver was caught travelling along the stretch at 128mph last year. It's the law that wherever a speed limit is displayed, it is adhered to, even on the motorway.

The first smart motorway scheme opened on the M42 in 2006 and has proved to ease traffic and create a better driving experience. Analysis of data showed that journey reliability had improved by 22 per cent and accidents had reduced by more than half.

Parts of the M25, M1, M4 and M6 to name a few have already been converted into smart motorways with another 480 miles of smart motorway lanes being planned.

THE DEATH OF THE SMART WATCH

hey were once heralded as the latest must-have gadget and the future of wearable tech wizardry, so why is it that smart watches have failed to live up to the hype surrounding them?

Modern tech developments have a habit of making devices once only available to 007 a reality, and when Apple launched its first smart watch in 2015 it appeared to be signalling that it was once again paving the way for the future of personal gadgetry. Unfortunately for Apple and the many companies that invested time in creating their own technological timepieces, the smart watch has so far failed to take off.

One of the largest manufacturers of smart watches, Pebble, recently announced that it had sold just one million models over the past two years. So what went wrong for Apple and co? One problem may well be that although the smart watch

can make calls, it is necessary to tether the device to a working smart phone, and most potential buyers were reluctant to shell out hundreds of dollars for something that was really just an accessory to their mobile. Further to this was the realisation that, while Apple pay and other contactless apps were great at first, they quickly became redundant after contactless cards were rolled out nationwide.

Even Apple CEO Tim Cook – who is the first to take to the stage singing the praises of the company's successful creations – has remained strangely silent when it comes to smart watch sales, and future models have generally fallen by the wayside in favour of promoting fresh generations of iPhone or the new wireless Airpod headphones.

Has the Apple watch been a flop? No, not entirely – it even outsold iPhones in its first year on the market. But as buyers began to realise that by and large smart watches don't really do anything a smart phone doesn't, and they have no killer feature to provide the draw for interested parties, the smart watch has certainly fallen short of expectations.
