

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














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Going Solo

he recent troubles experienced by Ant McPartlin have offered the world a scenario once thought impossible - the sight of Dec presenting alone. We look at some famous duos to see whether parting ways brought solo success or whether they should have stayed put.



LAUREL AND HARDY

The biggest comedy duo in the era of classic Hollywood, Stan Laurel and Oliver Hardy made waves for two decades up to the Second World War with their iconic brand of slapstick humour. With decades of TV comedy under their belts, the pair couldn't garner any attention as solo artists, preferring instead to remain dual performers until Hardy's death in 1957.

VERDICT: Better Together





These two much-loved comediennes paved the way for a generation of female entertainment when their show was given one of the biggest budgets in BBC history. Jennifer Saunders went on to win an Emmy Award, and star in Absolutely Fabulous. Dawn French, meanwhile, fronted The Vicar of Dibley series, and even became the voice of Terry's Chocolate Orange for a time.

VERDICT: Solo Success





Ronnie Barker and Ronnie Corbett wrote themselves into the pantheon of British entertainment greats with their sketch show. Ronnie Barker embarked on successful solo projects in the form of Open All Hours and Porridge, to rich acclaim, but the consistency of The Two Ronnies remained until Barker's passing in 2005. Corbett followed him to the comedy convention in the sky two years ago.

VERDICT: Better Together



AMY POELHER AND TINA FEY

This pair of Transatlantic funny-women first found fame on Saturday Night Live, co-anchoring the now famous Weekly Update segment. Following that, they worked both separately and together, on films such as the Fey-penned 2004 cult hit Mean Girls, 2015's Sisters, and won a Golden Globe each for Fey's 30 Rock and Poelher's Parks and Recreation.

VERDICT: Solo Success



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rince Harry and his new wife Meghan Markle are expected to boost Britain's coffers by £500million on their wedding day.

Experts predict the cash will come rolling in as thousands of visitors are expected to flock to the UK for the ceremony at St George's Chapel, Windsor, on May 19, while millions more around the world will watch on TV.

Brands Finance says the increase in tourism, combined with sales of royal memorabilia and the knock-on effect of spending in Britain's shops, bars and restaurants will be huge.

Chief executive David Haigh said the biggest chunk will come from tourism.

He said: "We think approximately £200million will come from tourism, travel and hotels."

Mr Haigh also estimates that royal wedding parties will generate about £150million and souvenirs will, he believes, rake in about £50million. Another £100million at least will be generated in free advertising for UK PLC.

Major royal events are always big money spinners. In 2012, the Diamond Jubilee celebrations boosted tourism by £390million.

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

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Spring carbonara

While the traditional carbonara, with its rich, creamy sauce and fat cubes of pancetta, is delicious, you may want something a little lighter for spring. Made using the same classic cheese sauce (egg yolk, double cream, parmesan), you simply switch out the meat for lightly boiled peas and asparagus tips that have been fried with some crushed garlic. Magnifico.

Ribboned asparagus salad

Trim and wash your asparagus thoroughly before shaving with a potato peeler to create thin ribbons. Add cucumber, tomatoes, avocado and grated parmesan, before dressing with olive and lemon juice. Quite simply, spring in a bowl.

Asparagus and goat's cheese frittata

A hearty brunch or a light supper, a frittata is a great way to get a couple of your five-a-day while still feeling satisfied. Simply sauté 200g of sliced asparagus spears, before setting aside. Then, in a medium pan, fry three large eggs beaten with grated parmesan, and scatter your sliced spears and spoonfuls of soft goat's cheese on top. Cook through before serving with a green salad and an optional glass of white wine.

Asparagus and prosciutto parcels

These salty, creamy and flavoursome parcels make a great sidedish or starter for when you're feeling fancy. Start by blanching asparagus for two minutes before running under cold water. Layer four spears with slices of mozzarella and wrap with prosciutto before frying gently in a pan. Prosciutto should be crispy, mozzarella should be melty, and guests ought to be impressed.

Asparagus soldiers

It is said that enzymes in asparagus help break down alcohol, making this an ideal snack either before or after a heavy session. Step one: soft boil two eggs and some asparagus spears. Step two: dip asparagus into egg. Step three: devour.





Royal Weddings THE CAKES

A LOOK AT THE CAKES OF ROYAL WEDDINGS PAST

rince Harry and his bride to be Meghan Markle have decided they don't want to get fruity on their wedding day and have bucked tradition of not having a traditional fruitcake.

Instead they have gone for a much more modern style - an organic lemon elderflower wedding cake.

The couple have turned to pastry chef and food writer Claire Ptak, below, owner of Violet Bakery in east London, to make the cake, which will be covered with buttercream and decorated with fresh flowers.

His brother Prince William and wife Catherine chose a multi-tiered fruit cake was made by baker Fiona Cairns, and while the decorations were pretty traditional – it featured edible flowers including an English rose, Scottish thistle, Welsh daffodil and Irish shamrock – they also had a chocolate biscuit cake by McVitie's.

Prince Charles has had two bites of the wedding cake. When he married Camilla in 2005, bakers

Sophisticake from Lincolnshire had just four weeks' notice to bake one.

The finished cake weighed in at 17 stone, took around 130 hours to coat and decorate and was made with 20 bottles of brandy. The firm also had to make 2,500 additional slices to fill special commemorative tins.

For his wedding to Diana in 1981 the official wedding cake was a fruitcake with cream cheese frosting. It was five-foot high, weighed 18 stone and was made by David Avery, the head baker of the Naval Armed Forces.

McVitie and Price Ltd, using ingredients given as a wedding gift by the Australian Girl Guides Association, made the official wedding cake at the Queen's wedding.

It was an enormous, ornate affair and stood nine foot tall and was covered in intricately carved cathedral-like designs. It is said to have been cut using Prince Philip's sword. It even had its own nickname – the 10,000-mile wedding cake.



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UNCOVERING





Are electric toothbrushes worthy of their buzz, or does the old-fashioned method do the job just fine?

t's the battle of our times - not Trump vs Clinton or Mayweather vs McGregor, but electric vs manual (toothbrush that is). For some, it's a nobrainer. You floss every day, brush twice a day for the recommended two minutes, and twice a year you visit your hygienist, who always puts a shiny gold star by your name (probably).

But for others it's not so straightforward. The cost can seem extortionate. particularly when compared to your trusty old £3.99 model. Then there's the ongoing cost of replacement heads, the hassle of charging it and the fact that every time you go to buy one, the baffling array of tech makes your head explode - '£250 on a toothbrush? What else does it do?'

Many professionals believe these vibrating little beauties are worth it, with studies claiming that rotating brushes reduce 11 per cent more plague than manual toothbrushes and can also significantly reduce gum problems like gingivitis in as little as four weeks.

Then again, if you do have a lazy disposition, why not invest in a brush that does all the hard work for you? Even the most basic electric designs come with timers that bleep every 30 seconds (for all four areas of your mouth), meaning you can just stand there and gently guide the brush from one tooth to the next as the oscillations get into every crevice.

But any dentist will tell you that the best toothbrush is the one you use. So, if you really struggle to remember to charge it, or travel an enormous amount, you may as well stick to the manual. The bottom line is that you definitely don't need the top-end electric model, but if you care about your teeth at all it's worth investing in one - and it could save you serious dosh in the long run on dental fees.



PROOF

ay fever sufferers rejoice. We have some great tips for helping you survive the season; and yes, you can even ao outside.

Keep an eye on the pollen count

Warm and dry days generally have a higher pollen count, whereas thanks to the rain washing pollen out the air, wetter days have less. So, keep an eye on pollen forecasts and stay indoors as much as possible when it's really high. Certain times of day also bring about an increase in pollen, usually early morning (7am to 10am) and late afternoon (4pm to 7pm).

You can't live like a hermit just because the sun is out, so apply barrier balm around your nostrils (Vaseline works too), and buy a peaked hat and some wraparound shades.

Kemove allergens daily

Hay fever sufferers know that feeling of being bombarded by pollen, and unfortunately there is no way of stopping it getting to you entirely. Saline

spray is a really effective way to wash out all the allergens clinging to your nostrils, so carry one with you. Showering (including hair) and changing your clothes when you get home on high pollen day also

Protect your home

Keeping windows closed on high pollen days is an obvious place to start, but pollen can also sneak in on pets that have been outside, and line-dried clothes. So, avoid snuggling up to poochie, and buy an indoor drying rack.

Zimit time in the city

Despite usually having a lower pollen count than the countryside, all the pollution in urban areas irritates your respiratory tract, making it harder to cope with other allergens.

If all else fails, head to the seaside

Not that you need another excuse for that weekend in Southend, but you'll be pleased to know that the sea breeze blows pollen inland, making seaside resorts a veritable paradise for hay fever sufferers.



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eghan Markle's wedding bouquet is certain to contain a sprig of myrtle, a tradition for royal brides dating back to 1840 when Queen Victoria married Prince Albert. The myrtle for royal brides is almost always cut from a bush at Osborne House, Queen Victoria's residence on the Isle of Wight.

Myrtle symbolises hope and love.

Meghan and Prince Harry have chosen to work with London-based florist Philippa Craddock. For arrangements in St George's Chapel and St George's Hall, she will be using branches of beech, birch and hornbeam, along with white garden roses, peonies and foxgloves.

There is speculation that Meghan will pay a tribute to her late mother-in-law Princess Diana with her bouquet as the Duchess of Cambridge did in 2011.


While Catherine's small, simple bouquet served as a stark contrast to Diana's enormous cascading collection of blooms, both featured lily of the valley. Other British royal brides who have incorporated the local flower in their bouquets are Princess Margaret in 1960, Princess Anne in 1973, and Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall, when she wed Prince Charles in 2005.

Medhan is also expected to carry peonies down the aisle. They are said to be her favourite flower as are roses. But royal bouquets tend to be white.

For her marriage to Prince Philip, the then Princess Elizabeth had chosen an allwhite, free flowing wedding bouquet. It included three types of rather exotic looking orchids: cattleya, cyripedium and odontoglossum - all British-grown - and of course myrtle.

Following their weddings, it is also customary for royal brides to leave their bouquets on the grave of the unknown warrior in Westminster Abbev, a sombre tradition that was started by the Queen Mother in 1923, who left her flowers on the memorial in honour of her brother Fergus, who was killed in the First World War I in 1915.

While Meghan and Harry will be married at St George's Chapel, not Westminster Abbey, she will likely still send her bouquet to the church,



FATHER'S DAY

re you fed up with buying the same generic Father's Day presents for your children to give to their daddy year in and year out? Why not try something different this year and help your child make their own DIY gift? This simple homemade flowerpot is the ideal gift for any green-fingered daddy or grandad and is guaranteed to take pride of place in your garden.

You will need:

- 1 x Terracotta clay pot (big enough to fit your child's handprint on)
- Acrylic paint in various bold colours (green is a must)
- Paint brushes
- \$ 1 x ice cube tray

How to make:

- Lay down some newspaper or an old sheet to protect your floor.
- Fill your ice cube tray with your preferred colours (be sure to include green for the stem and leaves).
- Place your pot on the newspaper/sheet.
- Paint the rim of the pot in your chosen colour (younger ones may need some help with this).
- Help your child paint their hand and tilt the pot slightly to allow them to press their handprint onto it.
- Repeat around the pot in as many different colours as you would like.
- Take a brush and paint on a green stem and two leaves below each of the handprints (as per the image above).
- And voila. You have your homemade handprint flowerpots.

Optional:

You can also personalise your handprint flowerpot by writing 'Happy Father's Day, love from {insert your child's name here}' around the rim of the pot.

Or you could even go one step further and fill your pot with compost and their father's preferred plant or herbs.

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
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2. Bird feeder

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
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British icon Dame Helen Mirren reveals her thoughts on ageing, her inability to resist a juicy role and why you should never call her a movie star.

here's no stopping Dame Helen Mirren. Smart, sexy, and outspoken, the actress is still revelling in the career renaissance that began at age 46 when she began playing *Prime Suspect's* DCI Jane Tennison. Born in London to an English mother and Russian father, Mirren has long been a feminist trailblazer who occupies iconic status today among Hollywood's hopeful young starlets.

Her performances have inspired generations of women - distinguished by a palpable intelligence and steely determination whether playing a military commander (Eye in the Sky), royalty (The Queen), or a Mossad agent (The Debt). If ever there was an archetype of an actress suited to playing strong women, it would be her.

Currently, the formidable and iconic actress is appearing in *The Leisure Seeker*, directed by acclaimed Italian filmmaker Paolo Virzi, and co-starring Donald Sutherland. A compelling romance that depicts the interactions between a woman with terminal cancer and her husband, who's suffering from Alzheimer's. And while the elegant star undoubtedly looks fantastic for her 72 years, she is characteristically candid about the inevitable pitfalls of ageing. "If I have to be honest, there is nothing that pleasant about growing old. You learn to accept your age and all the faults that come with it and you console yourself by believing you are wiser," Mirren says sagely.

"When you're a teenager it seems impossible to think of becoming old. But then you learn to accept it and renounce many things that seemed so important before, like plunging necklines and miniskirts," she adds with a laugh.

Over the years, her sharp wit, cutting humour and boundless talent have earned her 'national treasure' status. Mirren is also incredibly humble, and despite her extensive back catalogue and slew of awards, she refutes the suggestion of being a 'movie star'. "No, I've never thought of myself as that, never considered myself anything close. I'm a working actress, who's been fortunate and lucky, and sometimes the stars align in a certain way," she says, firmly.

Her life off-camera is also admirably straightforward. Mirren has never had children, stating in the past that she has "no maternal instinct whatsoever", and has spent the past 32 years together with Hollywood director Taylor Hackford (*Ray, An Officer and a Gentleman*). They were married in 1997 and currently divide their time between homes in Los Angeles and the village of Tiggiano in Puglia, Italy.

Even she admits it would be easy at this point to while away the days soaking up the wonders of Italy, but unfortunately for Mirren, she has one terrible weakness. "I can never find the willpower to say 'no' to a very good part when one comes along," she confesses.

"I often tell my husband, 'I've done enough, I'm not going to keep pushing myself.' But he's so used to hearing me say that he doesn't even pay attention to me anymore when I make that kind of a declaration. The terrible truth is that I simply cannot resist a good role."

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

School pleads for donations as playground described as 'prison yard'

Aprimary school in Hornchurch is pleading for the communities help to raise £100,000.

Harrow Lodge Primary School has created a Go Fund Me page in order to raise the money for a playground.

Deputy headteacher Lynette Searle said: "The plan to improve the playground for our children has been talked about for 10 years or more but there have been so many other needs for the school that it has simply remained a talking point and nothing more.

"Now, we've decided that the time for talking is over and it's time for action.

"Our children are excited that they may finally get some equipment to climb on, some interesting areas to investigate or some quiet areas to reflect in. But, with national funding for schools slashed, all available funds are needed for necessities so we need to find another way to make our children's dreams come true."

The children at the school are also helping towards the fundraising.

Mrs Searle continued: "The children themselves have decided to save all their pennies in a penny jar in class and we are asking for any help with funding that we can get.

"Our PTA does a fabulous job raising funds but with tighter budgets, much of what they raise will go on replenishing old stock or funding necessities."

Posting on the Go Fund Me page, a spokesperson from the parents of Harrow Lodge Primary PTA said: "We are the only school in the area that hasn't got a play area or equipment for the children to play on at break or lunch time.

"What we have is a concrete playground and a playing field, there is nothing for the children to do when they are outside and they end up just walking around the perimeter of the fences.

"In this day and age teachers and parents find this very sad, but the school just doesn't have the funds."

Children have described the playground as a "prison yard" as there's nothing to play with.

Harrow Lodge Primary PTA raises funds through several events throughout the year, but they are unable to raise the amount needed on their own.

The spokesperson continued: "This is where we are asking for help, it doesn't matter how big or small, we need your donation and help to reach our goal."



The Under 17s Modern Biathlon comprises a 200-metre swim and a 1,600-metre run. It is the combined score in both events that decides where an athlete is placed.



MP attends launch of new support group

I sit down to write this column following a jam-packed constituency day that began with the launch of a new support group for parents of autistic children. Autism is an issue that is raised with me time and again by local parents, whether that is in relation to speech and language therapy, the need for better early years support or problems in finding work for young adults.

First Step in Hornchurch provides many fantastic services to local families affected by autism, and the Prime Minister recently promoted the charity's work on my behalf on her own Twitter account. However, preschool support for autistic children can be patchy and new difficulties can arise within the school environment and beyond as those children grow older. I have raised these issues both in parliamentary debates, and with Havering's head of children's services and the Education Secretary.

At a recent surgery, Yasmin, a dynamic young mum with an autistic son, asked whether we could help her set up a new support group for parents of autistic children. My team worked with Havering Council on Yasmin's request and we have now been able

to launch the group at MyPlace on Harold Hill. The Autism & SEN Parent Support Group will be running from 9am to midday every Friday next to the soft play area in Frankie's Café on the upper level of MyPlace, and we have discussed whether it might be possible to set something up in Havering like the SNAP group in Brentwood, particularly to provide support over the summer holidays.

If there are any parents out there who are struggling, please do go along and speak to Yasmin, who can provide advice about online courses to help your child with speech, and techniques to help them manage their experience of the world. Meanwhile, my team and I will continue to push the broader issues of SEN support up the political agenda in Westminster, and I shall be visiting the Romford Autistic Group Support (RAGS) exhibition at Queen's Theatre to mark National Autism Awareness Week.

CILLY antas made history recently after they launched the first 17-hour non-stop flight from Perth to London Heathrow.

The 14.498km service is now the fastest way to get to Australia - eliminating stops in the Middle East to re-fuel or change planes which can add hours to a journey.

The first flight, carrying more than 200 passengers and 16 members of crew, pushed back just before 7pm on Saturday, March 24 and landed in London at 5am the following day.

The flight reduces total travel time by removing stopovers and taking advantage of the winds when choosing a flight path.

Technology has come a long way, especially aviation. In 1947, it took four days and seven stops to travel from Australia to the UK with the original 'kangaroo route'. It also cost around £525 when the average wage was a mere £7.

Nowadays, the journey is both quicker and more

affordable with the average Australian weekly wage at \$1,600 and a return fare from Perth to London costing less than \$1,300.

Athletes competing at the Commonwealth Games would have had to set off days before they were due to compete just to complete the gruelling journey. But nowadays, they can hop on a plane and be at their destination within 24 hours.

In 1962, Prince Philip travelled to Perth to open the British Empire and Commonwealth Games. Travelling by boat, he set off several weeks before he was due to open the event.

The land down under is now easier to access than ever before. With the new development, tourist numbers are sure to increase with people from Britain taking advantage of the journey.



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his year's Masters at Augusta saw a reigning champion fall from grace spectacularly, while a controversial competitor rose to take the coveted green jacket...

It was on the Friday of this year's Masters Tournament when the current champ, Sergio Garcia, lined up his second shot on the 15th hole. At two over, his was certainly still in the running to defend his title – even if his performance had failed to offer the usual flash and pizzazz we've come to expect of him. But from the moment his lofted attempt over the water hazard guarding the green landed near the hole, only to spin back down the steep slope and disappear into the murky depths, the death knell sounded, and we knew we were in for a new winner.

Four more submerged shots later, and Garcia had equalled the worst score for a hole in the tournament's history - 13 on a par five.

While the Spaniard struggled, one fellow pro was making a concerted effort to inherit the a soon-to-be-vacated trophy. But it wasn't Rory McIlroy – so desperate to achieve his first Masters win – or Jordan Spieth or Rickie Fowler, though both the latter made big gains on the final day to just miss out on top spot. Instead, this year's inductee into the roll-call of golfing green jackets – his first major tournament win – was Texas-native Patrick Reed.

Reed's -16, one-stroke victory, was an impressive statement from a man more used to making his name in his home country with Ryder Cup and Presidents Cup wins – victories that have earned him the moniker 'Captain America'. It was strange, then, that even as Reed made his way into the lead, the crowd's overwhelming response was to lavish support on competitors Mollroy et al.

Even when 27-year-old Reed had confirmed his place among such former champs and golfing greats as Tiger Woods, Nick Faldo and the indomitable Gary Player, the tone was still lacklustre. Why was it that in spite of this being the American's greatest day, there was none of the usual adulation that follows a Masters winner in the immediate aftermath of his triumph?

Perhaps it's because, for years, Reed has been somewhat of a controversial figure both on and off the green. In 2014, he described himself as "one of the top five players in the world", in spite of being just 23 at the time, and having never even played in a major tournament, let alone won one. The same year, at the Ryder Cup, Reed trash-talked his vice-captain Tiger Woods. Later, countryman Jordan Spieth would reveal that the usually mellow Woods quipped back at the brash upstart, saying: "Don't worry, Patrick, you only need 74 more wins and 14 more majors..."

These days, Reed's fellow golfers have become accustomed to his antics, which include the 'drinking offences' that Reed said made him leave Georgia State University, or the oft-denied but enduring allegations of cheating and stealing from the locker room that have also arisen from his time at UGA.

Then there's the messy relationship with his parents that culminated in his wife reportedly escorting Mr and Mrs Reed from the US Open course in 2014. Neither came to see their son's Masters triumph, despite actually living in Augusta.

So while Patrick Reed may well have finally laid his hands on the major tournament win he has long believed was due, it remains to be seen whether his past will ever allow him to be taken to the hearts of golf fans.

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COUNTING

fter years of little change on the currency front, Britain has recently enjoyed an influx of shiny new notes and contemporary coinage. But with the deadlines for spending your old dosh long gone, what can you do about all that unusable wonga?

Everyone should by now be used to our new national coins and notes. Those brand spanking 12 sided pound nuggets, fantastic fivers and tough tenners have entered the UK's money circulation with relatively few hiccups. But for those of us who may have a few of the old editions still stuck down the back of the sofa or crammed in a jar, it may appear that these outdated coins and notes are completely useless in this brave new world of modernised moolah.

Fear not, however, because you can still rely on the Bank of England, who have decreed that their notes "retain their face value for all time". In short, your

1983 £1 coin will always be worth a tidy guid, and no one can take that away from you.

What it doesn't mean is the spending power of that coin remains the same, so while they still have value, don't try to pay for goods and services with them, as vendors do not have a legal obligation to accept them. 

elations between Russia and the West are at such a low that we are now on the brink of a new cold war.

The poisoning of former Soviet spy Sergei Skripal, 66, and his 33-year-old daughter in Salisbury from the nerve agent Novichok has led to mass expulsions round the world of Russian diplomats.

Despite denials of the attack on March 4, Russia is firmly in the dock. Russia Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov has made the ludicrous suggestion that it was Britain itself that carried out the attack on the double agent because the UK Government has found itself in a difficult situation, unable to fulfil promises it made about Brexit.

There is a clear comparison of present-day tensions to the bitter ideological and military rivalry that existed between the Soviet Union and the West from the 1950s to the end of the 1980s.

One man who has vivid memories of those days

in the Sixties is Gary Powers Junior, 50, whose dad, also named Gary, was a pilot who worked for the CIA and who had been captured when his U2 spy plane had been shot down in 1960.

It was the catalyst for a nerve shredding two years when the world was brought to the brink of nuclear war.

The story was a central point in the film *Bridge* of *Spies* starring Tom Hanks as attorney James Donovan, the man who masterminded the spy swap which saw Gary return to the US.

The New York lawyer was the man who worked tirelessly behind the scenes as the fingers of US President John Kennedy and Russia's Nikita Khrushchev hovered over nuclear buttons during the Cuban crisis of 1962. It was the closet the two super-powers have ever come to war.

It was Donovan's negotiations which led to a dramatic peace deal.

He walked across a frost-covered bridge in Cold War Berlin. By his side was British-born KGB spy Rudolf Abel - a man ironically the lawyer had saved from the death penalty at his trial.

On the other side of the Glienicke Bridge in Berlin - the so-called Bridge of Spies, as other spy swaps would take place in later years, was Gary Powers.

Years after his father was shot down and captured there lingered the suspicion that he might have been a traitor who had deliberately crashed his plane. Gary Jnr was technical consultant on the film.

He says he was thrilled by the film.

"So much has been written and said about my father that has not been fair to him but this film does set the record straight," he said.

"The film shows that he was a hero to our country. Steven Spielberg has done a fantastic job and the family are thrilled with *Bridge of Spies*.

"Not only have they recaptured the Cold War

era perfectly, but he has been able to convey the tension and uncertainty that surrounded all those events."

Based on his father's diaries and talks they had before his death about the U2 incident, he was able to give the director and his team an accurate account of what took place.

On May 1, 1960 Powers took off from Peshawar in Pakistan for what he thought was a routine nine-hour mission codenamed Grand Slam.

"Four hours into the flight a missile exploded near to the tail of the U2 as he flew over Sverdlovsk," said Garv.

In the spilt seconds Powers had to bail out he was unable to reach a self-destruct button that would have blown up the U2.

Almost two months after his capture he was convicted of spying and sentenced to 10 years in jail, including seven years' hard labour.


