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ff You're better off dead" is a phrase never more appropriate than for a number of recording artists who have been richer since strolling through the Pearly Gates.

At the end of August, *NME* reported that Michael Jackson was earning more in death than he was when alive.

In the financial year ending 2017, the Michael Jackson estate took in over £60million through a variety of income streams, with merchandising and royalties making up the biggest proportion.

The fact an artist can prosper in death is, of course, not unusual. Firstly, when a notable name dies, in most cases so do a lot of the liabilities that have accompanied them – in Jackson's case it was debts of up to £400million and several lingering lawsuits regarding his music. The removal of these frees up more time for monetisation of the brand.

And of course, never is an artist more revered than in death, with waves of sympathy and sentimentality often translating into big bucks for those lucky enough to be a part of the deceased's estate. Take Jacko as an example - since the singer's death in June 2009, 27 albums and videos have been released in his name; add in singles and the total exceeds 60.

And in 2016, he accumulated revenues of almost £1billion, much of which was from the sale of his half of the Sony/ATV catalogue. That total ranks as the most ever in a year for any entertainer, dead or alive.

The Jackson estate isn't alone in profiting from a singer's sad and untimely demise. Elvis Presley earned £30million in 2017 alone, Bob Marley over £20million – both comfortably more, in one year, than in a whole lifetime of performing; while Tom Petty brought in a similar amount.

In the coming years, we can expect Prince, David Bowie, George Michael, Whitney Houston and Aretha Franklin to begin to climb to similar levels, as those in charge of their estates monetise what, even in death, are iconic and much-loved artists.

Celebrities outside of the music industry are also raking it in. You would be forgiven for picturing Elizabeth Taylor bottling masses of her iconic White Diamonds fragrance – the range brings in over £8million a year, yet she passed away in 2011. And even Albert Einstein is earning years after his passing – his beneficiaries allowed his name to be used in 2017 by Israeli tech company Fourier Systems in exchange for a £9million bounty.

Yet in this cynical world, not all of those left behind are willing for their loved one's brand to be monetised. The estate of legendary country singer Johnny Cash were not willing to be 'bought' when haemorrhoid ointment producers Preparation H applied to use his *Ring of Fire* song in an advertising campaign. His family boomed back: "We would never allow the song to be demeaned like that. It is about the transformative power of love - that is what it will always mean to us."

# BLACK celebrotion

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Black History Month returns in October, and its value in modern Britain appears greater than ever in a period of real cultural conflict.

They say social conflict goes in waves, and whether the fallout from Grenfell, Brexit, Corbyn's anti-Semitism row or the MeToo furore that emanated across the other side of the Atlantic, we are enduring some of the tougher, more challenging times at present.

And yet, despite all of Britain's problems, our embracing of multiculturalism is worthy of true global acclaim. It is perhaps a very British thing to look in on ourselves and criticise, yet all around the UK in every single moment, we are forging new paths and embracing community initiatives.

That makes October's Black History Month all the more important, not just because it acts as a vibrant, colourful, artistic and, yes, at times, sombre reflection on the cultures who have enriched this nation, but also because in its very essence it invites people of every race and

skin colour to share in and celebrate the achievements of black culture – from the first footings on these shores with the Windrush generation, to everything since and so much more before.

The idea was first put forward in the UK by Ghanaian activist Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, who had served as a special projects coordinator for the GLC (Greater London Council) in 1987. His efforts to mark specifically the historical trials and achievements of black people was a new thing in this country, but its popularity quickly spread well beyond the capital.

Wind forward 31 years and while we, North America and, strangely, the Netherlands, celebrate Black History Month each year, globally, the take-up remains slow.

What better way then to let others sample a month of talks, initiatives, concerts, workshops and, of course, some quiet reflection, by showing them how the world's most diverse and multicultural society can express its gratitude and respect for our black heroes of days gone by.

ove her or loathe her, Victoria Beckham's climb from pouting pop wannabe to revered name in the fashion world has been nothing short of remarkable.

Once upon a time, when Britpop and Britney ruled the airwaves, when sport logo sweatshirts were an acceptable form of daywear, and when everyone thought Tony Blair was the bee's knees, there was a slender pouty pop princess who went by the name of Posh Spice. Revered and admired throughout the land for her ability to warble her way through some of the chart's finest offerings, the solemn singer had a life many dream of, but few attain.

However, despite her wealth and football star hubby David Beckham, Posh Spice was not fulfilled, for in her heart she wanted not to traverse the globe playing to enormous arenas of millions of shrieking fans alongside her fellow Spice Girls, but to be a fashion designer, a dream she dared not to speak of for fear of being laughed out of the Top of the Pops studio.

Fast forward 20 years and not only is the artist formerly known as Posh an established designer, but her eponymous fashion brand is both commercially successful and creatively celebrated among the fashion elite, as it marks its 10th anniversary with a London Fashion Week debut.

Normally, she unveils her collections at New York Fashion Week but chose to do something different to mark the special occasion.

After all, it was she in the Spice Girl heyday who was arguably the trendsetter within the gang – Union Jack minis aside – with her pixie crop hair, asymmetric dresses and lashings of leather. Then, when she began dating Becks, she became the epitome of the glamorous WAG helping her other half become a style icon along the way.

So, if you think Victoria Beckham looks a tad smug as she gazes out from the latest cover of *Vogue* surrounded by her four equally gorgeous children (the illustrious 'September issue' no less), bear in mind that while fame and money can buy many things, they cannot garner respect in an industry as cutthroat as fashion. Like all burgeoning designers, she has had to put in the hard graft, and has done so with grace and admirable flair, doggedly building her empire season by season.

Today the label is valued at a whopping £100million, with over 100 staff worldwide, and two luxury boutiques (one in Hong Kong and one in London's Mayfair). Much like her persona, those ready-to-wear collections have a serious and grown-up feel with the odd thrill. Immaculately tailored wool coats, elegant silk shirts, polo necks and structured dresses in unforgiving cuts are firm staples in her arsenal, none of which come cheap (dresses start around the £1,000 mark, while a coat is double that); while budget fashionistas can indulge with the nominally less eye-watering Victoria, Victoria Beckham line.

And so it is that the glum popette became the toast of the fashion world against all expectations. And though there will always be those who mock her musicality and insist the Beckhams' 19-year marriage is in jeopardy, when it comes to fashion, Victoria is the undisputed queen of her kingdom.





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### FINDING THE RIGHT BROW SHAPING METHOD FOR YOUR EYEBROWS



yebrows are like a rug in a room: they pull the entire look together. Eyebrows when groomed well can make you look like a movie star, but when groomed badly they transform your face into a gruesome mask.

For many years the trend was thin brows - a look which harked back to the silver screen days of the early twenties when cinema sirens like Clara Bow shaved their brows then drew them back on again in a severe pencil line. Buying your first pair of tweezers as a teenage girl was a rite of passage as you plucked and preened your way to eye-watering glory. But now, thanks in part to Cara Delevingne, big brows are back in fashion.

The change has brought about a revelation in beauty - an entire industry, almost, created off the furry back of the brow. Dedicated salons are popping up in department stores across the country as women seek out the perfect look, while every major cosmetic brand now has a range devoted to the facial follicles, from powders to gels and tints.

In short, brows have become a major industry, and with good reason. After all, they make you look incredible, enhancing your natural beauty. Got a round face? Go for a high, sharp line, whereas heart-shaped faces prefer a straighter look. Open up close-set eyes by elongating your brow with a pencil, whereas wideset eyes suit a softer, more feathery brow.

When it comes to plucking, there's just a few things to bear in mind... firstly, you want to grow them as much as possible so you start with a fuller shape. Now hold a pencil vertically at the middle of each nostril to find the start of your brow, then pivot to the outside of your iris for the arch, then pivot once more to the edge of your eye for the end. Now with your template in place you can start plucking strays. Always pluck from underneath, and remember. less is more: remove a few hairs at a time and then step back to see the overall effect.

So don't spend your life feeling like a wallflower - invest in a dramatic look for raised eyebrows wherever you go.

### THE PASO DOBLE

A passionate dance that is not for the faint hearted. the paso doble centres around posture and a succession of different movements involving many parts of the body. With this dance, you are engaging 80-90 per cent of your muscles at any one time.

With moves such as the Sur Place which works the calves, feet and ankles, the Zigzag which uses the hips and abdominals and the Albatross which relies on upper body strength.

### WAI TZ

This ballroom dance requires you to use your upper back muscles, in particular your upper arms and shoulders including your triceps and deltoid muscles.

Remember hearing the judges talk endlessly about the importance of a "good frame"? To achieve this, dancers must have a strong back, open chest and arms elevated to shoulder height.

### THE TANGO

This fast paced dance offers a full aerobic workout. The tango specifically works your core muscles and is ideal for those wanting to strengthen their abdominals. The constant stream of twists and turns will tone your ankles; essential for regular high heel wearing.

### **SWING**

A full-on injection of cardio is provided with swing dancing; raising your heartbeat and burning on average 300 calories per hour. The dipping and twirling moves that are required for this dance can help increase your overall muscle density, especially in your upper body. Other muscles used include your hamstrings, quads, calves and inner thighs.

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Now classified as a World Heritage site, the rock is situated 335km south-west of Alice Springs – or 440km by road, about five hours – and is served by the small resort town of Yulara. This is where tourists stay, and most people spend the night either in hotel accommodation or camping; there are no actual camping or other facilities within the Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park. Recent years have seen the Australian government give back control to the Aboriginal peoples for whom the rock represents a spiritual place. Though most Westerners know of Ayers Rock – so called in the 1970s after then South Australia chief secretary Henry Ayers – Aboriginal tribes were living in the area over 10,000 years ago, and now the Pitjantjatjara people own the land around the giant stone monolith.

Visitors can climb the terracotta face of the rock to reach the summit, although this practice was often criticised for both the disrespect it showed towards the Aborigines' reverence of the structure and the damage it was doing to the stone itself. The Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park board of management has announced that tourists will be banned from climbing Uluru from October 2019... so you have a year left. Tourists can still explore the 10km of roads and trails that surround Uluru's base, and are encouraged to visit during sunrise or sunset to really capture a glimpse of this unique stone at its breathtaking best.

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If you suffer from anxiety or get easily flustered when travelling, an app which uses binaural beats (repetitive sound waves) to "entrain the brain to different states" can be very helpful. Binaural can also alleviate jet lag and will help to reset your sleep clock, making that five-hour stopover slightly less horrendous.

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# SOMETHING SMELLS

If you're a lover of seafood wrapped in rice Japanese-style, be warned: by 2050, there's a good chance that climate change will have ruined this delicate culinary delight for good.

Www.ith its seaweed covering, sticky rice interior and sliver of raw fish, sushi has exploded from out of Japan to become a worldwide food craze. But for all those people who love to dine on dragon rolls and uramaki during a work lunch, there's trouble ahead with climate change set to impact on the sea's fish population.

As the world's seas get warmer, and the water becomes more acidic, life in the ocean is going to get a lot tougher for the vast majority of creatures we like to wrap in rice and wolf down with wasabi. Add to that the perils of overfishing and habitat destruction, and the future of sushi looks bleak.

Take coral bleaching, for example. Although the majority of us have an inkling of the mass demolition of the world's reefs, it's a pretty abstract idea to anyone who doesn't spend their time diving in their bountiful fish havens. And while the sushi industry has little need for the brightlycoloured critters that cling to reefs in computer screensavers and travel agent ads, the fish sushi chefs are after – bluefin tuna or mackerel, for example – are at the top of the food chain and therefore rely on reefs as their food source.

CARLES AND THE PROPERTY OF

Great Britain is currently battling the French to finalise a deal to stop the scallop wars in the English Channel. A ban was put on French fishermen from catching scallops between May 15 and October 1 to conserve stocks, but the British aren't subject to the ban. New tensions are also rising as Cornish fishermen have accused the French of deliberately sabotaging their crab pots. Both food wars will cost fishermen hundreds of thousands of pounds.

Already in Japan, fish that was readily available some years ago, such as the yellow croaker, is now a delicacy – and with one recent bluefin tuna being sold at market for around £60,000 it seems that what was once abundant is fast becoming a very expensive culinary choice.

The alternative? For chefs to start using surimi – a processed form of fish that you find in supermarkets labelled as artificial crab or similar. Some have even looked to incorporating more vegan options into their food, or experimenting with insect-based sushi. And that, compared to a nice piece of nigiri or a tasty morsel of traditional temaki, is for many people a disheartening prospect indeed.

### ALL THAT GLITTERS ISN'T GOLD... ADD IN A BIT OF YELLOW TOO

or a long time, gold's reputation as an interior décor colour was anything but opulent - a generation of faux variants had left the world's most precious metal flagging rather. Yet its return, along with a resurgence of yellow, has opened up some fantastic new interior ideas.

But why are these particular colours making a comeback? Well, psychologists believe recent tough economic times meant we favour shades with positive psychological qualities. Yellow screams happiness, optimism and confidence for the future; gold is the colour of ambition, and more prosperous times ahead. What's not to like?

### **COMBINE WITH DARK TONES**

Gold, in particular, radiates against very dark tones, and the contrast between the shimmer of gold and sheer darkness offers a classy touch. Yellow, similarly, can really fire against an offset colour – in this case, we'd recommend grey.

### **IT'S ALL IN THE ACCENT**

Rather than layering colours over an existing space, a recent trend has been to offer various hints of colours that add warmth and light, with gold and yellow right at the front of the queue. So forget statement walls and instead replace pictures with gold frames; paint a desk chair, add a throw on a sofa, redo cushions and perhaps even replace a curtain pole with golden tones. ### **MAKE A STATEMENT**

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# Would you buy a MICRO-HOME?

Micro-homes, defined as properties 37 square metres, are becoming increasingly popular in the UK since the government introduced the new act in 2013 under the Permitted Development Rights.

So, are these homes the longawaited solution to the UK's housing crisis?

### CHEAPER TO BUY

A smaller house means a smaller mortgage; so less debt, less tax to be paid and even a cheaper home insurance policy. Alternatively, you could rent a micro-home at much less expense than a larger property.

### SMALLER UTILITY BILLS

A smaller space means smaller rooms to heat, a smaller surface area to light and less space for electrical items to be plugged in. You could even consider having solar panels installed or collect rain water for garden use to save further.

### LESS CONSUMERISM

If you have less square footage, you are more likely to think carefully about any

icro-homes, defined as properties under purchases you make that will need to be stored in 37 square metres, are becoming your home. Instead, you can find ways to increasingly popular in the UK reuse and recycle existing possessions.

### ENCOURAGES CREATIVITY

### LESS TIME SPENT RENOVATING

A smaller home takes less time to decorate, furnish and needs less upkeep. Also think of how many hours you will save cleaning. That's more time you can spend with your family doing things you enjoy.

### REMEMBER YOU NEED A PLOT

If you are planning to build or purchase a micro-home, you will need a plot of land. You can register your interest with a land agent, look to an auction or search the web (Plotsearch and Rightmove are good places to start).

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# HOW TO MAKE CANDLES

he arrival of autumn creates the need to feel warm, cosy and comforted in preparation for the harsh winter that lies ahead. What better way to achieve this than with an array of homemade, fall-scented candles?

### WHAT YOU WILL NEED

As Seen On

A selection of glass jars (mason jars work well)
 Wick

- 1 x cup of beeswax
- 1 x cup of coconut oil
- 1 tablespoon of your preferred spices

This amount makes roughly one pint of candle mixture.

### HOW TO MAKE

1. Place an individual wick in each jar

2. Tape the wick to the bottom of the jar

**3.** Take the top of the wick and wrap around a pencil and place back in the centre of the jar

**4.** Melt the beeswax, coconut oil and your chosen spices together in a separate jar above a pan of boiling water (the same process as when you melt chocolate)

5. Remember you want to melt the ingredients, not boil them together

6. Stir with a spoon as the mixture melts

7. Once melted, pour a small amount into each glass jar and wait to set (this will help the wick stick to the bottom)

8. Pour in more mixture until the jar is sufficiently full

9. Wait for the wax to harden

**10.** Light your scented candles and enjoy the aroma of autumn throughout your home

Spice combinations we love include pumpkin pie spice (cinnamon, ginger, allspice and cloves) and apple pie spice (cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice).

Alternatively, you could add vanilla, chocolate or coffee essence depending on the mood you want to create your personal preferences.



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s the new series of X Factor kicks off, with Mr Marmite taking centre stage again, let's be frank, Simon Cowell regularly gets a bad rap. The black/grey/white clothes combos, the overexposed chest, the dodgy hairstyle ... and that's just how he looks. Add in the fact X Factor and Britain's Got Talent are mercilessly ripped apart for being exploitative, fake. unimaginative and cliched, and it makes you wonder why the record label mogul bothers... it's certainly not because he needs the money. Yet look at it the other way around. What sort of world would we be living in without Simon Cowell? Forget all the music careers he's launched, the tens of millions of records sold, the multiple sell-out tours for everyone from One Direction to Olly Murs, Westlife to Little Mix, not to mention the positive impact he's had on countless others as a result of exposure on his primetime shows - just consider this... there's no one else in the entertainment world we love to hate more.

It's been another modestly good year for Cowell, who celebrates his 58th birthday in October. Batting off the Ant & Dec furore with typical ease, he has lauded over one of the most successful series of *BGT*, won by disability comedian Lost Voice Guy. The show's final pulled in 11.2million viewers, the most watched in three years and a return to form for a format that had been struggling.

Cowell also made it onto the Hollywood Walk of Fame

in tribute to his contribution to the US entertainment business. Over the years, our exports across the Atlantic have struggled, yet in Cowell, James Corden and a few recent others, we have never been stronger Stateside. He joined fellow Brits Steve Jones (of Sex Pistols) and Sir Richard Branson in being honoured at the June ceremony, and chirped: "If anyone says fame is a bad thing, I don't know what you're talking about. It's the best thing in the world."

Yet there was also a lot of humility on show from the industry's most famous A&R man, who praised his late parents and offered hope that his son Eric, four, might follow in his footsteps.

"I have a feeling my mum and dad are looking down on me, and now I can look over to my son Eric and say: 'Maybe one day you'll get one of these as well.'"

But Cowell can't rest on the successes of 2018 - he's a new series of *X* Factor to kick into shape. Freshly back on our screens, Simon is ably assisted on the judging panel by Louis Tomlinson, Ayda Field, Robbie Williams and, for the live shows, Sharon Osbourne.

"Again it's the greatest showcase of the talent that we have out there," he says. "It never ceases to amaze me just how brilliant these people are, not just in their voices and their ability to entertain, but in how brave they must be to go stand up in front of a live audience and sing their hearts out.

"Without these artists I would be nowhere, and the fact we can still, after all these years, transform the dreams of a lucky few into reality, is a marvellous thing."

# **Police Station Saved** after being acquired by council

Alocal police presence has been guaranteed after Hornchurch Police Station.

After refusing to accept London Mayor's Office for Police and Crime's (MOPAC) decision to close police access points in the south of the borough, Havering Council brought High Court action challenging their decision to close the police station, as well as many others across London.

The agreement means the council will be able to acquire a freehold of the police station and grant a lease to the Metropolitan Police.

Residents will be able to access the police in the same way as they could prior to the closure of the police access point in the south of the borough. Councillor Damian White, leader of Havering Council, said: "We are delighted to have reached an agreement with MOPAC, following the mayor's appalling decision to strip Havering of a key police base in the south of the borough.

"Residents have told us that they want to see more police officers on the streets in their neighbourhoods, and by stepping in and refusing to accept MOPAC's short-sightedness, the council has secured the future of the police station in Hornchurch.

"The outcome of the mayor's savage cuts to local policing would have meant residents in this part of Havering having to travel to Romford for their nearest police station.

"This is a great victory for the council."

### Have your say on education in Hornchurch

# **MP pleased police station saved**

Ceptember began with some good news on local Opolicing after a year-long campaign by Hornchurch & Upminster Conservative Association led to a breakthrough on Hornchurch Police Station.

The station was earmarked for closure by the Mayor of London in July 2017, and the local Conservative team collected hundreds of signatures against the move after residents expressed fears about the clustering of police resources in Romford, Havering Council will now purchase the station and lease it back to the Met to guarantee a police presence in the area.

It is fantastic news that the council has responded to our residents' petition and will be keeping Hornchurch Police Station in police use. This was a campaign led by our chairman Bob Perry and with Bob now elected to council and chairing the crime and disorder committee, we have a strong voice within the town hall on police issues.

Earlier this month I met Metropolitan Police Commissioner Cressida Dick to talk about the Hornchurch purchase and we discussed how councils and police might work together even more closely in future to share resources and build safer communities. I know residents are fed up with the 101 reporting number, and the commissioner offered assurances that investment in new systems is already leading to big improvements. She also believes new technology is beginning to free up officer time for patrols.

I have also visited Queen's Hospital again this month to talk to their Bereavement Team about the important work they do during families' most difficult times. I have continued my work with a Hornchurch resident to highlight the issue of sepsis in the hope that we can improve diagnosis and treatment on the NHS, and I have met independent retailers on Hornchurch High Street to see how we might enliven the town centre and ensure that our shops and services thrive.

Since my last column, I am also delighted to report that it looks like the heritage centre for RAF Hornchurch will be going ahead on the former St George's Hospital site. I am now working with the Hornchurch Aerodrome Historical Society to see how we can create a fully-functioning heritage, education and cultural asset that properly memorialises this important site for the community and acknowledges its role in our national story.

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# Police appeal for potential victims to come forward



Police responsible for jailing a man who raped a teenager in Thurrock over 30 years ago have urged anyone who thinks they may have been a victim of the same man to come forward.

Christopher Clark, 68, was jailed at Basildon Crown Court for 13 years with a five-year extended licence after pleading guilty to raping the woman in 1985.

Serial rapist Clark, who was already serving life for another serious sexual offence when he was sentenced, lived in the county and officers believe he may have carried out other offences.

Essex Police have now released an image of Clark as he looked in 1996 to help victims come forward. In 1986 he was arrested and charged with 13 offences including rape and burglary with intent to rape.

During incidents in Hornchurch and Upminster he raped the women in their own home. Clark was convicted in relation to five of these offences, with the court ordering eight to lie on file, and he was jailed for 10 years.

Clark was released from prison in 1996 and it is thought he may have regularly travelled to Essex and other areas in the South East prior to once again being locked up in 1997 in connection with another sexual offence in Bath.

Senior Investigating Officer DCI Stephen Jennings of the Kent and Essex Serious Crime Directorate said: "If you recognise Clark from the images shown and have been a victim of a sexual offence perpetrated by him but have not yet come forward to police, please do."

They moved back into the house only six months ago, and the cash was in the outhouse - used as an office - because the final stage of building work was being carried out.

Gill Nash wants to warn others. She said: "We never keep money in there, and we definitely won't be anymore. We won't get the money back but we want to find out who these men are.

"I mean we're all young in this house but if it had been an elderly couple that they targeted they wouldn't have been able to do anything.

"They need to be caught and they need to be punished."

A spokeswoman from the Met Police said: "Entry was gained to an outbuilding by two suspects who smashed glass doors and a stole a quantity of cash. "They were confronted by an occupant and made

off through the rear of the garden.

"Officers with dogs attended but despite a search were unable to find the suspects."

### **Drivers warned about ghost broking**

Drivers in Hornchurch are being warned about a fraud called ghost broking where car insurance packages are being sold by fraudsters.

Last month, Action Fraud and City of London Police launched a campaign under the hashtag #SteerClearOfFraud.

Now police across the capital want to raise awareness about the tactics used and how you can avoid becoming a victim.

The scam involves people, particularly aged between 17 and 24, being offered deals that are not genuine.

Suspects carry out the fraud by either giving you forged insurance documents, falsify your details to bring prices down or even taking out a genuine policy and cancelling soon after to claim a refund and your money.

Detective Chief Inspector Lee Morton, head of Kent and Essex's Serious Economic Crime Unit, said: "There are more severe consequences to the scam than just losing your hard earned money.

"By not having a valid car insurance, you could get points on your driving licence, your car seized and even destroyed, and you may receive a fixed penalty notice or be liable for claim costs following an accident.

"Scammers will target victims through social media, they may place adverts in newspapers or could cold call you. In some instances, the suspects have been recommended by friends and family who are unaware they have fallen for the scam."

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# HISTORY OF THE BREATHALYSER

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O

t's the gadget most of us have dreaded at some point, yet as we pass the half-century mark of the Road Traffic Act – which introduced the first legally enforceable maximum blood alcohol level for drivers in the UK – we must credit the simple breathalyser as being one of the road's greatest lifesavers.

When inventor Robert Frank Borkenstein finally gained a registered trademark for his breathalyser invention in 1954, little did he know the gadget would still be going strong all these years later.

Previous incarnations of a piece of kit that, simply, measures blood alcohol levels, had been about for a few decades, with Chicago chemist William

a blood test – yet it's still not the kind of technology you can fool. And with good reason - after all, over a quarter of all fatal road crashes in the UK have alcohol at their source.

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ENGLAND LEGEND ALASTAIR COOK RETIRES FROM INTERNATIONAL CRICKET

he polish may have worn thin after a string of under-par performances, but upon retirement from Test cricket, Alastair Cook's place as one of the modern batting greats in the world game is without question.

Having made his Test debut against India in March 2006, it was perhaps fitting that 33-year-old Cook should conclude matters against the same nation some 12 years later, in between scoring 12,472 runs, including 33 centuries and 57 half-centuries, as well as accumulating an incredible 158 consecutive Test appearances, and 161 in total.

"You know when the time is right to go," said Cook, after an emotional farewell at The Oval, during which his second innings of 147 runs saw him become the fifth highest Test run scorer of all time. "I will take away from cricket some incredible memories and this is a sport that has really defined me as a person, but it's now time to do something different."

Cook, who even has a much less discussed but equally impressive bowling average of seven – admittedly he's only ever bowled three overs and dismissed one batsman – will take time away from the sport this winter to be with wife Alice and daughters Elsie and Isabelle. Yet his decision to retire from England duty doesn't mean he'll never pick up a bat again – he's contracted to Essex Cricket Club and will be keen to spearhead his county's Division One title charge next season.

And on those quiet afternoons in the field, he can look back fondly on a raft of memories – from hitting 294 against India at Edgbaston in 2011 to captaining England to away Ashes success in Australia, to how he might plot a route out of retirement and back into the fold...

"No, that won't happen," he laughs. "My time is done and now I can watch others stand at a crease for seven hours with Exocet missiles being aimed at their heads."

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an anyone pack a punch like Anthony Joshua? We're going to

find out, with AJ, seemingly, six months from boxing folklore. For just a second, we were worried about our

newest boxing hero. Two rounds into Anthony Joshua's latest multiple world title defence, Russian veteran Alexander Povetkin caught the Watford-born hardman with a succession of blows. Blood poured from the nose of the 28-year-old as he staggered to regain both his feet and his composure. And yet, true champions are often constructed not just on their achievements, but their setbacks too, and after losing the first two rounds of a packed 85,000-sell-out Wembley Stadium contest, AJ eased effortlessly into a mindset of power, precision and no small amount of patience. Povetkin tired, and in the seventh round Joshua delivered a devastating succession of punches that saw his

opponent floored, and subsequently defeated for only the second time in his life. "I'm still learning, I'm getting there," said AJ. "I'm not making claims but I deserve some credit." He's quite correct in that – to already hold the WBA, IBF, WBO and IBO proves a sumptuous array of victorious sporting provess. "I know I can go much further – just line up my opponents and I will prove it." he postured.

And yet, now the real posturing begins. It looks as though unbeaten American WBC champ Deontay Wilder will be next up, with April 13 the date on everyone's lips. Joshua wants to prove, beyond doubt, that he can take care of anyone, and the WBC belt remains the last to be won. What we're left to ponder is this: is strapping, humble, 6ft 6" Joshua the finished product? No. Is he unbeatable? No. But is he the best boxer in the world? All the evidence suggests so, and in April – whether he's fighting Wilder, Tyson Fury, Dillian Whyte or anyone else – the sensible money says he'll prove it. ഗ
