With over 30 years' experience in the industry I have asked this question many times. I have bought, sold and managed a large amount of property and time and time again, I ask the question, 'What makes a good block management agent?'

The communal aspect of any development is usually the collective responsibility amongst a group of homeowners and is often overlooked or passed to another individual to control. Frequently I've heard residents complaining about the state of the gardens, the mess of the bin store and flaking paint in the corridors.

Though keenly aware of the problem, it is likely they have little knowledge of where to find the solution. It never fails to surprise me that homeowners cannot answer the fundamentals surrounding the upkeep of their home and something that greatly impacts on the day-to-day comfort of their living space.

On a number of occasions, I have asked, 'Who manages your development?' 'Are there funds in your account to decorate?' Who is responsible for cleaning?' The response is as predictable as it is repetitive, 'No idea, it's not my problem, so and so looks after that and it's not my responsibility'. As a homeowner all aspects of a development should be our responsibility - looking after our properties is not just about re-designing the interior, but it's also about looking after our communal areas the gardens, the décor, the foyer, even down to the bin store - these are an integral part of our homes, greeting us before we reach our very own front door. This is why at Scott & Stapleton we believe it is key to ensure there is an effective arrangement in place to deal with matters that many leaseholders see as less important or 'someone else's problem'.

An appropriate contract to manage onsite gardening, the frequency with which communal areas are cleaned, building insurance and an adequate maintenance programme are essential to ensuring the block remains in good structural and cosmetic condition. Health and safety, fire risk assessments, risks of Legionella, asbestos, trip hazards, communal electrical safety, emergency light testing, annual dry riser maintenance and smoke vent testing are all elements not to be sniffed at - they are integral to our safety. A Laissez faire attitude can result not only in personal injury, but strict accounting responsibilities for service charges and major works, if not adhered to, can deem a charge uncollectable.

Traditionally the myriad of responsibilities can fall to one elected resident or panel of people to retain control. A successful relationship can be a residential management company who will correspond with a managing agent, alternatively a group of directors may have been appointed as 'the voice' of your development and will interact directly with the managing agent. An agent can approve budgets and make informed decisions on areas for improvement, while advising on the best use of funds prior to the end of the service year. It is essential that decisions reflect the development as a whole, with home-owners input and concerns being of paramount importance.

A poorly managed block, not only creates a worn façade, but carries huge financial impact, ultimately devaluing the property itself. Scott & Stapleton recently acquired a block, previously managed by an agent who had failed to adhere to basic requirements. Inconsistencies materialised around quality of services, appropriate costing and service charge allocation, which resulted in a resident reimbursement of fees in excess of £50,000.

If done correctly, a managing agent can maintain the value of your property, while at the same time alleviating stresses and maintaining standards.

As an owner of several leasehold properties myself, I have an avid investment and interest in block management and understand the importance of having an experienced block agent. As the industry changes and evolves, we are becoming more involved with the management of our homes. We understand the impact our homes have on our quality of life - looking after them is imperative and not just behind closed doors.

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A LIFE IN THE LENS - LOOKING AT THE IMPACT LORRAINE KELLY HAS HAD ON OUR MORNING ROUTINES

orraine Kelly is a doyenne of the terrestrial TV morning schedule – a homely, kind, softly spoken presenter whose ability to mix everyday life with A-list red carpet celebrity excess has made her one of our most cherished broadcasters.

At the end of November, the Scottish presenter turns 60. She has dedicated more than half of her life to the interview sofa, in the process achieving the quite unique feat of never seeing her popularity wane, despite the wildly changing fortunes of the shows she has been a part of, from TV-AM, GMTV, ITV Breakfast and Daybreak, not to mention revisions to her own lifestyle and entertainment show Lorraine.

Since joining the first of those ITV breakfast show incarnations in 1984, the Glasgow-born journalist has been a stalwart, effortlessly combining heavy news, serious topics and controversy-laden stories with light entertainment's feel-good factor.

From covering the Lockerbie bombing in 1989 to guest-hosting BBC2 comedy-quiz series Never Mind the Buzzcocks, to providing voiceovers and narration on CBeebies programme Raa Raa the Noisy Lion, Lorraine's appetite for variety is only ever at odds with her constant chipper, chirpy, uplifting tone that effervesces warmth and friendliness.

'EMOTIONAL, FUNNY, ENTERTAINING AND WITH A HEART OF GOLD'

Lorraine was the recipient of an OBE in 2012, and a year later fellow weekday morning magnate Piers Morgan made Lorraine the subject of one of his *Life Stories*. Emotional, funny, entertaining and with a heart of gold, she wept at recalling the images of Dunblane, a massacre that occurred just 35 miles from where she grew up.

And yet Lorraine, like Piers, has always been able to mix tragedy with optimism in almost Shakespearean flits between heartache and happiness – from the most exposed portrayals and gravest of real-life stories to, in complete contrast, Lorraine's own "exposure", made public by a temeritous Piers who embarrassed the Scot when he displayed a picture of her naked on a sunbed from a newspaper cutting, before presenting it to her in a frame.

Morgan's comment that the host's secret to her seemingly ageless demeanour is that she is "such a great laugh both on and off-camera" is the truest ode. Her instantly-recognisable giggle has kept her liked and adored by the British public. Combining this with a sense of style that is brave, bold, free from convention and with the specific intention of making the wearer feel satisfied, she flies a flag for anyone putting themselves first.

"It's true, sometimes I do find myself wearing clothes an 18- or 19-year-old might have in their wardrobe," she has said. "In the past I would have thought twice, but I think as the years go on you realise how important it is to dress in a way that makes you feel happy."

Weight loss has also been another topic close to the TV personality. Brutally honest about her appearance, she recently revealed that she'd been able to lose almost a stone in weight in just over six weeks thanks to cutting out carbs.

It is perhaps the one thing we will allow the "Queen of Daytime TV" to limit. The rest – the friendly smile, the sense of community and the ability to make every viewer feel like they are in the room with her – we will keep... thank you, Lorraine.


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
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DAVID COLLINS

and a design legacy that continues to evolve



The designer passed away just over six years ago, but his impact on the industry was profound, and his legacy continues to be enjoyed on a daily basis by the millions who flock to London every day.

Collins' style was in luxury interior design. Flanked by his David Collins Studio, the

organisation has become renowned for chic, clean, glamorous design with an eye on heritage – ideas that are so applicable to London's sleek, rich, cosmopolitan feel, and often embracing his favourite colour, Lutyens blue.

Designing restaurants for Marco Pierre White, Pierre Koffmann and Marcus Wareing; patterning The Wolseley, The Delaunay Hotel, Claridge's, The Connaught and retail interiors for Harrods, Jimmy Choo and Alexander McQueen, Collins' style is as ubiquitous as it is unique – mainly because he has had an effect on so many.

The designer also swayed effortlessly into the pop world, and was responsible for Madonna's London and New York apartments which he curated with such swagger she gave him a co-writing credit on the track 'Drowned World/Substitute for Love', which appeared on Madge's 1998 album 'Ray of Light'.

Collins died in mid-July 2013 through complications arising out of a particularly virulent skin cancer – it had only been

diagnosed three weeks previously.

Regardless, his studio continues to deliver iconic works of art and interior design, and is the recipient of numerous top-ranking awards.

It would be fitting to end with a quote from Madonna: "When I look around my houses, I am struck by what an influence he has had on me. He has left his souvenirs everywhere: his touch, his taste, his flair and his blue."

Mother set to pay lasting tribute to her inspirational son

The mother of a teenager from Leigh-on-Sea who died recently after a long battle against leukaemia is determined to keep her son's memory alive.

Charlie Reed was just 16 when he passed away and his mum Shelley Legge is planning to honour him through taking up one of his hobbies.

Shelley said Charlie had a special bond with his stepfather Dan and his brother Teddy. A talented drummer, he continued playing throughout his diagnosis. Shelley has now begun music lessons herself in the hope to one day be almost as good as Charlie was.

Shelley said: "He'd written a few songs about bullying and his diagnosis. We want to try and get them put to music and get them out there for everyone to hear."

A year before Charlie died, a huge swab drive to try and find a bone marrow match for him was organised by the Gold Geese charity and saw more than 500 people give swabs. So many were inspired by Charlies story that 4,000 applications to join of the

donor register came from the town.

Shellev said: "People were inspired by his story and he was a real hero. He could have potentially saved another 4,000 lives."

Charlie's funeral at Southend Crematorium on October 7 was attended by more than 250 people.

Shelley said: "I thought they were guests from a previous service but it turned out that they were there for Charlie. We couldn't squeeze everyone in, so speakers were broadcasting the service to those who had to stand outside."

Shelley will now be focussing on raising awareness about drug misuse among people Charlie's age.

She said: "He was on such a huge amount of drugs to keep him alive and he had no choice but other young people don't think about the damage they are doing to themselves."

She will also be helping other families with children affected by cancer and wants to raise awareness of the symptoms in the hope that children are diagnosed



Adventurous lads go back to where it started

ight "adventure-hungry" lads from Leigh-on-Sea who made history by becoming the first people to drive a London double-decker bus around the world, finally completed their journey after 52 years.

The proclaimed 'Essex Bus Bovs', Ron Sverdloff, Albert Pidgeon, Tony Reina, Rob Carter, Ken Wilkinson, Derek Jones and Ron 'Twiggy' Still were keen to explore the world.

Being all single at the time and not tied down to anything, Ron S. bought the second-hand 1949 Bristol 5KG ONO 59 bus for £145 from a scrap dealer.

The group had to convert the bus into a mobile home in preparation to take them more than 120,000 miles. They left the Elms Pub in January 1967 for France.

Moving on through six continents and 30 countries certainly wasn't plain sailing. They had to navigate through the desert plains in Australia, got stuck under a bridge in Baghdad, were shot at in Iran and slipped off a road in Yugoslavia.

Along the way they picked up media fame on their travels, and even got sponsorship deals. Qantas got involved and painted a Union Jack logo across the bus and sponsored the side - even a TV commercial was made to promote their journey.

Ron said: "How that bus survived I don't know. It was a miracle, but British-built,"

The group of friends returned to Dover in August 1969 and drove the bus to Hullbridge in Essex to rot. A bus dealer recognised it and helped restore it.

As the journey was never finished, 52 years on, five of the team reunited to take the bus back to the Elms Pub in Leigh-on-Sea to complete the journey.

Zero-waste supermarket proving popular



The first zero-waste supermarket in Essex is continuing to make an I impact on the community as it approaches its one-year anniversary.

The Refill Room, Leigh-on-Sea, was opened by Gemma and Alan Deeney in December last year aiming to reduce plastic waste in the area and eradicating the health risks that come with food packaged in plastic.

Gemma said: "My husband's a diver, so he saw the impact pollution was having to the ocean first-hand. When we realised how few options there are for organic and non-plastic using food in the area, we did some research and decided to open The Refill Room."

The supermarket is now providing customers with a plethora of ecofriendly goods - it's become Essex's hub for zero-waste products.

Gemma added: "The community's support has actually been unbelievable. We just want to keep bringing wellness to the community."





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Pupils support NSPCC campaign



Pupils at a Leigh-on-Sea school learned a valuable lesson about abuse and neglect while raising funds for charity.

The NSPCC has been touring schools as part of its Speak Out Stay Safe campaign which aims to empower children, with Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Primary School, in Leigh-on-Sea, the latest

Following the visit, pupils took part in a danceathon to help the child protection charity reach even more children with its safeguarding message.

More than £1,300 was raised with the money going back into the NSPCC's Speak Out campaign.

The scheme, which relies on volunteers, reached more than 52,000 children in Essex in the last academic vear.

Headteacher Sally Nutman, said: "We are delighted that the NSPCC workshops and assemblies in school have provided our pupils with high quality information and I have had parental feedback about how this clear message has made a real difference to their children.

"We have also enjoyed dancing to raise money for the NSPCC, all the activities have been fun, informative and helpful for us and hopefully others."

Kiren Chima, NSPCC schools organiser for Essex, said: "It's fantastic when a school is so supportive. not only of the vital messages we deliver, but in helping us deliver those to more schools.

"To hear the pupils take the information on board is heartening and its really rewarding for volunteers to know that their work could change a child's life."

Hundreds of cannabis plants seized after drug bust

ssex Police's war on drugs has continued after hundreds of cannabis plants were recovered in Leigh-on-Sea.

The discovery came after a search was carried out early on October 7 as part of the force's Operation Raptor, It followed a similar raid on September 20 in the town.

Essex Police set up Operation Raptor teams in the north, south and west of the county to tackle those involved in drug and gang-related crime.

The significant drug bust led to Essex Police asking for more help from members of the public.

An Essex Police spokesperson said: "A total of 320 plants were recovered, meaning a considerable amount of drugs will not reach the streets of Leighon-Sea.

Kinder Egg helps crack investigation

Adrug dealer who racially abused a police officer has been jailed for six years after being arrested in Leigh-on-Sea.

Jay Tuppein was jailed on October 3 after his DNA was found on a plastic Kinder Egg capsule containing wraps of a Class A drug which had been seized in Southend in March.

Through a separate investigation, text messages were found between a phone linked to Tuppein and someone else which revolved around the sale of Class A drugs.

When officers went to arrest Tuppein at an address in Leigh-on-Sea, he jumped out of a converted loft, then tried escaping through neighbouring gardens before attempting to hide behind a parked vehicle, where he was

Officers found two mobile phones under the car he'd hidden behind and found messages on one of them relating to the sale of Class A drugs.

Further mobile phones were found inside the address in Ronald Hill Grove which were linked back to Tuppein and also had messages on them relating to the sale of Class A drugs.

Tuppein, 29, was taken to hospital for a leg injury sustained during his attempt to evade arrest. While in hospital he racially abused officers on two different occasions – in one instance for a period of four hours.

In August, he appeared in court to faces charges of being concerned in the supply of crack cocaine and heroin, two counts of racially aggravated harassment, and two counts of assault by beating of an emergency worker.

Arsonist jailed for more than six years



Awoman from Leigh-on-Sea has been jailed for conspiracy to commit arson after police responded to reports that a cloth covered in a flammable liquid was put through a front door.


Maria Khan received six years and four months at Basildon Crown Court on September 27 after admitting conspiracy to commit arson with intent. She has been given an indefinite restraining order to help further protect the occupants.

On September 7, 2018, a woman was about to go out and was sitting in her hallway when she heard noises coming from outside her front door in Woodcutters Avenue, in Leigh-on-Sea, at around 9.25pm. Intruders were then disturbed and a cloth covered in white spirit was left at the scene.

Following further enquiries, Essex Police arrested Khan at around 11.10pm. She was charged and remanded in custody.

Detective sergeant Anna Gifford, from Essex Police, said: "Khan knew one of the occupants within the property and we believe she had planned to either cause damage to the property or harm the individuals inside."

Richard La Rochelle, 36, of Shannon Close, Leigh-on-Sea, was found not quilty of the same charge by a jury.



look at the Mumbai terrorist attacks that happened in November 2008, as a new film is released that repaints the tragic events.

On November 26, 2008, a luxury hotel in India was taken under siege by terrorists, who proceeded to barricade in themselves, guests and staff.

The aggressors were 11 members of the Lashkare-Taiba terrorist group, an Islamist organisation from across the border in Pakistan. Their actions were the latest in a long line of coordinated attacks dating back some 15 years, and their attack on the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel was a statement intended to "strike a blow against a symbol of Indian wealth and

The hotel was not the only place targeted – in total there were 12 coordinated shooting and bombing sites across a period of four days, including another five-star hotel, a train station, a hospital, the Oberoi Trident, a restaurant and a Jewish community centre. In total, 174 people died (including attackers), with hundreds more injured, although to this day police are unsure of exact numbers.

The events at the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel are the subject of a new film. Mumbai, starring Dev Patel. Armie Hammer, Jason Isaacs and Nazanin Boniadi. It is largely inspired by true events, although parts in the film have been fictionalised in order to respect the privacy of those involved.

At the commencement of the siege, there was little information being made available through news reports, and on the first night some hostages were being freed through the windows of the building. Many staff chose to stay behind and help those being held.

Several explosions took place inside the hotel, and over the three days that followed all but one of the terrorists were captured and killed by law enforcement officers. It is believed 31 people died around half were Tai Hotel employees.

The film serves as a tribute to the innocent civilians and the ongoing fight against terrorism.

WINTER JOBS in the earden

With winter on its way you might be tempted to hang up the gardening gloves and put your feet up by the fire for a few months.

But now is a good time to think ahead and to start making preparations for spring. The hard work you put in now will pay off next year.

remove

First, remove any fallen branches, leaves and debris from around plants and beds. This will ensure dead plant matter doesn't cause damp problems to any underlying plants. It's also a good time to elevate containers onto pot feet to prevent plants becoming waterlogged by persistent winter rain.

Winter is a good time to prune, as deciduous trees have lost their leaves so you can see clearly the shape of branches. Climbing roses, fruit trees and hedges all benefit from a good cut back. Remove dead, damaged, diseased or spindly growth.

move and protect

Move containers of shrubs, bedding plants or herbs such as bay, myrtle and olive to a sheltered spot to protect from frost damage. Put a cloche over thyme you use for cooking.

Obviously in the winter less food is naturally available for birds to eat, so it is a good time to give nature a helping hand. The RSPB has a range of advice about what to leave out for the birds during the winter. Water is just as important, as natural resources freeze up, so make sure birdbaths stay ice-free.

n many quarters, Delia Smith will forever be best known for her toe-curling, alcoholprovoked rant on the pitch at Carrow Road in 2005 when she did her best to gee up

Norwich City fans in their Premier League encounter with Manchester City (a match they ended up losing 3-2 in injury time).

And yet, while the YouTube footage never fails in its Delia delight, there's plenty of content online, on TV and in book form that paint this food visionary in a much fairer light.

> In an era when celebrity chefs were stern, pompous, slightly arrogant and very often male, Delia broke the mould with a fresh and friendly approach to home

> > Across countless cookbooks, she informed and inspired, instilling in amateurs the confidence to create and innovate in the kitchen.

Delia launched herself into the public consciousness 50 years ago when employed as the cookery writer for the Daily Mirror. Penning How to Cheat at Cooking in 1971, she went on to create numerous Collection and How to Cook titles. While her love of a shortcut often provoked shrieks of derision from the traditionalists, it offered to a home audience a path into the culinary world that they would never otherwise have taken.

Sure enough, that connectivity has led the 78-year-old Woking-born chef to great success on the bookstand. This year marks five decades since her first published work, and in the time that has followed, the burgeoning success of more than 20 other tomes of firstrate food finesse endorses more than anything else Delia's unerring ability to stay timely, topical and with a finger on the pulse of cooking and dietary habits, many of which have changed wholly since her debut.

THE BEST TIPS FOR SAVING A WATER-DAMAGED PHONE

e've all been there – you're sat having your morning cereal... checking messages, browsing social media or looking something up online, when out of nowhere a tidal wave comes cascading over you. You were helpless to prevent your phone becoming soaked through, and this categorically didn't actually happen because you knocked it in the washing-up bowl.

Whatever the careless reasons for having a watersoaked phone, acting quickly can save you:

✓ ONE: POWER OFF

If the phone has switched itself off, leave it off; if it's still on, kill the power. Don't attempt to plug it into the mains as we are in full recovery mode.

✓ TWO: REMOVE

Remove the microSD and SIM cards from the phone to prevent further damage to them.

✓ THREE: POSITION

Position the phone upright so any remaining water

can drain from it. Don't shake, bang or blow into any of the open slots. While it seems plausible that physical action can get water out, you're more likely to be sending it further into the delicate areas of the phone.

✓ FOUR: HIGH AND DRY

Avoid the temptation to take a hairdryer to your phone. While heat may seem a good solution for the removal of water, it's more likely you'll end up frying your components. Instead, dry the phone gently with a paper towel or a cloth.

✓ FIVE: ABSORB

Pack rice around the phone inside an airtight container or zip-lock bag. Place phone in an airing cupboard or somewhere humid but not hot, and leave for 24 hours.

Fingers crossed, when turning your phone back on it should be back to full working order, but be sure to check touchscreen functionality, microphone, speakers and charging potential in particular.

USEI BANG-UP JOBS

HOW NOT TO GET RIPPED OFF WHEN BUYING A SECOND-HAND MOTOR

n 2019, used cars don't quite come with the same reputation as the Boycie and Arthur Daley fourwheelers of the 1980s, but it still pays to exercise caution where motors and money are concerned.

TEST RUN

Make sure you test drive the vehicle, in broad daylight and on a route you choose (unscrupulous sellers might avoid bumpy roads or sharp turns that could show up a vehicle's failings). If buying privately, meet at the vendor's house.

INSPECTION

In an ideal world, any potential purchase should be run past an independent garage who can give the vehicle a once-over to diagnose problems. An expert will be able to quickly diagnose excess wear and tear, leaks and rust.

If you don't have this as an option, inspect the car as much as you can. Look for any signs of collision repairs such as the overspray of paint near wheels, mufflers and door seals. Check beneath where the car is parked for oil, while a water leak will give off a smell of mildew.

SELLER HISTORY

The seller should present to you a full service history and the most recent MOT certificate. If their details are hazy, ask them to clarify.

RETURN

Check out the terms and conditions over returns. Used dealers will offer warranties, but if purchasing privately you may be buying as seen. Either way, get any agreement in writing.

ONLINE RESEARCH

With a number plate, you can find out a reasonable amount of a car's history, so search online and consult with your insurance company over a quote, whereby any hidden issues with the car can show up.

Remember, when buying a second-hand car, the power is in your hands. Haggle, be firm, and be willing to walk away if you're not 100 per cent certain the motor is everything it should be.


