elson Mandela walked into a room with the Queen in Durban, South Africa. He briefly left her side as she talked to another guest. I suddenly found myself standing next to the great man and he turned to me and said: "Isn't Elizabeth wonderful?"

Slightly taken aback and wondering who he was taking about, I asked, "Who is Elizabeth?"

Mr Mandela, who had retired as South Africa's first Black president a few months earlier in 1999 looked astonished and pointed at the Queen and said: "Elizabeth of course, your Queen."

I was shocked as I had never heard anyone be so familiar with Her Majesty. I knew her family name was Lilibet and that the Duke of Edinburgh sometimes affectionately called her "Cabbage".

> If that left me surprised. I was more shocked when I spoke to his daughter Zindzi who told me that when Mr Mandela and the Queen were alone together in private he called her "Lizzie".

> > If anyone could pull it off, it's the late South African president. He and "Lizzie" were quite close—she signed letters to him with "Your sincere friend, Elizabeth R."

She referred to him as Nelson.

The couple had become great friends ever since his release in 1990. Eighteen of those years were spent on Robben Island, off the coast of Cape Town. He had been jailed in 1963 after being found guilty of trying to overthrow the government.

The Queen had shown a remarkable piece of judgment, After all, Mrs Thatcher had called Mandela a terrorist in Vancouver in 1987.

The world mourned when he died in 2013, aged 95. This month (July 18) marks the centenary of his birth.

Although he spent his life fighting Britain's colonial legacy in South Africa, Nelson Mandela was an Anglophile. The roots of his close and contradictory relationship with Britain were in his childhood.

> Born into a tribal aristocracy in the Transkei, the seven-vear-old Rolihlahla Mandela was sent to

> > a Christian mission school.

It was the custom then for all the African boys to be given English names, so on his first day his teacher renamed him Nelson Mandela and a man of the people was born.

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





- ✓ DO choose the best seat. The front of the car, the middle of the aeroplane over the wing, or the lower levels of a ship are where you should be.
- DO have a steady flow of fresh air.
- ✓ DO be prepared. If you are prone to sickness, take antihistamines the night before, then on the morning of your trip. If you only think you might be sick, pack hyoscine tablets such as Kwells, which can work within 15 minutes.
- DO dose up on ginger. Studies have shown that this warming spice can really help travel sickness. So, take ginger capsules half an hour before travelling, have ginger candies in your bag (from health food stores) and if you are sick, drink plenty of water to overcome the effects.

# Revive with coconut oil

If your wooden surfaces or leather upholstery are looking a little lacklustre, they probably just need rehydration and nourishment. But you don't need to splash out on fancy furniture polish or beeswax, as a little coconut oil will do the trick just as well. Start by giving the surface a wipe down with warm water and soap, and when dry, apply coconut oil to an old rag before thoroughly rubbing into furniture.

# Use vinegar to naturally stain wood

If you have a wooden table that's looking patchy, or you just prefer a new finish, you can stain naturally with vinegar. Simply combine one cup of vinegar (balsamic for a dark effect, apple cider for a lighter colour) with one cup of water and leave in a bucket for 24 hours with a steel wool pad. Then paint this solution onto your wood – note: it will look significantly lighter when wet (not darker, as you may expect).

# Remove stains and marks with everyday products

Forget the harsh chemicals, by mixing up a solution that's three quarters vegetable oil and a quarter vinegar, you can get rid of most superficial wood marks – just rub on and leave. For leather, try using lemon juice, or for tough stains, rub in alcohol.

# Shine up glass and mirror surfaces


Got smears that just won't budge? Start with a microfibre cloth to remove dust, then mix a solution that's half white vinegar and half water in a spray bottle. Apply and then buff with microfibre. Finish with a rub of scrunched-up newspaper.

# Fill nail holes with wood

What's the best material to fill a hole in wood with? Wood, of course. Depending on the size, use a toothpick, or wooden skewer to fill the space, cut it to the right size and fix with a little wood glue. Sand to finish.

fter upping sticks for the US three years ago, James Corder has become one of the biggest names in world entertainment yet it's refreshing to find Uxbridge's most famous export hasn't lost any of his tenderness, humility or down-to-earth charm.

He presents one of the biggest talk shows in the world, stars in Hollywood blockbusters and calls Harry Styles his best mate. In December, he welcomed his third bundle of joy, Charlotte, and despite a burgeoning family life, remains hopelessly in demand for shows and events on both sides of the Atlantic.

With all the showmanship and perfect appearances that are required for TV work, it follows then, that if an opportunity arises to get a job done by putting in a little less effort, James Corden grabs it with both hands. Like his recent turn voicing the imitable Peter Rabbit in Sony's adaptation of the Beatrix Potter classic. 'Voicing' being the operative word. For to play the woodland scamp, the 39-year-old simply had to turn up in a recording booth.. naked, if he wanted. "Any job where I don't have to make any effort with my appearance... where I can turn up looking like a hot mess, is fine by me," he laughs.

Cheeky, charming and affable as ever, it isn't hard to wonder why the star has enjoyed stellar success, though no one could have predicted he would crack America with such ease. But since taking over from Craig Ferguson as host of CBS's *The Late Late Show*, Corden's fanbase has swelled, as has his bank balance. His popularity is mostly down to a perfectly delivered, self-deprecating sense of humour, though is helped along by an impeccable contacts book, which has seen the likes of Justin Bieber, Mariah Carey and Adele booked for his brilliant *Carpool Karaoke* skit.

But away from the glaring spotlights, Corden likes to keep his life simple. Yes, he is mates with some of the biggest stars going, but outside of work the Brit loves nothing more than relaxing at his home in LA with wife Julia Carey, children Max, seven, Carey, three, and their recent new-born. Family life provides a necessary anchor in the sea of celebdom, as he jokes that his kids don't give a fig about his illustrious career. "They've got bigger fish to fry - I'm just dad. I do the dishes and make funny faces: that's all I'm good for "he jokes."

Having made his name in the late 1990s with the BBC Three sitcom *Gavin & Stacey* – which he co-wrote and starred in with his *Fat Friends* co-star Ruth Jones – Corden is living proof that anything is possible. For here is a man who started out with no connections to Hollywood, and who certainly doesn't boast the looks of your average film star. Yet his last role was opposite some of cinema's hottest and most celebrated stars, in the *Ocean's 8* all-female reboot starring Sandra Bullock, Cate Blanchett and Rihanna.

"Ocean's 8 was really fun," he says with a grin. "I mean, with a cast like that, you know it's going to be incredible.

"I still count myself as lucky every day. To be successful is all I wanted, but as time goes on, you come to realise that to be happy and to feel loved is much more important."



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



# **Burglar jailed after being caught on CCTV**



Aburglar who was caught on CCTV breaking into a house in Loughton has been jailed for three years.

Daniel Witham was filmed walking down a side entrance to a property at around 7.30am on April 20, climbing onto a shed and into the back garden.

He was then seen going into the shed, returning with a hammer which he then used to smash a glass panel of the property's back door.

After climbing through a window, he was later seen leaving through a rear window with a dark-coloured satchel which he did not have before going inside.

Climbing back onto the shed, he left the property into the side entrance and out to the road where he walked away.

When Detective Constable Rob Guiney, from Loughton CID, viewed the CCTV footage he recognised the man as Daniel Witham.

Witham, 30, of no fixed address, was arrested on Wednesday, April 25, following an early morning arrest enquiry where he tried to run from officers, and charged with burglary the following day.

Appearing at Chelmsford Crown Court on Thursday, May 31, he pleaded guilty and was sentenced to three years.

DC Guiney said: "Daniel Witham's actions were brazen, breaking into someone's home in the middle of the morning.

"He has little regard for people's property, happily causing damage in order to steal.

"He was caught on camera and due to the evidence against him had little choice but to admit his quilt."

# **Queen's Birthday Honour is** 'amazing surprise'

Eleanor Laing MP has been made a Dame in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

Mrs Laing MP has been Member of Parliament for Epping Forest for 21 years and said the news came as an "amazing surprise".

Mrs Laing MP was a Shadow Minister for 12 years and has been a Deputy Speaker for the last four-and-a-half years.

She was appointed a member of the Privy Council, the formal body of advisers to the Queen, last November.

Commenting on her Damehood, she said: "This is an amazing surprise but I am absolutely delighted.

"It has been a great honour to serve the people of Epping Forest for so many years, and to be able to continue to serve them as their Member of Parliament."

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# **Man iailed after committing 14 offences**



A24-year-old man from Loughton appeared in Court in Chelmsford on Friday, May 25, charged with a number of offences including possession of a knife, drugs and dangerous driving.

Joshua Kendall was arrested on the evening of May 23 in Buckhurst Hill.

Following work by Loughton Local Policing officers and Loughton detectives he was later charged with four thefts of fuel, one theft of food and alcohol. possession of cannabis, possession of a large kitchen knife, two counts of driving without insurance, two counts of driving while disqualified, two counts of failing to stop for police and dangerous driving. He admitted all the offences put to him.

Magistrates sentenced Kendall to 13 months in prison and added 42 months to an existing driving ban for all but the driving offences and the possession of a knife.

Kendall was ordered to appear at Chelmsford Crown Court on June 25 to be sentenced for those matters.

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Two men jailed over stabbing

Two men have been jailed for a total of more than 13 years in connection with the stabbing of a man in broad daylight.

The victim, a man in his 20s, had been approached by two men who just gotten out of a white Ford Fiesta in Cripsey Avenue in Ongar at around 5pm on Wednesday, September 13, 2017.

After an altercation one of the men stabbed the victim in the stomach, before both men got back into the car and left the scene.

The victim was taken to hospital where he underwent surgery for three wounds.

The Fiesta was traced to an address in Loughton where police arrested 19-year-old Anthony Hamilton in the early hours the next day.

Later that day officers stopped and arrested another man, 21-year-old Raphel Duke-Okeze in Loughton.

On September 15, Hamilton was charged with GBH with intent and possession of a knife with a public place.

Duke-Okeze was charged with threatening someone with a blade in a public place and attempted robbery.

They both denied the charges against them but were found guilty at Chelmsford Crown Court on Tuesday, March 27.

At the same court on Tuesday, June 5 Hamilton was jailed for 11 years and Duke-Okeze was sentenced to two-and-a-half years.

Investigation officer Detective Constable Ricky Rodd, from Loughton CID, said: "This was violent attack in broad daylight in a residential area.

"Even though the victim required surgery his injuries could have been much worse and he could have been really seriously injured.

"It is galling that Anthony Hamilton was comfortable using this level of violence and I'm glad he and Raphel Duke-Okeze are now off the streets.

"I hope this sentence will provide the victim with some solace and shows Essex Police will not tolerate violent crime."


