


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# Editor's notes...

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# A LIFE IN THE LENS - LOOKING AT THE IMPACT LORRAINE KELLY HAS HAD ON OUR MORNING ROUTINES

orraine Kelly is a doyenne of the terrestrial TV morning schedule – a homely, kind, softly spoken presenter whose ability to mix everyday life with A-list red carpet celebrity excess—has made her one of our most cherished broadcasters.

At the end of November, the Scottish presenter turns 60. She has dedicated more than half of her life to the interview sofa, in the process achieving the quite unique feat of never seeing her popularity wane, despite the wildly changing fortunes of the shows she has been a part of, from TV-AM, GMTV, ITV Breakfast and Daybreak, not to mention revisions to her own lifestyle and entertainment show Lorraine.

Since joining the first of those ITV breakfast show incarnations in 1984, the Glasgow-born journalist has been a stalwart, effortlessly combining heavy news, serious topics and controversy-laden stories with light entertainment's feel-good factor.

From covering the Lockerbie bombing in 1989 to guest-hosting BBC2 comedy-quiz series Never Mind the Buzzcocks, to providing voiceovers and narration on CBeebies programme Raa Raa the Noisy Lion, Lorraine's appetite for variety is only ever at odds with her constant chipper, chirpy, uplifting tone that effervesces warmth and friendliness.

# 'EMOTIONAL, FUNNY, ENTERTAINING AND WITH A HEART OF GOLD'

Lorraine was the recipient of an OBE in 2012, and a year later fellow weekday morning magnate Piers Morgan made Lorraine the subject of one of his *Life Stories*. Emotional, funny, entertaining and with a heart of gold, she wept at recalling the images of Dunblane, a massacre that occurred just 35 miles from where she grew up.

And yet Lorraine, like Piers, has always been able to mix tragedy with optimism in almost Shakespearean flits between heartache and happiness – from the most exposed portrayals and gravest of real-life stories to, in complete contrast, Lorraine's own "exposure", made public by a temeritous Piers who embarrassed the Scot when he displayed a picture of her naked on a sunbed from a newspaper cutting, before presenting it to her in a frame.

Morgan's comment that the host's secret to her seemingly ageless demeanour is that she is "such a great laugh both on and off-camera" is the truest ode. Her instantly-recognisable giggle has kept her liked and adored by the British public. Combining this with a sense of style that is brave, bold, free from convention and with the specific intention of making the wearer feel satisfied, she flies a flag for anyone putting themselves first.

"It's true, sometimes I do find myself wearing clothes an 18- or 19-year-old might have in their wardrobe," she has said. "In the past I would have thought twice, but I think as the years go on you realise how important it is to dress in a way that makes you feel happy."

Weight loss has also been another topic close to the TV personality. Brutally honest about her appearance, she recently revealed that she'd been able to lose almost a stone in weight in just over six weeks thanks to cutting out carbs.

It is perhaps the one thing we will allow the "Queen of Daytime TV" to limit. The rest – the friendly smile, the sense of community and the ability to make every viewer feel like they are in the room with her – we will keep... thank you, Lorraine.

# A LOOK AT THE HOW BGT'S TWIST AND PULSE RETURNED TO THE BIG TIME AFTER A GAP OF NINE YEARS

t's clear 2019 is going to go down as the year when everything got a little mixed up. Now, in 2019, their return to the top of the tree bucks the trend of Simon Cowell's acts burning out so quickly after fame. Perhaps these are the true champs after all...





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

e all want our skin to look smoother, brighter and, of course, more youthful, so it's no surprise that medical professionals are constantly developing new treatments to keep up with demand.

And with our current aversion to surgical procedures, microdermabrasion has never been more popular.

# What is microdermabrasion?

Microdermabrasion is a non-surgical, minimally invasive cosmetic procedure that uses crystals and a vacuum to remove dead skin cells; it can be used on the face, neck, chest, back and hands. You should notice an improvement in the elasticity, texture and appearance of your skin after only a few sessions.

# What types of skin can benefit from this procedure?

This procedure is particularly effective for those suffering with the following skin complaints:

# ls it safe?

# How much does it cost?

This is dependent on what type of specialist you book with, but on average this procedure will cost between £40 and £100 for one session. You can have this procedure as frequently as every week to kick-start the desired cosmetic effect, with most switching to monthly maintenance after three to four sessions.

# Does it take long to recover from the treatment?

Your skin will be pink and feel dry and tight after the procedure, a bit like a moderate case of sunburn. However, these effects will only last for around 24 hours and can be greatly improved by regular moisturising. It is advised to not wear make-up until the skin has completely healed.



oody teenager? Blame it on their hormones. Nagging wife? She must be hormonal. Even men can be affected by a hormonal imbalance at particular points in their lives.

And it's no wonder really, as the human body secretes and circulates 50 different hormones which are responsible for regulating most of our major bodily functions.

# The key hormones and their functions:

**THYROID:** This hormone helps regulate our weight and internal body temperature and controls our energy levels.

**OESTROGEN:** A female sex hormone that is in charge of reproduction, menstruation and menopause.

**SEROTONIN:** The happy hormone that regulates our moods, memory, sleep and digestion.

**CORTISOL:** A stress regulator, this hormone is produced by the adrenal gland.

**ADRENALINE:** Known as the emergency hormone, adrenaline causes the "fight or flight" response.

**TESTOSTERONE:** The male sex hormone; it helps build muscle and develop male reproductive tissues.

**PROLACTIN:** This hormone is released after childbirth so that the mother can lactate.

PROGESTERONE: This hormone helps the

body prepare for conception and pregnancy and regulates the monthly cycle.

**INSULIN:** Produced by the pancreas, insulin helps the body regulate blood sugar levels.

# Symptoms associated with a hormonal imbalance:

- Unexplained weight loss or gain
- Excessive sweating
- Sudden sensitivity to cold or heat
- Long-term fatigue
- Feeling constantly thirsty
- Difficulty sleeping
- Anxiety/mood swings
- o Brittle bones
- Changes in blood pressure
- Bloating

# Natural ways to balance your hormones:

- Get sufficient sleep
- Manage your stress levels
- Exercise regularly
- Avoid sugars and refined carbohydrates
- Eat plenty of fruit and vegetables
- Eat healthy fats such as nuts and avocados
- o Increase your fibre intake
- Eat one or two portions of oily fish per week

Suffering from a hormonal imbalance can have serious effects on your whole body, so if you are experiencing any of the above symptoms, you should talk to your GP who will investigate further.



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# How do you know if you have it?

The main symptom is patches of skin that are darker and thicker than usual. They can appear anywhere on the body. The patches are dry and feel similar to velvet.

They're most common in skin folds, such as the armpits, neck or groin, and some people also have tiny growths on the patches.

The patches often appear gradually, without any other symptoms, but the skin may become itchy.

Although it's usually harmless, it's best to get any skin changes checked out by your GP because in rare cases it can be a sign of something more serious, such as cancer.

# What causes it?

The most common cause is having raised insulin levels, hence it is more common in overweight people. Other causes include:

- type 2 diabetes;
- conditions that affect hormone levels such as Cushing's syndrome, polycystic ovary syndrome or an underactive thyroid;
- taking certain medicines including steroids or hormone treatments like the contraceptive pill;
- in rare cases, cancer usually stomach cancer;
- in rare cases, a faulty inherited gene.

Sometimes acanthosis nigricans happens in healthy people with no other conditions. This is more common in people with dark skin.

# How is it related to type 2 diabetes?

If your diet is high in carbs and sugars, your insulin will be high as a result. (Insulin controls blood sugar, so more sugar equals more insulin.) But insulin has numerous other effects on the body, one of which is cell proliferation (important, for example, at puberty, when the body grows rapidly). Uncontrolled cell growth is a bad thing, however; this is why people with type 2 diabetes are more prone to cancer. Acanthosis nigricans is essentially benign and harmless. However, the raised insulin (called hyperinsulinemia) causes proliferation of the surface of the skin as well as excess melatonin production. Hence the thickening and darkening of the skin. Interesting to note that acanthosis has the same cause, but different symptoms, as skin tags.

# What is the treatment?

There is no treatment, but if you improve your diet and lifestyle you can bring your sugar levels back under control, your insulin levels will normalise and the dark, raised patches often fade over time.

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FIVE EXERCISES THAT CAN BE PERFORMED ON A TREADMILL

# **INCLINE PRESS-UPS**

Turn the treadmill off and stand on the side base with your hands on top of the handles, making sure your body is in a straight line.

Now bend your elbows into a push-up and take your chest down to the console, hold it and then push back up. Perform 10 reps.

# REVERSE MOUNTAIN CLIMBERS

Set speed to 1-2mph, move behind the machine and face away from it, then go into the plank position. With hands on the floor, lift feet onto the treadmill, drive your right leg onto your chest and stretch, then the left one. Perform eight times on each leg.

# WALKING PLANK

Still at 1-2mph, stand at the end of the treadmill and get into the plank position, putting your hands onto the base of the machine. Making sure your body is in a straight line, put your hands onto the band of the machine and simply walk them forward.

# SIDE SHUFFLES

Stand sideways on the treadmill in a squat position and slowly bring the speed up to around 3mph. Moving quickly, move your feet together and out again. Repeat this on the other side. For balance, hold your hands together.

# TREADMILL PUSH

Turn off the treadmill and pull the emergency tag. Then stand on the machine and grip both of the handles with your hands, and bend your elbows slightly. While in that position, drive your legs in a forward motion to push the treadmill belt back.

Complement these exercises with a brisk walk or run to get your body toned.



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look at the Mumbai terrorist attacks that happened in November 2008, as a new film is released that repaints the tragic events.

On November 26, 2008, a luxury hotel in India was taken under siege by terrorists, who proceeded to barricade in themselves, guests and staff.

The aggressors were 11 members of the Lashkare-Taiba terrorist group, an Islamist organisation from across the border in Pakistan. Their actions were the latest in a long line of coordinated attacks dating back some 15 years, and their attack on the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel was a statement intended to "strike a blow against a symbol of Indian wealth and

The hotel was not the only place targeted – in total there were 12 coordinated shooting and bombing sites across a period of four days, including another five-star hotel, a train station, a hospital, the Oberoi Trident, a restaurant and a Jewish community centre.

In total, 174 people died (including attackers), with hundreds more injured, although to this day police are unsure of exact numbers.

The events at the Taj Mahal Palace Hotel are the subject of a new film, Mumbai, starring Dev Patel, Armie Hammer, Jason Isaacs and Nazanin Boniadi. It is largely inspired by true events, although parts in the film have been fictionalised in order to respect the privacy of those involved.

At the commencement of the siege, there was little information being made available through news reports, and on the first night some hostages were being freed through the windows of the building. Many staff chose to stay behind and help those being held.

Several explosions took place inside the hotel, and over the three days that followed all but one of the terrorists were captured and killed by law enforcement officers. It is believed 31 people died around half were Taj Hotel employees.

The film serves as a tribute to the innocent civilians and the ongoing fight against terrorism.

Delia launched herself into the public consciousness 50 years ago when employed as the cookery writer for the Daily Mirror. Penning How to Cheat at Cooking in 1971, she went on to create numerous Collection and How to Cook titles. While her love of a shortcut often provoked shrieks of derision from the traditionalists, it offered to a home audience a path into the culinary world that they would never otherwise have taken.

Sure enough, that connectivity has led the 78-year-old Woking-born chef to great success on the bookstand. You may not believe it, but lamb is actually one of the most consumed meats in the UK, beating the humble chicken and even British beef. Both professional chefs and amateur cooks just love its soft, melt-in-the-mouth pink flesh, and who can blame them?

What should I look for when choosing lamb?

Lamb is one of the types of meat where you should try to push the boat out if you can afford to. Go organic, British and grass-fed where possible. Lamb meat should be deep pink in colour with dry, white fat.


# How should lamb be stored?

Lamb should never be exposed to heat until cooking time, neither should it be left out at room temperature. It should always be stored in the fridge or freezer to prevent it going bad.

# How do I cook lamb?

If you want to cook lamb shoulder or a leg of lamb, your best option is to slow cook them.

- To ensure the meat does not dry out you need to add plenty of liquid, whether that be red wine or stock plus your chosen herbs.
- We recommend placing your lamb on a bed of onions or vegetables.
- · Cover with foil and cook for three hours.
- · Remove foil and cook for a further 30 minutes.







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# THE BEST TIPS FOR SAVING A WATER-DAMAGED PHONE

e've all been there – you're sat having your morning cereal... checking messages, browsing social media or looking something up online, when out of nowhere a tidal wave comes cascading over you. You were helpless to prevent your phone becoming soaked through, and this categorically didn't actually happen because you knocked it in the washing-up bowl.

Whatever the careless reasons for having a watersoaked phone, acting quickly can save you:

# ✓ ONE: POWER OFF

If the phone has switched itself off, leave it off; if it's still on, kill the power. Don't attempt to plug it into the mains as we are in full recovery mode.

# ✓ TWO: REMOVE

Remove the microSD and SIM cards from the phone to prevent further damage to them.

# **✓ THREE: POSITION**

Position the phone upright so any remaining water

can drain from it. Don't shake, bang or blow into any of the open slots. While it seems plausible that physical action can get water out, you're more likely to be sending it further into the delicate areas of the phone.

# ✓ FOUR: HIGH AND DRY

Avoid the temptation to take a hairdryer to your phone. While heat may seem a good solution for the removal of water, it's more likely you'll end up frying your components. Instead, dry the phone gently with a paper towel or a cloth.

# **✓ FIVE: ABSORB**

Pack rice around the phone inside an airtight container or zip-lock bag. Place phone in an airing cupboard or somewhere humid but not hot, and leave for 24 hours.

Fingers crossed, when turning your phone back on it should be back to full working order, but be sure to check touchscreen functionality, microphone, speakers and charging potential in particular.



CHEQUE BOOK

THE HISTORY OF THE NOW (ALMOST **DEFUNCT) CHEQUE BOOK** 

It's peculiar to think that just as we've reached the point where the trusty personal cheque can be processed and credited to a person's account in little more than 24 hours, this form of payment is now virtually obsolete.

Although no date has yet been set for the removal of what now appears a largely primitive way of sending and receiving money, the cheque's day is almost done. After all, why bother with flimsy bits of paper, the postal service, bank gueues and hold-ups in processing funds when everything these days is digital and instantaneous?

The fact that the cheque is desperately hanging on is a credit to its heritage. First gaining popularity in the UK around 1770, it has never moved away from it sole purpose - namely as an order sent to a bank to pay a sum from the drawer's account.

From humble beginnings, the cheque grew in popularity during the 19th century, removing the need for businessmen to carry around large quantities of money.

The format's death knell has often been said to be the time it takes for the item to clear, and this is because the law still requires a cheque to be returned physically to the payer's bank. It's also much less security-tight than a card payment; and although more than 400 million cheques were written last year, only the habits of the elderly - a demographic notoriously resistant to change - have ensured the format stays.

Whether that will remain the case for the next generation remains to be seen, though what is clear is that cheques will still be around for a little while to come. After all, they remain popular with institutions paying out - HMRC included - who know that this slow, sluggish, sloppy process of paying means the longer money stays in their account, the more interest they earn.



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# How to NIP NAIL BITING in the bud

# Why do children bite their nails?

# NAILS OR WALLS?

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


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GARDENING PLANT OF THE MONTH: ost famous for being the symbol of remembrance for soldiers who died during World War I, poppies make a beautiful addition to any garden and are simple to grow. WHAT TYPE OF PLANT IS A POPPY? A poppy is part of the Papaveraceae family and is a herbaceous plant that is known for its colourful flowers. Poppies can grow to more than a metre tall and up to 15cm across. WHAT TYPES OF POPPIES ARE THERE? There are roughly 120 different varieties of poppies, with the most popular being the field poppy, or papaver rhoeas, which is an annual and bee-friendly variety that suits a wildflower-filled garden. Or if you want a real showstopper of a flower, then oriental poppies are about as flamboyant as they come and are available in many eyecatching colours, including salmon-pink, scarlet, plum and orange. WHEN AND HOW SHOULD YOU PLANT POPPY SEEDS? Poppies should be planted in either late autumn or early winter as they need to be exposed to the cold in order to germinate, making November the ideal month to sow poppy seeds. Start by preparing your soil by removing as many weeds as possible. Lightly dig the soil over and rake to create a bed for your seeds. Sprinkle the seeds over the surface – they do not need to be raked in owing to their tiny size. Water immediately and re-water only if weather is very dry. Expect flowers from June onwards. WHAT GROWING CONDITIONS DO THEY LIKE? The poppy is an easy plant to grow and favours full sun rather than a shady spot. Although they will grow in most soil conditions, they will flourish in soil that is well drained, erring on the side of dry.



With winter on its way you might be tempted to hang up the gardening gloves and put your feet up by the fire for a few months.

But now is a good time to think ahead and to start making preparations for spring. The hard work you put in now will pay off next year.

# remove

First, remove any fallen branches, leaves and debris from around plants and beds. This will ensure dead plant matter doesn't cause damp problems to any underlying plants. It's also a good time to elevate containers onto pot feet to prevent plants becoming waterlogged by persistent winter rain.

# **Phuna**

Winter is a good time to prune, as deciduous trees have lost their leaves so you can see clearly the shape of branches. Climbing roses, fruit trees and hedges all benefit from a good cut back. Remove dead, damaged, diseased or spindly growth.

# move and protect

Move containers of shrubs, bedding plants or herbs such as bay, myrtle and olive to a sheltered spot to protect from frost damage. Put a cloche over thyme you use for cooking.

Obviously in the winter less food is naturally available for birds to eat, so it is a good time to give nature a helping hand. The RSPB has a range of advice about what to leave out for the birds during the winter. Water is just as important, as natural resources freeze up, so make sure birdbaths stay ice-free.



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rowing your own fruit and veg is not only good on the pocket - it's great for the soul too... and the soil too, for that matter.

But if you're thinking of going all Monty Don, you'd better make sure your ground matter is up

Finding out the acidity of your soil using a testing kit means you can best match it to whatever it is you want to grow. A slightly acidic result of pH 5-7 represents the best conditions for anything in your garden, with fruit at the lower end and sometimes as low as pH 4.

Readjusting your soil pH can be

done by adding either acidity (if too alkaline) or lime (if too acidic).

# Soil texture

Plants and vegetables require a richly organic bedding, with a crumbly texture that's moist to the touch and dark in colour.


Improving earth quality requires nothing more than a trip to your garden centre - simply add one or two inches onto the top six inches of soil already there. This will also improve drainage quality.

# Waterino

Whatever the soil type, never underestimate how much water you'll need to keep your earth in good shape. As a general guide, it's around 25 litres of water square metre every seven to 10 days to ensure you are maintaining optimum plant growth.

If you're worried your soil doesn't have sufficient moisture, insert a spade to maximum depth, remove, and check the end for dampness. And remember, always water in the cool of the evening or very early morning. Day watering is prone to evaporation - not only will your plants not flourish,

> but roots will not lower into the ground, and growing surface roots means, in future, that the threat of drought will always still be there.

Flower arranger wins £100,000 compensation

Aflower arranger who suffered horrific injuries when he fell while carrying a vase at Yotam Ottolenghi's Belgravia restaurant (pictured inset) has won a compensation payout of up to £100,000 from a Loughton florist.

Davy D'Agostino (pictured above), who worked for Farthing Flowers Ltd, was replenishing flowers at the Motcomb Street branch when he slipped while carrying the heavy vase upstairs in August 2014.

The vase smashed and the glass shards sliced through the flesh and tendons of his wrist.

Mr D'Agostino, 42, had to be rushed to hospital, he told Judge Christopher Lethem at Central London County Court at the end of September.

The former barman initially sued Mr Ottolenghi's company, blaming defective stairs, but dropped the case, and has now won up to £100,000 damages from his former boss, Loughton florist Caroline Farthing.

Judge Lethem said Mr D'Agostino received about 45 minutes' training from Ms Farthing in lifting and carrying, flower arranging and other parts of the job.

Ms Farthing said "not in a million years" would she

have told him to carry the heavy vase up and down the stairs.

She claimed it was his own fault because he should have filled the vase with a watering can and not attempted to manhandle it up and down the steps to the basement sink.

But the judge rejected Ms Farthing's evidence, which he said was "chaotic and contradictory".

The judge also rejected Ms Farthing's claim that she could not be sued directly because Mr D'Agostino was employed by her company, Farthing Flowers Ltd.

She claimed Mr D'Agostino only sued her personally after realising her company was uninsured and because she is a homeowner with assets to pay compensation.

Ruling that both the company and Ms Farthing personally are liable to pay damages, the judge said the work contract was between the florist and her

A further hearing will take place at a later date to decide the amount in damages which Mr D'Agostino

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New homes plan gets thumbs down from residents

Proposals to build hundreds of new homes on two former Epping Forest College sites in Loughton have been strongly criticised by Loughton Residents Association (LRA).

In a statement, the LRA set out its reasons for objecting to the proposal earmarked for Lucton's Field and the Middle Site in Loughton.

The statement read: "Developing the proposed sites would adversely affect air quality in the Epping Forest Special Area of Conservation (SAC) by pollution from residents' cars and would adversely add to the recreational pressure on the SAC."

Lucton's Field is an area of valuable open grassland that has never been developed. It was a green

meadow until 1950, then a playing field.

The LRA also believes there is insufficient infrastructure in place to accommodate any new homes.

The statement reads: "There are no school places. GP surgeries are already oversubscribed; it would make the local problems and the crowding on the Central Line worse.

"Acting as an association, LRA opposes all overintensive development proposals in Loughton."

Developer Fairview New Homes Ltd set out its proposals at a public exhibition recently. They are for 139 flats and 281 new homes.

The proposals also set out plans for new landscaping and children's areas and a wellness centre.

# Teen jailed for involvment in Brixton murder

Ateenager from Loughton was jailed for manslaughter last month in connection to a man who was stabbed to death in Brixton.

Chibuzo Ukonu, from Loughton, was sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment at The Old Bailey on Tuesday, October 11.

Alongside him was Rishon Florant of Waltham Forest, who was found guilty of murdering Glendon Spence, and was sentenced at the same court to 18 years' imprisonment.

The court heard that police were called at approximately 6.45pm on Thursday, February 21 to reports of a stabbing inside Marcus Lipton Youth Centre on Minet Road, SW9.

They found 23-year-old Glendon Spence – from Lewisham – suffering from stab wounds. Despite efforts to save him, Glendon sadly died at the scene

at 7 27nm

DCI Richard Vandenbergh of Specialist Crime said: "Glendon's death underlines the vile nature of knife crime and the pain it inflicts on communities.

"Glendon was murdered in a youth club – a venue expected to be a place of safety.

"The two males who burst in, each armed with large knives, turned that on its head with their actions which were sadly witnessed by so many other people."

Glendon's parents said: "The killing of our fantastic and much-loved son Glendon has shattered us as a family. There is no comfort anywhere and it is hard to accept what has happened.

"Society will not tolerate what his killers did and we hope these sentences will allow them to recognise the evil they inflicted upon him by stabbing him to death for no reason."

The Year 11 student is the youngest competitor to get through to the European final.



All four were taken to police stations.

Enquiries continue to establish the full circumstances. Police are not providing further details of the robbery.

# Clean power goes live at leisure centre

Anew power supply providing electricity and heat to Loughton Leisure Centre and reducing the building's carbon footprint went live recently.

The combined heating and power (CHP) unit is twice as efficient as the old system while at the same time reducing emissions and costs.

Leisure centres use tremendous amounts of power to maintain pool water temperatures, supply air conditioning, lighting and a host of other services. Traditional boilers generate large amounts of heat which is usually wasted as a by-product.

But this CHP unit generates electricity where required and uses excess heat for heating and hot water.

Councillor Nigel Avey, the Epping Forest District councillor responsible for leisure, switched on the unit at Loughton Leisure Centre.

He said: "This power source was incorporated into our new-build leisure centre at Waltham Abbev but had to be fitted as a replacement to the system at Loughton.

"CHP units gain their high energy efficiency by capturing and utilising heat from the engine during electricity generation. By generating energy on site, grid transmission losses are wiped out, increasing energy efficiency and reducing carbon emissions.

"The efficiency of this technology has a key economic benefit. By maximising the transformation of fuel into energy for the leisure centre, costs are significantly reduced. Investing in the CHP has an early payback against energy costs and savings continue for the lifetime of the CHP unit."

and a design legacy that continues to evolve



The designer passed away just over six years ago, but his impact on the industry was profound, and his legacy continues to be enjoyed on a daily basis by the millions who flock to London every day.

Collins' style was in luxury interior design. Flanked by his David Collins Studio, the

organisation has become renowned for chic, clean, glamorous design with an eye on heritage – ideas that are so applicable to London's sleek, rich, cosmopolitan feel, and often embracing his favourite colour, Lutyens blue.

Designing restaurants for Marco Pierre White, Pierre Koffmann and Marcus Wareing; patterning The Wolseley, The Delaunay Hotel, Claridge's, The Connaught and retail interiors for Harrods, Jimmy Choo and Alexander McQueen, Collins' style is as ubiquitous as it is unique – mainly because he has had an effect on so many.

The designer also swayed effortlessly into the pop world, and was responsible for Madonna's London and New York apartments which he curated with such swagger she gave him a co-writing credit on the track 'Drowned World/Substitute for

Love', which appeared on Madge's 1998 album 'Ray of Light'.

Collins died in mid-July 2013 through complications arising out of a particularly virulent skin cancer – it had only been

diagnosed three weeks previously.

Regardless, his studio continues to deliver iconic works of art and interior design, and is the recipient of numerous top-ranking awards.

It would be fitting to end with a quote from Madonna: "When I look around my houses, I am struck by what an influence he has had on me. He has left his souvenirs everywhere: his touch, his taste, his flair and his blue."

Crayon stains on the wall are the worst, but they can be removed by applying a small amount of shaving foam to a toothbrush and scrubbing the offending area.





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

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HOW NOT TO GET RIPPED OFF WHEN BUYING A SECOND-HAND MOTOR

n 2019, used cars don't quite come with the same reputation as the Boycie and Arthur Daley fourwheelers of the 1980s, but it still pays to exercise caution where motors and money are concerned.

# **TEST RUN**

Make sure you test drive the vehicle, in broad daylight and on a route you choose (unscrupulous sellers might avoid bumpy roads or sharp turns that could show up a vehicle's failings). If buying privately, meet at the vendor's house.

# INSPECTION

In an ideal world, any potential purchase should be run past an independent garage who can give the vehicle a once-over to diagnose problems. An expert will be able to quickly diagnose excess wear and tear, leaks and rust.

If you don't have this as an option, inspect the car as much as you can. Look for any signs of collision repairs such as the overspray of paint near wheels. mufflers and door seals. Check beneath where the car is parked for oil, while a water leak will give off

a smell of mildew.

# **SELLER HISTORY**

The seller should present to you a full service history and the most recent MOT certificate. If their details are hazy, ask them to clarify.

### RETURN

Check out the terms and conditions over returns. Used dealers will offer warranties, but if purchasing privately you may be buying as seen. Either way, get any agreement in writing.

# **ONLINE RESEARCH**

With a number plate, you can find out a reasonable amount of a car's history, so search online and consult with your insurance company over a quote, whereby any hidden issues with the car can show up.

Remember, when buying a second-hand car, the power is in your hands. Haggle, be firm, and be willing to walk away if you're not 100 per cent certain the motor is everything it should be.

while no Englishman wanted our footballers to slip up against the Czech Republic in the middle of October, the 2–1 defeat in Prague did bring about one of the more incredible football statistics of recent times – it marked 10 years and one day since the Three Lions last tasted defeat in a European Championship or World Cup qualifying match.

To go an entire decade without losing in qualification is quite something, and perhaps referee Damir Skomina may have felt something of a lion tamer as he delayed England's Euro 2020 qualification at the Sinobo Stadium.

Except the Slovenian official has previous. England's last qualification defeat, a decade and a day before that, against Ukraine, was officiated by... yep, you guessed it.

More than that, this is the same man who sent us crashing to 1–0 defeats against Belgium in the World Cup and against Germany in 2017, and remember that abysmal 2–1 capitulation to Iceland during Euro 2016? Yes, him again.


Is it worth lamenting this silver-haired man-in-the-middle as the architect of our great side's downfall? Rather, should we not just look to the future – an attitude typified by England's brilliant 6–0 win in Bulgaria just three days after the Czech defeat? Probably, yes.

It used to be said that England was flawless in qualifying for major tournaments and deeply flawed by the time they got there... and with good reason.

The positive indications are that the era of abject, pitiful failure – penalty shoot-out or not – is over. England proved in Russia that if a World Cup semi-final is achievable, what price our ability to go all the way at the Euros next year?

Manager Gareth Southgate will exercise caution; fans will run away with expectation, while the bookies suggest we are second favourites... although those odds may well shorten if Mr Skomina keeps his distance.

The 2019 World Athletics Championships in Doha will forever be remembered for implausible heat, poor organisation, an empty stadium and arguably the least popular winner and runner-up of the showpiece 100m event ever.

The vast majority of onlookers will want to move swiftly on to next year's Tokyo Olympics... but not Dina Asher-Smith.

The brilliant Brit is in no hurry to leave the memories of Qatar behind. You'll not find her complaining about event logistics, nor whether the seated attendance at the Khalifa International Stadium was 40,000 or 4,000. She cares not one bit.

Allowing the gloomy, baking lull to lift off into the Arab sky, the fresh breeze of 200m success was all that remained for the 23-year-old Blackheath

& Bromley Athletics Club member, whose newfound dominance on the world scene is a marker for so many more future championships and a career that holds incredible potential.

Asher-Smith is one of the new breed of track hopefuls, and yet, unlike so many others, she actually pulled off the feat. Where Team GB peers faltered, the King's College graduate showed blistering pace, a flawless stride and a faultless, nerveless drive to the line in beating American Brittany Brown to take

"It was a perfect race and I'm just over the moon," she said at the end of the run, in which she clocked a new national record of 21.88 seconds.

Where Dina Asher-Smith goes from here is up to her. She took silver in the 100m event, has age on her side, plus a level of humility, resilience and strength that can only be earned through victory.

If she can do it in an empty, echoing shell of an arena, just imagine how Asher-Smith will respond to the roar of being a world champion.
